The looming budget deficit in the state or exas is causing cuts costs, and those of us in he oil and gas business may
be impacted in a very unique
way. Some are proposing that the Railroad Commission (RRC) be merged with other oversight boards in state government, including the
While this
While this is not a new idea, taken more seriously than it ever has been before. Combine with the decreasing influence of the oil and gas business in the state's economy, and the stars may be aligned for a big


Then again, maybe not. Make no mistake, there will agencies to save money. And for sure, the oil business doesn't carry as big a stick as
it once did. it once did.
Half a century ago, oil and gas paid for most of the bills for everthing from education to tech and sales taxes carry more lech and sales taxes carry more
of the load. As a result, state legislators are much less likely o genuflect when a petroleum lobbyist enters the room.
And, it may be prudent to
combine some of the duties of combine some of the duties of the RRC into what other agencies are already doing. After have such a narrow range of duties that they sometimes pick miniscule areas of the industry (does promoting natural gas powered scooters ring a bell?).
It will likely not get through he legislature because of ine iia, pride, and turf issues.
