Communications to install equipment on the tower to furnish high speed internet service in Ballinger. As lease payment on the tower, Texas Communications will furnish \$300 worth of internet services per month to three county loca-

Charles McDonald talked with the Court about the provision of sanitation services for the County. McDonald told Commissioners he was licensed by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (formerly the TNRCC) to be a designated representative to assist the County if they became an Authorized Agent for enforcement of rules regarding septic tanks and cesspools in the county.

Runnels County Commis- Texas is moving toward forcservices in order to free up TCEQ inspectors. New laws The agreement allows Texas require septic systems to be installed by licensed installers and inspected for compliance with state rules. McDonald would be paid a fee for the service.

Because Commissioner Keith Collom was not present for the meeting because of illness, Commissioner Skipper Wheeless moved to table action on the proposal to a later date. The motion was approved unanimously.

Administrators plan January 30 meeting with junior high parents to address high failure rate

Due to a 57% failure rate in the Winters Junior High School, Winters Secondary Principal David Hale and WISD Superintendent Danny Clack have called a special meeting of all Winters Junior High School parents. The meeting is scheduled for Thursday, January 30, 2003, at 6:30 p.m. in the WHS Auditorium, and ALL parents of junior high students are encouraged

Clack and Hale are deeply concerned about the failure rate in the seventh and eighth grades and are asking for parental support in dealing with this issue. Following the second nine weeks grading period, 66 of the 116 students in the junior high school were failing at least one course. Forty-five of those students are failing more than one subject, a majority of which are failing two and three subjects.

Clack said, "We need to address this problem now, and we need to start with parental support." Clack and Hale hope to garner valuable input and suggestions from parents in dealing with this situation. In turn, they also intend to offer suggestions to parents to reinforce the need to complete homework and study for exams during afterschool hours.

"Our teachers have intensified their curriculum to better prepare the students for the newly implemented TAKS test which begin this spring. These tests are more difficult than testing has ever been—and our kids won't pass certain grade levels if they don't pass these exams. Our teachers are feeling the pressure to have them ready.

"I believe a lot of this (failing courses) is due to inattention See JUNIOR HIGH, page 6

Runnels County site of rabies vaccine airdrop

Runnels County was one of 36 West-Central Texas counties recently involved in the Texas Department of Health (TDH) Oral Rabies Vaccination Program (ORVP).

According to Guy Moore, assistant director of the program, the drops took place between Thursday, January 16, 2003 and Wednesday, January 22, 2003. The program covers a very large area of West-Central Texas extending from the Big Bend National Park, east to Junction and north to the Abilene area.

Since 1995, the Texas program has been responsible for the distribution of 17.5 million individual doses of oral rabies vaccine over 255,500 square miles of South and West-Central Texas. The aerial distribution of vaccine occurs during January of each year, involves approximately 250 separate flights by four "King Air" aircraft from Dynamic Aviation Group, Inc., and annually results in a total flight distance equaling approximately three to four times around the world.

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

Pastor's Points

Why I am Pro-Choice

This week marks the 30th anniversary of the Supreme Court's decision to legalize abortion. The decision, known as Roe V. Wade, created a firestorm of debate that has lasted until this day. As for me? In the words of another minister, Tom Nelson, put me down as pro-choice - "let the kid make the choice." Letting the child in the womb make the decision of living or dying is the ultimate example of pro-choice. Here are three rea-

First, scripture supports this view. The Bible speaks of the majesty of pre-born children. The Psalmist celebrates how he was fearfully and wonderfully made-knit by God in his mother's womb (Ps. 139: 13-16). Luke, along with Elizabeth, did not view the child in Elizabeth's womb as a fetus. They viewed that life as a baby (Luke 1:44). While I fully understand that these passages were not written as primers on the issue of abortion, they reveal to us both the instinctive and chosen attitudes that these people of God held.

Secondly, let the children choose because the cost of abortion for the surviving parents is high. A great myth exists that men and women pass through the trauma of abortion unscathed. Research has shown, and I have professionally observed, that pain is inextricably connected to abortion. Abortion providers do their best to portray it as just another lifestyle choice. However, something mystical occurs to a father when he encourages the mother to end the life of his child, or to a mother who submits herself to the trauma of the actual event. Making abortion legal has indeed sterilized instruments of medicine, but it has not sterilized the conscience. Countless women begin their days mentally calculating the age of their children who were not allowed to enter the world. Numerous men grieve over lost sons and daughters.

To bring children into the world is not an act of punishment to parents. It is an act of humanity that enables them to live

Finally, let the children choose because we, at heart, are optimists. Over the past thirty years, we have lost forty million lives due to abortion. Those decisions bring consequences.

Would our social security problem exist of abortion had not been legalized? Who knows how many great athletes we will not cheer, how many artists whose paintings we will not see, how many singers we will not hear, and how many inventions we will not enjoy because of abortion? Could one of the forty million we lost have cured cancer? A.I.D.S.?

Paul Harvey writes that years ago, a young, unmarried teen-ger named Caterina placed herself in a situation where many would consider abortion. She was preghant. The father was long gone. Hopes were dim. Yet Caterina brought her baby into the world. Had she not done so, the world would have been denied the scientific and artistic genius of Leonardo de Vinci.

To allow children their choice in entering the world is at heart,



Some 1.8 million dog-food based baits containing an oral rabies vaccine were dropped from specially-equipped planes flying at 500 feet. Each bait/vaccine unit weighs approximately 24 grams and measures 1.25 x 1.25 x .75 inches. The target animal ruptures the plastic sachet with its teeth resulting in oral exposure to the vaccine.






