





Sinusitis

early everyone has experienced a sinus problem. A stuffy head with pain and pressure around the face are common symptoms of sinusitis due to colds, allergies, or a sensitivity to airborne pollutants.

Sinusitis—an infection of the sinuses—can be classified as acute, which means that it comes on suddenly, often right after an upper respiratory infection such as a cold or flu. Or sinusitis can be chronic, meaning that it is an ongoing problem. In either case, when discomfort of sinusitis is severe or the symptoms persist, a comprehensive medical examination with appropriate treatment is recommended.



"It is a good thing to give thanks unto the Lord and to sing his praises unto Thy name O Pastor Jim most high" says the psalmist in Psalm 92:1. Our early American leaders thought so, too. The first Thanksgiving was decreed by Governor Bradford in 1621 to commemorate the Pilgrims' har-

vest. George Washington proclaimed November 26, 1789 as a national day of Thanksgiving. Abraham Lincoln named it a national Harvest Festival on November 26, 1861. After that, each year the President proclaimed the holiday as did the governors of each state. Finally, in 1941, Congress passed a bill naming the 4th Thursday of each November as Thanksgiving Day. It is a national holiday, just like the 4th of July, and Veteran's Day, and Memorial Day, and Labor Day. As far as I know the only other nation that has designated a Day of Thanksgiving to God is Canada.

It is a good thing to give thanks. The Apostle Paul wrote that we should be "always and for everything give thanks in the name of our Lord Jesus to God the Father." (Ephesians 5:20) That's not always easy to do, but those who have learned to do so can pray like Adelaide Procter.

"I thank Thee, God, that all our joy is touched with pain, that shadows fall on brightest hours, that thorns remain; so that earth's bliss may be our guide, and not our chain. We thank Thee, Lord, that Thou hast kept the best in store; We have enough, but not too much to long for more...a yearning for a deeper peace, not known before." A prayer like this requires a life that truly lives in the Presence of God.

In fact, in Psalm 100 we read, "Enter his gates with thanksgiving, and his courts with praise! Give thanks to Him, bless His name!" Giving thanks is the way we get in to the Presence of God. And coming into the Presence of God brings the peace and the love of God Himself. Even in the most terrible of times. Like the 30 years war, 1618-1648. Some historians have described it as the most devastating in all of history

Germany was the battleground. The war was between Protestant and Catholic forces from various countries throughout Europe. They did their fighting in Germany. In those 30 years the German population dwindled from 16 million to 6 million. At the outset of this dreadful bloodshed, a young pastor, Martin Rinkart, was called to serve as the pastor of the state Lutheran Church in his home town of Eilenberg.

Eilenberg was a walled city, and because it afforded some protection, it became a frightfully overcrowded refuge for political and military refugees from near and far. During the war years several waves of deadly diseases and famines swept through the city. The various armies marched through the town leaving death and destruction in their wake. The plague of 1637 was especially severe. At its worst time, Rinkart was the only minister remaining to care for the sick and the dying. It is said that during the course of that year he buried over 10,000 people!

And yet, in this most devastating, depressing time, full of grief and sorrow, he wrote this hymn:

"Now thank we all our God with hearts and hand and voices, Who wondrous things hath done, in whom His world rejoices; Who from our mothers' arms hath blessed us in our way with countless gifts of love, and still is ours today.

O may this bounteous God thru all our life be near us, with every joyful hearts and blessed peace to cheer us; and keep us in His grace, and guide us when perplexed, and free us from all ills in this world and the next.

All praise and thanks to God the father now be given, the Son and Him who reigns with Them in highest heaven-The one eternal God whom earth and heaven adorefor thus it was, is now, and shall be evermore. Amen."

It is good to give thanks to the Lord! On Thanksgiving Day, and every day!

So...do it...in all circumstances, and receive the blessing of His peace and His presence. You might even sing "Now thank we all our God" or read it our loud. It will bless you. For that is what Thanksgiving is for. For you, and me...and God.



### **Directions to** Elk Stadium in Burleson

north side. If you choose to travel via Stephenville, stay on Hwy. 67 (to the right) to Glen Rose exit. Take Hwy. 67 to Cleburne. At the first red light in Cleburne turn left (north) and follow Hwy. 174 to Burleson and Elk Stadium (north side of road.)







### Mutual Funds vs. Stocks -Which should you choose?

If you've been investing for found driving recklessly in the a while, you've probably been exposed to both stocks and mutual funds.  Affordability — It doesn't take much money to invest in mutual funds. In fact, you can set up a bank authorization to Your investment professional automatically invest as little as can help you evaluate your situ-\$25 per month in some funds. Thus, it's easy to invest in a variety of mutual funds which will further diversify your portfolio.

Advantages of Stocks Potential for bigger gains

- If you own an individual stock, and it doubles in price, then you've made a 100 percent profit. But if your mutual fund owns that same stock, the overall value of the fund may only increase slightly, if at all. However, the price of your single stock also could drop by half. If this same stock were in a mutual fund, the drop would not result in such a drastic decline in the fund's net asset value.

 Lower investment costs— When you buy a mutual fund, you may have to pay a sales charge - also known as a "load" — along with operating expenses, which include management fees and 12b-1 fees (to cover marketing costs). Together, these charges can reduce your overall return. But when you buy a stock, you typically pay only a one-time commission — and the same is true when you sell the stock. Consequently, more of your money is working for you.

 Greater control over taxes — Mutual fund managers constantly buy and sell securities to boost the performance of their funds. Although you have no control over these trades, they may have tax consequences for you, in the form of capital gains. But when you buy a stock, you're also the one who will decide when to sell it. Therefore, you'll control when you pay taxes on your gains.

As with any type of investment, stocks and mutual funds carry risks, including the potential loss of principal. It's important to understand these risks, as well as the potential benefits, before you invest. ation to determine if mutual funds and stocks are suitable for you. Ultimately, you may find that a combination of funds and stocks will help you meet your long-term goals.


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

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
# Winters Blizzards — 2002 Area Champions






RUSTY JACKSON turns upfield after catching the pass. Jackson had 7 catches for 63 yards and one touchdown.
