New Band Uniforms To Arrive This Week

The Baird Band Parent Club met Tuesday night in the High School Auditorium. Mr. Ivy, the new band director met with the club, stating that the band would meet Monday morning at 9 o'clock to start the year work.

CROSS PLAINS — Callahan County Pioneers Friday elected Joe Steadham of Austin as their president at their 21st reunion.

Steadham, a former Putnam man and Texas & Pacific Railroad trainman, came to the county in 1898.

They also re-elected Mrs. L. L. Blackburn, Baird, and Oscar Pyeatt, Clyde, first and second vice presidents, respectively, and Mrs. B. L. Boydston, Baird, secretary-treasurer.

Guest speaker was Lewis Nordyke of Amarillo, magazine writer and book author, who was born at Cottonwood in this county. Others who spoke briefly were Meade Griffin, senior associate justice of the Texas Supreme Court; Mayor W. D. Smith of Cross Plains, and Bob Norrell, veteran Baird banker.

Nordyke kept a large outdoor audience on its toes as he gave a history of Callahan County, related how "night riders" and "wet rope" terrorists were wiped out by early settlers. From the older ones in the audience he related how decades ago Christmas holidays were made memorable by Roman candle and skyrocket flights at Cottonwood where he was born and reared. Many came from long distances to listen to the wit, humor and reminiscences of the noted writer.

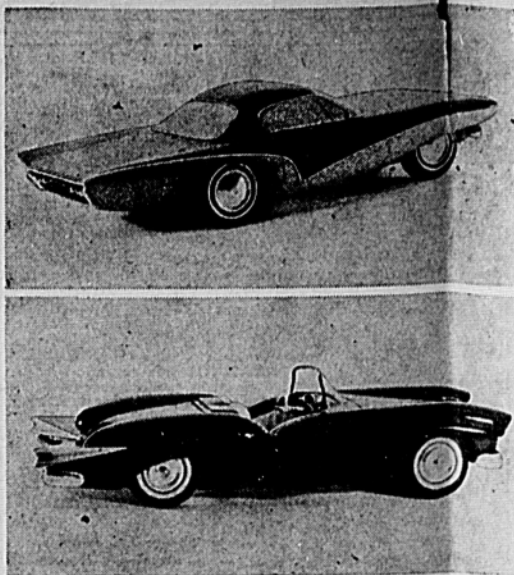

IT'S THE LAW In Texas . . .

Made your will yet? If not, the State of Texas may wind up as owner of your estate upon death. Under our statutes, the estates of persons having no heirs who die intestate revert, or "escheat", to the State.

Such provisions have been carried over from the English common law. There, under such circumstances, the estate escheated to the British crown. The theory of the process is that the sovereign (or State), having been the original owner of all lands before they were parceled out to individuals, is entitled to a return of such lands when the possibilities of legal inheritance have been exhausted.

This idea has been expanded to include personal as well as real estate. It also applies in the case of a person absent for a term of seven years and not known to exist who leaves no heirs and no will.

Presumably, there is hardly a person who does not have some individual or charity that he would prefer to have his estate, rather than it go to the State by default, so to speak. Yet, surprisingly, estates worth thousands of dollars do escheat to the various states from time to time.

Now before you shrug the matter off with the idea that these statutory provisions could not possibly apply to you, better think a minute. Suppose you and your spouse have no heirs besides each other and your children. Many people fall into this category.

In event of a catastrophe resulting in death for you and your entire immediate family, no legal heir would remain. Therefore if you had no will, your property would go to the State. In preparing a will, it is possible to provide for such an eventuality.

In this hypothetical case, you would probably want to designate some friend as executor, to take care of all necessary arrangements and then distribute

the estate according to your wishes.

On the other hand, if you have plenty of possible heirs, a will could be used to designate which of them shall participate in the division of the estate. And even if you wish your property to be distributed entirely in accordance with our statutes of descent and distribution as explained in previous columns, a will can perform useful functions. Among other uses a will could provide for an orderly and economical partition of your property, preventing any waste of the assets by heirs impatient for a settlement.

What happens to property which escheats to the State? Following certain required legal formalities and court proceedings, all escheated lands are apart to the Permanent Free School Fund of the State, and may be leased and sold by the Land Commission under certain regulations. Escheated personal property is sold by the local sheriff under a court writ and the money received therefrom paid into the State Treasury.

Factors Needed To Plan Will
In planning your will, your lawyer will want to know your

true wishes; and then, to help you realize them, he will want to know a few vital facts.

Are you married? Any children or grandchildren? Previously married? Widowed? Your age and those of your beneficiaries? Legal residence? Health?

Why these questions? You'll have to work out your plan in view of the laws governing death taxes, property laws, and, if you are married, separate and community property.

Age? If you wish to set up trusts in the will, your age and those of your beneficiaries may help you decide whether, for example, to use capital of the trust fund as well as its income for the beneficiaries.

Your residence? Most important, since state laws govern many items of personal property.

Do you plan to move to another state? If so, consult its laws. Many people who come to Texas from other states should see that their wills conform to and take advantage of our laws.

Some people live half the year in Texas and half elsewhere. If you do, take steps to nail down your claim to reside in one state or another, to avoid needless litigation and possible claims to taxes in both states.

Your health? If possible, have your will drafted while you are in good health and clear minded.

Contests, though relatively rare in Texas, still do take place. In some cases, for example where non-relatives inherit, it may be a good idea to give reasons for these bequests in your will and to tell why you may have left some relative out (for instance, where a child has been taken care of by gifts or in other ways).

County Agent's News

Farm operators have until September 30 to claim a refund on the Federal gasoline tax on gasoline used on the farm within the year July 1, 1959 to June 30, 1959. If you need a claim form for this purpose it can be secured from the County Agent's Office. The completed claim should be sent to the office of the District Director, Internal Revenue Service, Dallas, Texas.

V. R. Smith of the Fish and Wildlife Service was in Callahan County last week. Mr. Smith and the County Agent put out several demonstrations using strychnine oats to kill jack rabbits. These demonstrations were located at Jack Farmers at Eula, Jim Yarbroughs at Putnam, Gilmer Reese at Scranton, and

Tommy Harris at Cross Plains. This type bait is proving very effective in helping to control jack rabbits.

Heavy rains and high water at Lake Brownwood forced cancellation of the District 8 Boys 4-H Club Camp on July 20-21-22. There are 20 counties in the district and each year approximately 180 boys attend this camp, in the Baptist Encampment at Lake Brownwood. R. G. Russell, District Extension Agent, said this was the first 4-H Club Camp he had ever been forced to cancel or postpone in all his years of Extension work. There were six Callahan boys who were planning to attend this camp.

The six-county 4-H Club Camp was held at Lake Cisco on July 29-30, with the following boys attending from this county: Roy Barbian, Tommy Griffin, Joey Griffin and Clay Barbian, all of Clyde; Noah Smedley and Mac McIntosh of Baird; Randy and Mike Montgomery of Cross Plains; Johnny Lee Rouse and James Isenhower of Putnam and Joe Moore of Sonora. James Isenhower was elected reporter by the entire camp, and Mike Montgomery was elected County delegate to the Camp Council. This group set up the rules of the camp and served as the governing body.

Curley Hays of Abilene had charge of the night program, on the subject of Safety on our Highways and in the home and on the farm. Curley is Agricultural Representative of West Texas Utilities Co. and he does an outstanding job working with boys and girls clubs in West Texas.

Raising Fish Similar To Farm Products

Hatching and raising fish for stocking is similar to planting

and raising farm products for the market, according to the Director of Engineering, Texas Game and Fish Commission.

"Some years we raise large quantities of fish and others we don't do so well," said the director. "It all depends on the weather, insects, diseases, and other factors nearly like those facing the farmer each year."

Various types of insects attack the eggs during spawning, many destroy fry before they can grow, and others cause diseases later after the fish are old enough for stocking.

When insects appear in destructive numbers, fish hatchery attendants treat the water with a mixture of gasoline, kerosene, and oil, which forms a surface coating. The attacking insects require oxygen. When they surface the mixture enters their respiratory system and kills them.

Weather also can be very destructive to fish hatching. When the water temperature gets too low, the male parent sometimes leaves the nest. Since he is needed to protect the eggs, his departure means the loss of eggs. Of course, if the water gets too low, the eggs will freeze.

Like the farmer, the fish hatchery people never know what kind of a crop they will produce until the harvest is ready for stocking ponds and lakes across Texas.

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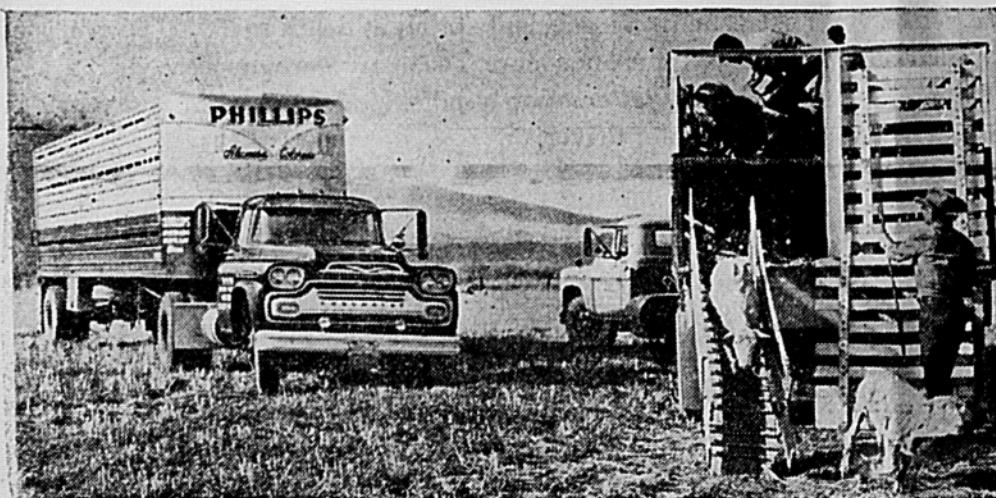

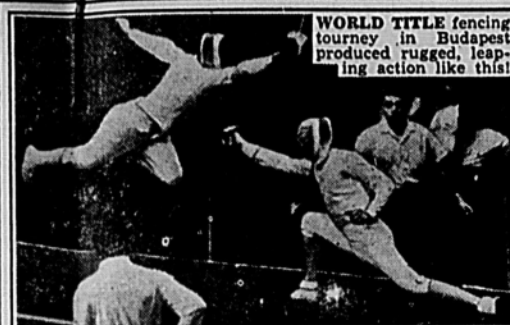

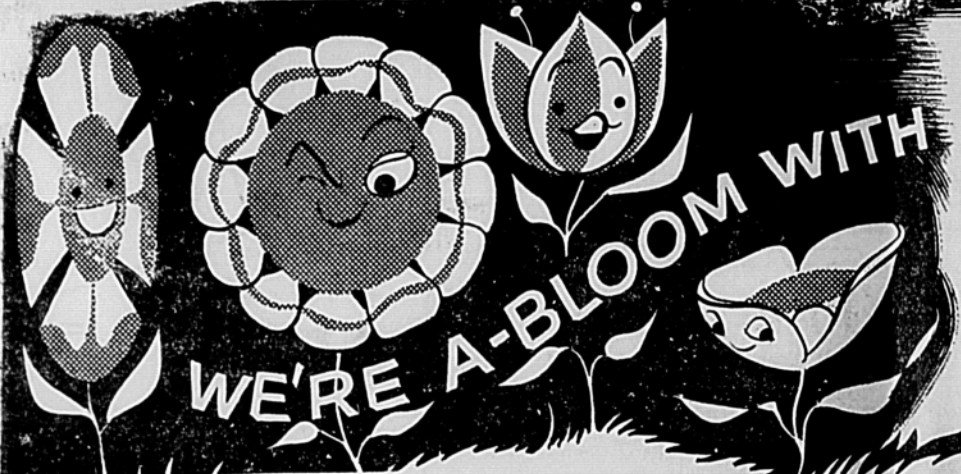
