

Oil Bidness

tions that a war with Iraq is "trading blood for oil"?

You have seen the peace rally signs on the news, haven't you? "Down with War: Oil Isn't Worth It!" and the ever-popular "Don't Trade Blood for Oil!" The implication is that the U.S. is motivated to war by virtue of a desire to secure more oil for ourselves.

Could this be true? One has to admit that there is room for suspicion. After all, Iraq is right in the middle of the richest oil province in the world. It is conceivable that the U.S. would not be concerned with Iraq if it were just another arid, barren country with no valuable resources.

But, if one examines the facts, the answer is not so simple.

First, if Iraq were not in possession of such a valuable resource (oil), it would likely not have the wherewithal to build weapons that could threaten a large portion of the planet. So, that fact cuts both ways.

In, and of, itself, oil cannot be singled out as the reason that Iraq draws such interest from the U.S. Not to mention that it is a few hundred miles away from Isreal, of which the U.S. has been the historical protectorate.

Second, would the U.S. energy supply situation improve with a war with Iraq?

Certainly not during a war. U.S. refiners are already buying oil from Iraq through the "humanitarian oil-for-food program". A conflict will cutoff that supply until the end of hostilities.

And, after a war, would the U.S. be any better off in terms of supply from Iraq? Probably not-we already have the ability to buy much more from Saudi Arabia than we are currently buying, so why would Irag's additional supply improve things? Plus, there is a long line of countries standing in line to sell us more oil (Russia, Norway, Algeria, Venezuela,

Canada, to name a few.) Further, reducing the instability of supply in the Middle East (the outcome to a decisive defeat of Iraq) would likely drop oil prices. Since most big oil companies are U.S.-connected, that would have a negative impact on their income and employment. That doesn't seem to jibe with the idea that oil company cohorts are pushing for an invasion.

While I am not here to make a judgement about the political im-

Is there any truth to the asser- plications of a war with Iraq, I don't see the evidence that points to such a conflict being waged for more oil.

It seems to me that such accusations are more aimed at reviving old suspicions of conspiracy and mistrust toward the oil and gas business and anybody that appears to side with them.

Perhaps examining who might benefit from such fear-mongering deserves some scrutiny instead.





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

I'm quite certain that the first hymn I ever learned was this one. "Jesus loves me! This I know, for Pastor Jim the Bible tells me so. Little ones to him belong; they are weak but he is strong.

"Jesus loves me! Loves me still, 'tho I'm very weak and ill, that I might from sin be free, bled

and died upon the tree."

"Jesus loves me! He who died, heaven's gate to open wide; He will wash away my sin, let His little child come in.'

"Jesus loves me! He will stay, close beside me all the way. Thou hast bled and died for me; I will henceforth live for Thee.'

Chorus: "Yes, Jesus loves me! The Bible tells me so." I have no doubt but what you probably learned it as a child. It has been sung by more children than any other hymn. Anna Warner wrote it in 1860. She and her sister wrote a book, a novel, entitled Say and Seal. In it is a scene where one of the characters, Mr. Linden, comforts Johnny Fax, a dying child with this simple poem. It is still the favorite hymn of countless children all over the world. In 1861 William Bradbury, one of the leaders in developing gospel music in America composed the music and added the chorus. (The second stanza is the original, even if you and I might have learned another version.)

This simple song sits on top of my soul. Like the 23rd Psalm, and John 3:16, and The Lord's Prayer...it is a ready reference, a very present help in time of trouble. I remember all too well the time when two high school boys, members of the church I was serving in Northern Minnesota, were both killed in a fire at the shop at school, where they were learning how to fix cars. One lived at one end of town, and the other at the opposite. As I went driving from one home to the other, to bring what hope and consolation that I could, I sang, in the car, at the top of my voice "Jesus loves me!", and of course it worked. Because He does...love me...and you.

We sang it with our kids when they were growing up. I sang it with my family when my dad and my mother died. I sing it with our grandkids. It is our song of songs. And, it will be sung at my funeral.

So simple, and yet so profound. Karl Barth, a great theologian who rallied the remnant of the church in Europe during the time of Hitler's rise to power and during WWII, was once asked by a group of students while teaching a class at Princeton after the war, "What is the very heart of the message of the Bible?" And this great man, learned, precise in his theology, rooted in Scripture, replied, with a smile on his face, "Jesus loves me, this I know, for the Bible tells me

Last Monday, after Ramona and I had spent 3 hours with a close friend who now is back at M.B. Anderson hospital in Houston, for a procedure that might give him some more time on earth, made sure that I received this version of THE SONG. It's for us older children.

"Jesus loves me, this I know, "tho my hair is white as snow, though my sight is growing dim, still he bids me trust in Him."

"Though my steps are oh, so slow, with my hand in His I'll go. On through life, let come my way, He'll be there to lead the way." "Though I am no longer young, I have much what He's begun.

Let me serve with Christ a smile, go with others the extra mile. "When the nights are dark and long, and life's victories' been won, He will take me home above, then I'll understand his love."

Chorus: "I love Jesus, does He know? Have I ever told Him so? Jesus loves to hear me say, that I love Him everyday. Yes, I love Jesus. Yes, I love Jesus. Yes, I love Jesus. I tell Him when I pray."

It's a great song. I'm learning it. For everyday, it's my "yes" to Him in response to His "yes" to me...and you. "YES!

The simplest route to Burleson is from Abilene east on I-20 to Ft. Worth. Stay on I-20 to the south (right) to I-35W (south to Waco). Take I-35 to Cleburne Exit (Hwy 174.) Travel about two miles where you will see the Wal-Mart on the left (south). Get into the right lane as Burleson High School and Elk Stadium are on the right (north) side of the highway. Fans should park in the public entrance parking lot. FANS please be aware...if you choose this route, you are likely to encounter rush hour traffic heading south out of Ft. Worth toward Burleson on I-35.

Fans may travel I-20 east to Weatherford and take the Hwy. 171 exit to Cresson. Follow Hwy. 171 to Godley and turn left (east) on Hwy. 917 to Joshua. At Joshua turn left (north) on Hwy. 174 to Burleson. Wal-Mart will be on the south side of the highway and Burleson High School and Elk Stadium are on the north side.

If you choose to travel via Stephenville, stay on Hwy. 67 (to the right) to Glen Rose exit. Take Hwy. 67 to Cleburne. At the first red light in Cleburne turn left (north) and follow Hwy. 174 to Burleson and Elk Stadium (north side of road.)







Millipede Control—Quick & Easy

ing homes and other buildings is literally alive with insects and other arthropods. However, only a relative few insects ever enter buildings, thereby becoming pests. These insects are placed in a group known as occasional invaders. One type of occasional invader is the millipede.

Millipedes require a high level of moisture to survive. They are typically found in leaf litter, mulch beds, firewood piles, compost heaps and loose soil in flower beds. Millipedes feed on organic debris found in their living environment and overwinter in the soil.

In areas where millipedes have been able to thrive, they cause homeowners many problems since they have a tendency to migrate en masse from one location to another. There is nothing more disconcerting to a homeowner than to encounter a virtual sea of hundreds of thousands of milli-

The environment surround- often occur in the fall when the insect is searching for a more attractive overwintering site. During heavy rains, when breeding sites become flooded, this pest will migrate toward higher ground. As millipedes migrate, they will crawl up, over and into anything in their path. This includes buildings. Millipedes can squeeze through very small cracks and will invade crawl spaces, basements, garages and the living areas of homes. Because building interiors are quite dry, the millipedes soon die after entering.

The control of millipedes around most structures is usually quite simple. Controlling mass migrations takes a great deal of effort and generally meets with varying degrees of success. The ideal and most lasting method for controlling millipedes is to remove the items in which the millipedes are breeding. Firewood must be stored off the ground and as pedes rising out of the pasture far from the structure as posand beginning a march on their sible. Leaf litter, grass clippings, and tree branches must Millipede migrations most be raked, picked up and disposed of on a regular basis.

Periodic applications of a barrier treatment with a residual insecticide will provide satisfactory control of millipedes. A wettable powder or microencapsulated insecticide is the most effective formulation to use. Knox Out 2FM and Ficam W are examples of insecticides which are effective against millipedes. The application should be made as a barrier treatment up to 10 feet away from the foundation.

Any cracks or holes in the exterior of the structure should be treated with a residual dust insecticide and then the cracks should be sealed with a quality caulking material. Pay particular attention to cracks around windows and door-

Applications of a wettable powder or microencapsulated insecticide using a compressed air sprayer should be made to areas in the garage or basement where millipedes are found. Unfortunately, total control of a millipede migration is not often feasible.




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
