

Made your will yet? If not, the State of Texas may wind up as owner of your estate upon death. Under our statutes, the estates of persons having no heirs who die intestate revert, or "escheat", to the State. ance with our statutes of descent and distribution as explained in previous columns, a will can perform useful functions. 


