The Winters Junior Livestock Show Association will host their annual Livestock Show on Saturday at the Winters Show Complex off of the Novice Highway.

Local exhibitors will show rabbits, sheep and lambs, goats, swine, heifers and steers. Showmanship will be held in most divisions.

All animals must be in the barn by 6 p.m., Friday, January 3, 2003 for weigh-in and registration paper checks. The show will begin at 9 a.m. on Saturday.

A Little Britches Pig Show will be held before the lunch break at approximately 11:45 a.m. Youth ages toddler through the second grade who do not exhibit in the show are invited to participate. Parents must register participants prior

to the event. Following a lunch break,

the show will conclude with the heifer and market steer shows beginning at approximately 1 p.m. All animals will be released at the end of the

Buckles, banners and ribbons will be awarded to those who place. Winters exhibitors will show in the Runnels County Junior Livestock Show in Ballinger the next weekend, January 9, 10 & 11. An auction will be held at the conclusion of this show, and all exhibitors will receive money for one animal project.

A full concession stand will be available at the Winters Show and will offer a lunch deal on Saturday. Admission to the show is free and the public is invited to attend.



As we have discussed before, natural gas is typically more of a regional product due to transportation limitations. This contrasts with crude oil which is a worldwide commodity that is moved wherever in the world it is needed.

By virtue of this regional limitation, natural gas prices reflect regional supply, not worldwide supply. But, LNG being shipped thousands of miles changes this equation.

Now, with LNG being a significant factor in the domestic gas market at selected arrival points (the northeast, Louisiana, California), prices could see some downward pressure.

But, let's look at the domestic supply picture. There are some clues that point to some equalizing events that may mitigate this negative price influence.

First domestic consumption remains strong and may increase with the current eco- Taylor County nomic recovery. There is a very sensitive price point for natural gas consumed by industry. Currently, there is a good balance between price CSL, A-71. and supply for manufacturers and electricity generators (the main industrial consumption sources) that have the ability to switch fuels (between natural gas and coal or fuel oil). As a result, the trend is for continued strong consumption.

Additionally, natural gas [exports to Mexico continue to grow. Despite some problems in the Mexican economy, there appears to be no negative im-



City Manager shares project plans at Community Forum

Winters City Administrator Aref Hassan participated in the Community Forum meeting on December 18, at the WISD ad-. ministration office.

Dr. Hassan reminded the group that the federal government requires a Master Plan before approving any federal funding. According to Hassan, the City's first Master Plan was approved in June of 1994. A revision of this Master Plan was required and approved on August 15, 2002.

In his report presented at the forum, Hassan listed some of the City's capital improvement projects for 2002, which fall into three categories of completed, in process, and pending.

One completed project is the newly renovated Community

Projects in process are the airport improvements, Main Street sidewalks and WISD sidewalks.

Pending projects are the STEP grant, Rogers Hornsby Park and ball field, and a soccer field.



He was born August 20, 1918, in Winters, Texas.

Mr. Baker was retired from the United States Army 90th Division - "Tough Ombres." He landed on Utah Beach on D-Day. Upon returning to Texas following World War II, he was elected mayor of Winters before he came to the Uni-



versity of Texas to major in Pharmacology. He managed Renfro Rexall Drugstore No. 6 on Burnet Road from 1950 to 1962 when he joined the Texas State Board of Control. He retired as a Senior Purchaser in 1983.

Skeeter's tremendous love of God, family, friends, country, and community was evident in his generosity, loyalty, and compassion. He tirelessly devoted his life to going wherever he was needed, doing whatever was needed. He proudly served as a Master Mason and Past Master of Live Oak Lodge # 304 in Kyle, Texas. 

The "in" word, all over the place, is "change." Politicians say "It's time for a change." Every year the automobile manufacturers "change" their cars for a "new model." Furniture people tell us to change the looks of our living room by

buying a new chair. Or "whatever." Hair styles change every year. Clothes the same.

Of course, all of these changes are on the "outside." They have nothing to do with that which we all need to change. Our "insides." Our minds. Our thought world. Our perspective. As long as we are hooked with our "self-centered self," no amount of external change will help. We'll still be stuck with the "same old self on the same old me."

The prophets of the Old Testament times had a word for an "inner change." The word is "repentance." Which means "change your mind." The first words of Jesus public ministry according to the Gospel of Mark are "Repent, for the Kingdom of God is at hand."

It isn't an easy thing to do. The "Big I" as my aunt used to call it, doesn't like to release its hold on us. And it is very persistent. Just about the time you think you've got it licked, it rises up with new vigor. It's part of our nature and it requires a supernatural solution. Only God can forgive us, and release us from our bondage to self, to sin.

It's time. For America to humble itself, and repent. It's time for you and me to examine ourselves in light of what God wants instead of just what I want. It's time for us to change. Our minds, our thoughts. The place where we make decisions.

The first step, of course, is confession of our own sins. Not to confess the sins of others. But ours. To take a moral inventory. That's what New Year's used to be. All over the world. Not Bowl games, ad nauseam. And ask for forgiveness. That makes the slate clean, the soul slate. And then the second step... to change what we think about, what we ponder.

The apostle Paul has a great list: "Whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable, if anything is excellent or praiseworthy, think about these things." (Philippians 4:8) Copy this text. Put it on the bathroom mirror, Read it outloud. And train

"Be a new and different person. Filled with His love. And filled with the Holy Spirit. With a freshness. And a newness... be new!" These words are part of an anthem written by a great choir director, now gone to sing in the heavenly choir. Paul J. Christiansen was his name. Two of our boys sang in his choir, the Concordia College Choir of Moorhead, Minnesota. I can still hear it singing in my well. Echoing. Over and over.

It is a New Year's song. For you and for me and for everybody. And, the "whatever" passage from the apostle.

"Whatever" is often used when we can't or won't be exact. But not Paul. He is very exact. This word and this passage took on a brand new meaning for me this past year. A good friend, a classmate from college and seminary, died after a 10-year bout with cancer. At his funeral, the man he ministered with preached this text, and used it to describe my good friend Milton. For Milton was that kind of person. Wow!

So this year, and every day of your life, become a new and different person! Become a "Whatever!"... not only for now, but for ever. And ever! Hallelujah! Happy New Year!


