## Local Church Gets Scathing Arraignment in Challenge <br> At Baptist Association

There was prospect for a few joy the fellowship of the churehes minutes for a lively tilt at the opening session of the Runnels County Baptist Association which began its annual session at Valley View church, on Val ley Creek, Tuesday afternoen. The cause of the ripple was a challenge presented by W. D. Jennings of Miles, challenging the right of the Bronte church the right of she Bro
os seat in the bod
The ruling of the moderator that the challenge should be signed by a church rather than an individual, and that the complaint of the challenge was only with reference to disciplinary irregalarities, and hence the Association had no authority over a church in its matters of diseipline, and the body sustaining the moderator, prevented a alleged irreguiarities of the charch of which the challenge complained.
Mr. Jennings is an attorney and therofore has good knowl edge of parliamentary law. But to make certain that he was within the proprieties of parlia mentary procedure, he had the written inatruation of a grea Baptist preacher and scholar and one of the best parliamentarians among Texas Baptists, as to the exact course to pursu mentasy proprieties.
According to Mr. Jennings and the line of procedure by the parliamentarian mentioned a bove, to be in keeping with par
liamentary procedure, when Mr Jennings offered the challenge a comrititee on credentials should have been appointed after the body was organized by the messengers from churches not challenged to take the challenge, let Mr. Jennings introduce the evidence the may have had t prove the allegations of the challenge and then let the ac cused church introduce any evi dence it desired, the committee make its repor to the Association and the body accept or reject the committee's report. That kind of course wonld have been satisfactory to everybody and there would be no question as to the regularity of the proceedings. And though the chair was sustained in his rulinge, yet that does not remove the faet that there wa irregularity in the way the matter was disposed of, acourding to Mr. Jenninge.

It is going to be onls through real co-operation on the part of all to get by, but 1 am sure there will be some way. Our towngins from twelve to fifteen thousand bales every year. We will not gin shree hundred bales this year. At this date last jear we had ginned more than 1000 bales. This sea. son we have ginned only one bale, which weighed leas than 400 pounds. Se you see what
