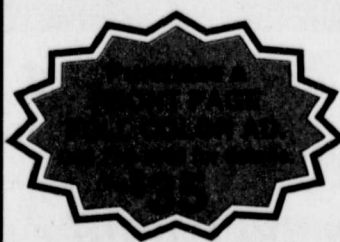

Rusty Jackson and Shane Colburn, along with alternate Guy Slimp, will compete on June 14 in the annual Fellowship of Christian Athletes Myrtle Greathouse All-Star Football Classic.

The showcased game will begin at 8 p.m. at Shotwell Stadium in Abilene.

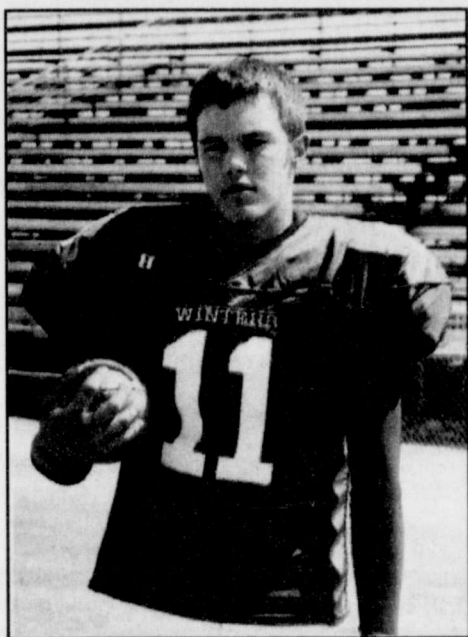
The game is named in memory of Greathouse, an Abilene oilman and a member of the Texas High School Football Hall of Fame.

More than 80 players from all sizes of schools within 100 miles of Abilene were chosen in March to the North and South squads. Players reported for two-a-

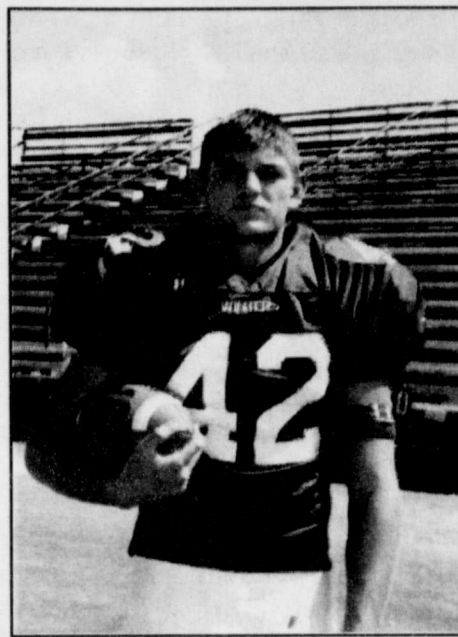
day workouts on June 3.

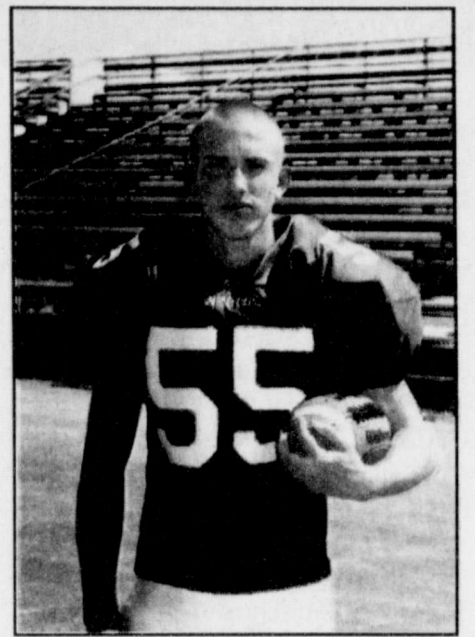
Both outstanding players received All-District honors, All-State honors, and numerous area awards.

The County Stock Show Association is finalizing plans to host the First Annual Runnels County Gala on Saturday, August 9, 2003 at St. Joseph's Catholic Church Parish Hall in Rowena. The event will be held from 6 p.m. to midnight.

**BALLINGER**—O.B. Boone, Sr., 87, passed away Wednesday, May 28, 2003, in Runnels County Rehabilitation and Nursing Center at Ballinger.

He was born November 17, 1915, at Fort Chadbourne, Coke County, Texas, to Media Henderson Boone and Bigham Bob Boone. His father was a blacksmith, and he traveled extensively with his father's work throughout Northwest and Central West Texas. He married Frances Sovey on July 5, 1936, in Stamford, where they resided for over 49 years.

Mr. Boone worked as a welder in his father's shop and later in his own shop, Boone's Welding Shop, in Stamford for many years until his retirement.

Due to his health, he moved to Ballinger, Runnels County, in 1995 and has been a resident of Runnels County Rehabilitation and Nursing Center since moving to Ballinger.

He was preceded in death by his wife of 49 years, Frances, in November 1985; his parents; two brothers, J.D. Boone and Wallie Boone; one sister, Nora Williams; and one granddaughter, Reece Holden Leach.

Survivors include four children and their spouses, Bob Boone and wife Linda of Ballinger, Betty Bushong and husband Bob of Midland, JoAnn Head and husband C.W. of Sweetwater, and O.B. 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## NOTICE OF GAS RATE INCREASE REQUEST

TXU Gas Company (the "Company"), in accordance with the Gas Utility Regulatory Act as set forth in the Texas Utilities Code, hereby gives notice of its intent to implement a new schedule of rates for natural gas service to be charged to all of the customers served by the Company in the incorporated municipalities and unincorporated areas in the Company's statewide gas utility system (the "System"). The proposed revisions to the respective rate schedules will impact all classes of service and all fees and charges presently being assessed by the Company on its transmission and distribution systems. As of the filing date of the Company's Statement of Intent to change rates, the proposed rates are expected to approximately produce a \$69,524,311 or a 7.24 percent increase in the Company's annual revenues from customers in the System. The proposed change will affect approximately 1,344,030 residential, 125,603 commercial, and 1,441 industrial sales and transportation customers in the System. The proposed change constitutes a "major" change as that term is defined by Section 104.101 of the Texas Utilities Code. The proposed changes will have differing impacts on individual customers, depending on consumption and current applicable rate schedules. The proposed changes in rates will not become effective for environs customers until similar changes have become effective within the nearest incorporated city or town. A residential customer receiving a bill for 6 Mcf will see a bill of approximately \$41.69, which would constitute an average increase of approximately \$3.59 per month or a 9.4% increase. A commercial customer receiving a bill for 30 Mcf will see a bill of approximately \$173.04, which would constitute an average increase of approximately \$13.91 per month or a 8.7% increase. The effect of the proposed changes to rates and services for industrial sales and transportation customers, which may be significant for individual customers, will vary depending on type of service and consumption. The proposed change would constitute an increase of \$0.00 or a 0% increase in annual revenues to the Company for industrial sales and transportation customers. A complete copy of the Statement of Intent, filed with the Railroad Commission of Texas and all of the System cities and towns on May 23, 2003, is available for inspection in the Company business office located at 1601 Bryan St., Dallas, Texas 75201. Persons with specific area questions or who want information about this filing may contact TXU Gas Company at 1-800-460-3030. Any affected persons located inside of the city limits of a municipality served by the Company may file written comments or protest concerning the proposed change in rates with their respective municipality. Any affected persons located outside of the city limits of a municipality served by the Company may file written comments or protest concerning the proposed change in rates with Docket Services Section of the Legal Division, Railroad Commission of Texas, P.O. Box 12967, Austin, Texas 78711-2967, but have a limited time to do so. Pursuant to the Rules of the Railroad Commission of Texas, Title 16 of the Texas Administrative Code Section 7.230, any affected persons may file written comments or a protest concerning the proposed change in the environs rates with the Docket Services Section of the Railroad Commission of Texas, at any time within 30 days following the date on which the change would or has become effective. The Company is proposing to have these proposed rates become effective on June 27, 2003.

### Let's make a joyful noise!

Psalms 150:6—"Let everything that has breath praise the Lord."

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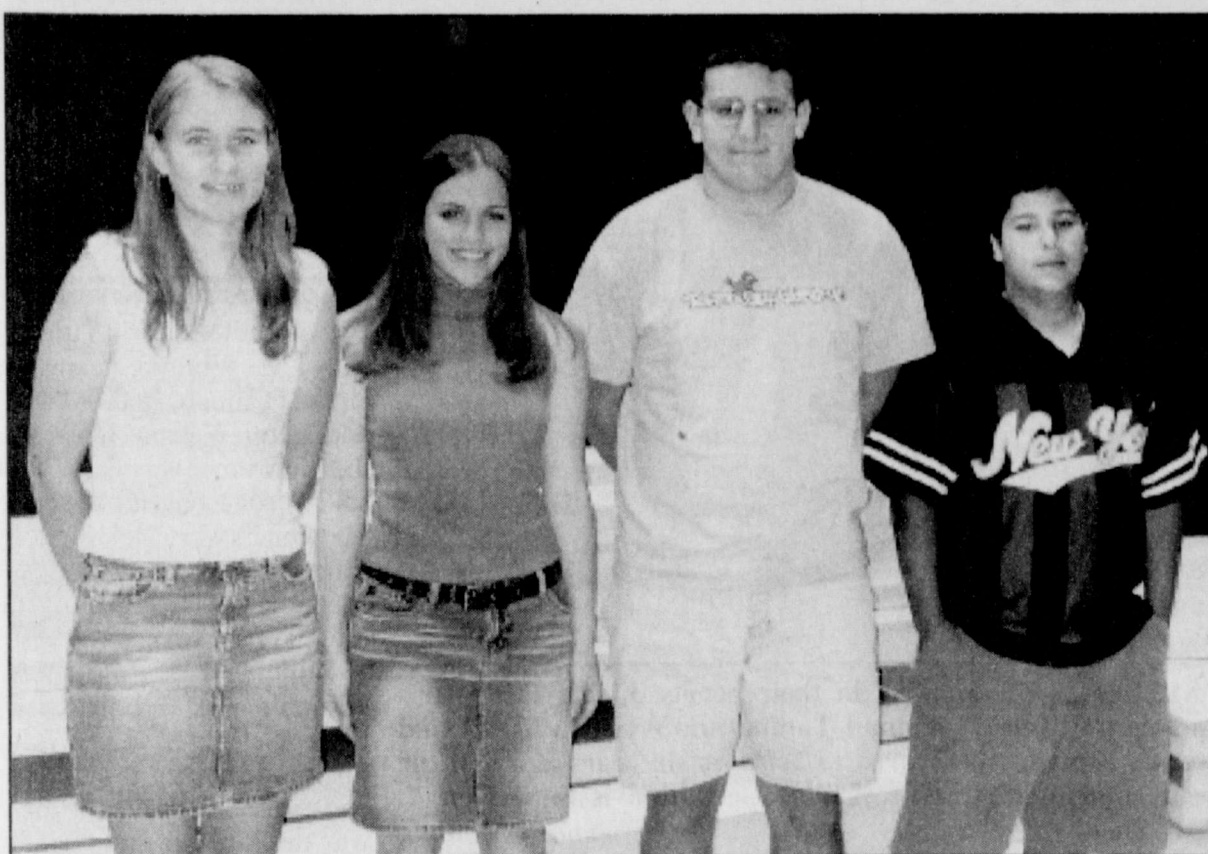

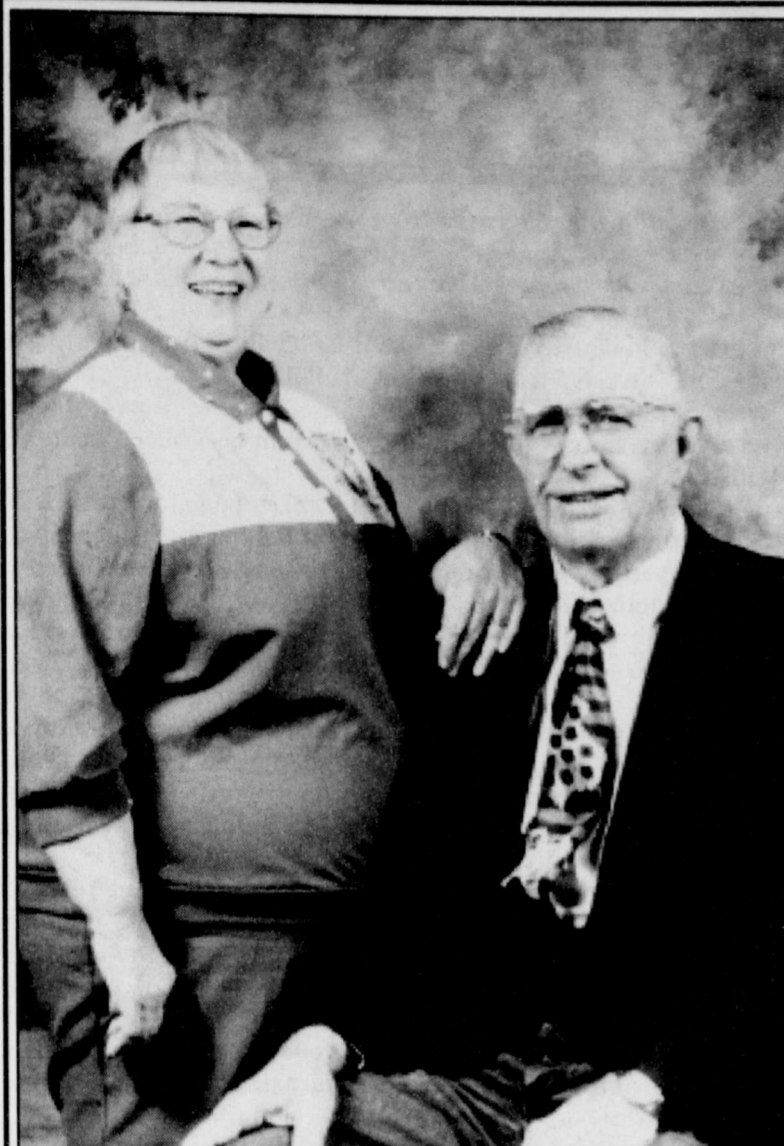

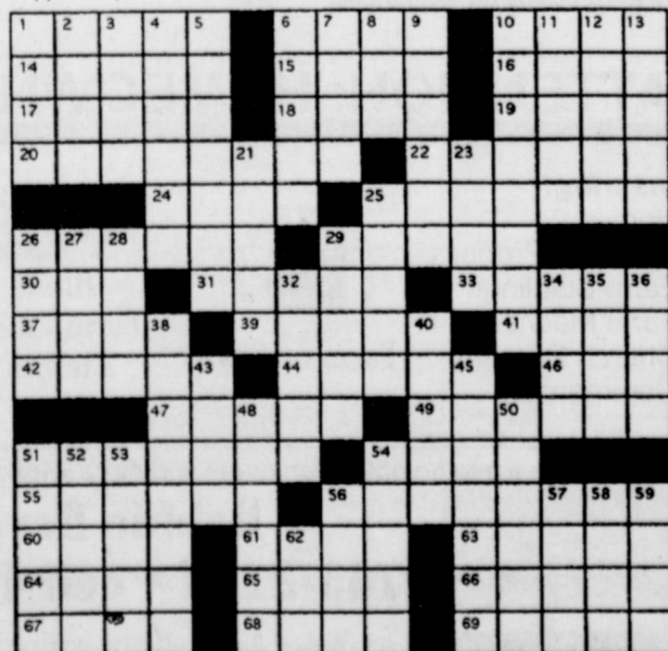

## Police Beat

The following are cases from the Winters Police Department. Some cases may still be under investigation. Information, reported through Crimestoppers leading to the close of any case, could result in up to a \$1,000 reward.

## Ag scholarships available

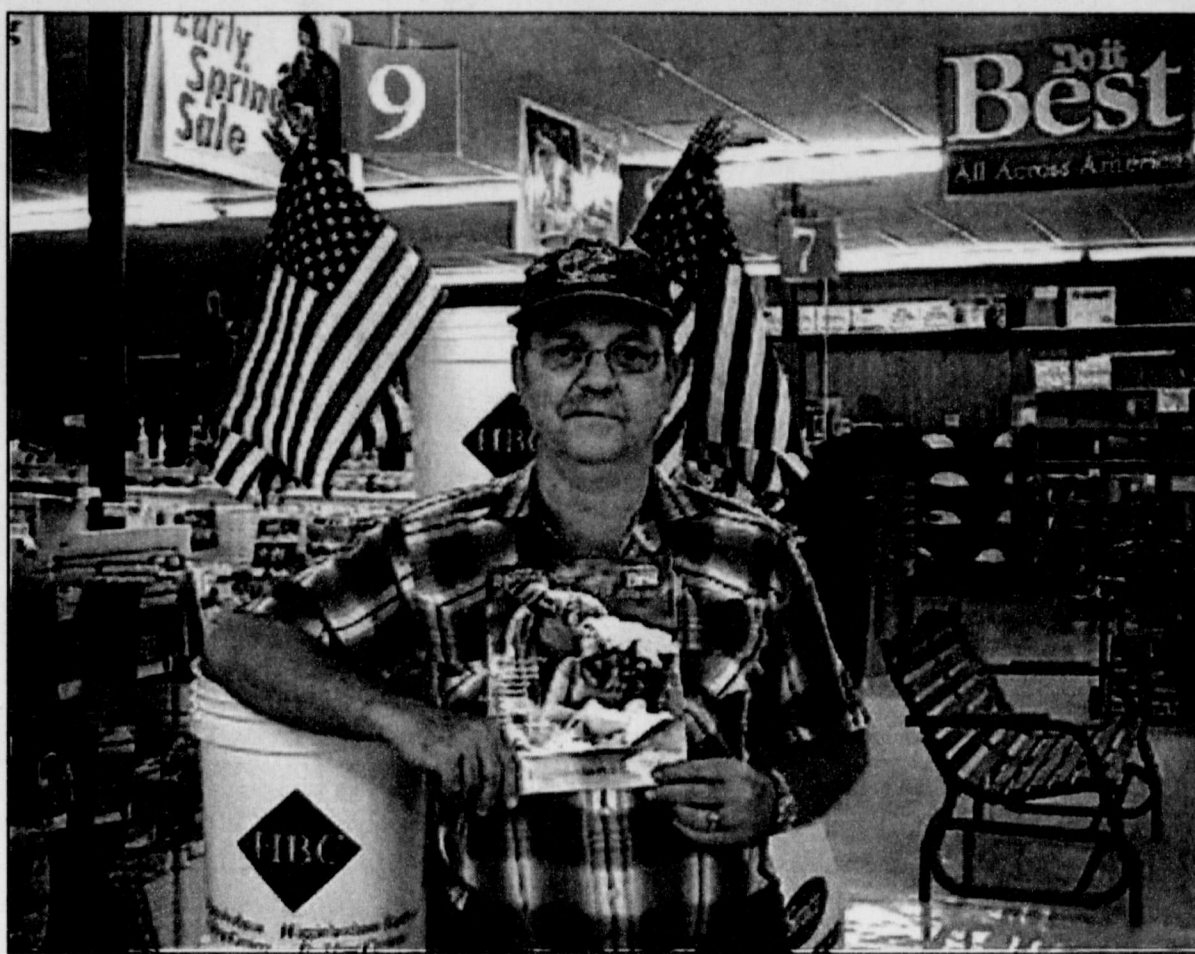
The West Texas Agricultural Chemicals Institute is now accepting applications for academic scholarships.

## Conservation News

### Environmental Quality Incentives Program available

Farmers and ranchers in Runnels County have until June 13, 2003, to make application for participation in the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) funded through the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS). These funds are part of the conservation provisions contained in the 2002 Farm Bill.

Eligible program participants may apply for cost-share assistance for eligible conservation practices that address the natural resource concerns identified by the Local Work Group. In Runnels County, the resource concern in water quantity.

Conservation practices applicable for cost share to address this resource concern include terraces as the high priority practice in Runnels County and brush management as the medium priority practice in the county. Producers will go through a screening and ranking process to determine which applications will be funded, based on the selection criteria set up by the local work group.

Cost-share rates for financial assistance have been set at 40% for general signup participants and first time farmers and ranchers and 45% cost shares

are available to limited resource producers.

Additionally, funding is available to address statewide natural resource concerns including animal feeding operations, wildlife habitat, water quality, and invasive species. Runnels County producers in the eastern two-thirds of the county are available to apply for statewide money addressing bobwhite quail habitat improvement through a prescribed grazing management incentive contract. Producers could be eligible for a 6-year contract that will pay \$3.00 for two years and \$4.00 for one year that includes two full years deferral from grazing.

Valley Creek producers above Lake Ballinger are also eligible for additional cost share monies to do brush control on rangeland. Depending on the number of requests for brush control, there also could be money available for facilitating practices such as range seeding, fencing, and water development.


