The First Baptist Church of Winters choir and cast will present Christmas Musical on Sunday, December 15, at 6 p.m.


"An Olde Fashioned Christmas" will take everyone "back to yester-year" when things were done at a slower pace and people had time to get together and share the joys of Christmas.

Let me tell you "the why", at tell you where these places are.



Graveside services were held Monday, December 9, 2002 at the Garden of Memories Cemetery in Ballinger under the direction of Rains-Seale Funeral Home.





It seems a bit odd that I should be writing a column on high school football this close to Pastor Jim Christmas. But then Winters hasn't had a team get this far in Hanson a long long time. And Ramona and I are happy for the team and the coaches, the school, and the whole community.

Now, don't get me wrong. I haven't heard anybody say to me, "What's all this fuss about high school football? It is no better than the band, or girl's basketball, or dramatics or any of the extracurricular activities. I think there is far too much energy and effort put into football." But just in case there is somebody out there thinking that, I would like to write a few words in defense of high school football...even if these playoff games do raise problems with our Christmas schedules.

First of all, I am thankful for high school football because I played the game. In Brookings, South Dakota. And it did me a world of good. In fact it helped me to become a man. It was a rite of passage for me.

To be sure, I got hurt, physically. I had a hairline fracture in my left leg. I messed up my knee. And, to this day my right shoulder doesn't work quite right. It is a school of hard knocks, for sure. But it teaches you some priceless things. Like perseverence, or "hanging in there." Like, "winners never quit and quitters never win." Like "hold that line" when your opponent is on your one yard line. Like endurance. Like getting in shape: physically, mentally, and spiritually.

It takes good coaches to make a good team. Character builders. I had a great coach in high school. Every fall, when the first practice started, he gave a talk. In it he said three things:

1. Everyone who goes out will get a chance to prove himself. No one has a position assured him. If you started last year, you will have to prove to me that you are the best man for that position. I don't play favorites. And he didn't.

2. You are not to smoke tobacco...or chew. You are not to drink any liquor in season or any time! You are to be home and in bed by 10 p.m. during the week, and 11 p.m. on weekends. One of his first actions after coming to town was to kick off two seniors, both of whom had been "all-staters" in basketball the year before, for smoking. The school board had to call a special meeting because many of the locals thought that was just "going too far." Fortunately, the superintendent and board stood behind the coach. And the very next year his basketball team won the state championship, and the next three years after that won the state football championship.

3. Champions are gentlemen. They respect others. Especially the referees on the field or the court. I am here to help you to learn to play the sport. I will show you how. But that's not the final goal. I want you to become men. I don't want you to cuss or swear. Every time you do in practice, just remove yourself from the practice and run one lap around the track (440 yards), and when you have finished your lap go right back into your position. No rest for the wicked!

Guy Slimp #55 - OL/LB: I'm not satisfied. This feels good but it can be better.


Steven Cuevas #60 - OL/DT: Like a dream come true. I never thought we'd make history. Now we've set the mark to beat.

Looking back in history: the incredible 1962 Blizzards **Ouarterfinal Championship first in WHS history**

The team of 1962 . . .

Winters Enterprise Editor Dick Thomas wrote, "This is the season when heads roll."

Winters played Ballinger on November 16 for the district title and the "Runnels County Championship." The Blizzards beat the Bearcats 12-0.

Winters went on to beat Olney and Crane in playoff action.

A semi-truck was used as a billboard to boost the Blizzards in their quest for the quarterfinal title at Midland on December 7. The truck, furnished by Pan American Sales, was parked at Patterson's Humble Station on N. Main.

Schools dismissed at noon and the Enterprise reported "Winters will close for quarterfinals grid game."

Editor Thomas wrote of "the history-making Winters High School Blizzard football team 12 win over Denver City.

He stated, "This makes thir-Blizzards, from the little town that no one had ever heard of. Several firsts happened (against Denver City). No one but Denver City had been able to score more than one touchdown against the Blizzards, but Denver City had not been held to just two TDs either, in their previous games. But the main first is that for the first time, the Winters Blizzards are in the semifinals."

Going into the semifinal championship, Winters and Jacksboro were the only two undefeated, untied, Class 2A teams in the state. The Blizzards lost that heartbreaking the state title the next week by battle against Jacksboro on two a score of 52-0.



















