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## Dr. J. D. Sandefer, President Simmons University, Coming For Pro Addresses

It is not necessary for The Enterprise to state that a rare treat awaits the people of Coke county, when Dr. J. D. Sandefer of Abilene, president of Simmons University, comes to Robert Lee and Bronte, Sunday April 2, for an address at each place. For, Dr. Sandefer is known not only in Texas but all over the American continent as a platform speaker, rarely equaled in his powers of eloquence and impassioned appeal.

The theme of Dr. Sandefer's addresses is prohibition—dealing with the very important question of the repeal of the constitutional amendments, against both the federal and state constitutions. It matters not what one's views is on the question pending, he cannot afford not to hear this distinguished educator and interesting speaker—should one differ with the speaker as to his position and conclusions, one will have the other side of the question intelligently and fairly presented.

Dr. Sandefer is coming upon the invitation of the prohibition forces of Coke county and the other communities adjacent to Coke county. Some weeks ago the prohibition forces met and organized but the measles and pneumonia scourge came on and any plans for a campaign were abandoned. But, now, with the coming of spring and hence with more favorable weather and with the unrelenting aggressive campaign being carried on by the brewers and liquor dealers generally, the dry forces of Coke county expect to keep busy from now till the whole agitation for the return of saloons and liquor selling anyway is buried so deep by the votes of the good mothers who are against the debauchery of their boys and girl, and the red-blooded men of Texas, until the question can never scratch out to raise its boney finger to make another plea for an opportunity to degrade and damn the youth of the land. If anyone has thought the devoted motherhood of the land is dead to the interests of their children, just wait till the fight is on—all who have thought that about the mothers of today will wake up out of their stupor the morning after and wonder "what in Sam Hill has struck us." We can't speak for any other state. There may be enough of the anti-Americans among the foreigners of the North and East who, led by the brewers and liquor-makers, will rise up and by their votes turn liquor loose again to prey upon helpless children and women. But, neighbor, down here in Texas, beneath these western stars, "where a man's a man for a' that," and where the predominant element of the mothers have anglo-saxon blood coursing in their veins, we know that Texas will not go to ruin for the sake of the privilege of drinking and carousing—the anglo-saxon motherhood is not dead and when it becomes aroused these hand-kissing, booz-

guzzling politicians who are now running around and explaining and exclaiming, "My party voted for repeal and I must be loyal to my party," will wish to their stars that they had been more loyal to the motherhood and youth of the land. Anyhow, the fight is on, say the dry forces of Coke county and there is to be no letup of the fight until the last gun is fired and the coming of Dr. Sandefer is only the beginning of the campaign that will be waged against the brazen attempt of the brewers and other foreign cohorts of opposition to prohibition, according to the statement of the Coke county prohibition executive committee which is set out in the invitation below, to each and all to hear Dr. Sandefer when he shall come for the occasion and time herein announced:

### Invitation From Coke County Pro Executive Committee

As those to whom was committed the responsibility of directing the work of the prohibition forces in Coke county, which work is especially to prevent the repeal of the 18th Amendment to the Federal Constitution and the repeal of the dry amendment to the State Constitution, we are glad to announce that progress is being made. The sovereign voters are becoming aroused as to the determined efforts of the liquor forces to turn the saloon back upon us, either as saloons or in other forms that will be far more unbearable, through the long-time-tried, so-called local option. Those who are old enough to recall, know how that all of Coke county was cursed with the saloon and its awful effects, by its being sold in San Angelo, and the good people of Coke county, tho our county was dry, had to suffer the evil consequences and could not even have a voice in protesting against San Angelo making our men and boys who drank, the victims of their grog shops, then, send them back to their homes, and we had no protection whatever. San Angelo has often declared that they want the trade of Coke county. If they do, we call upon them and the business men there and of the other larger cities that seek our county's trade, to join with us in preventing the saloons to return to their borders, and thus give us the protection against an awful evil that the good people of Coke county will not tolerate.

## "Uncle Bill" Kellis Admits, He Knows Of No Bootlegger Contributing to Pro Funds

"Your hundred dollars would be perfectly safe, Brother West. x x x x I couldn't name them for the life of me."

The above two sentences cover all that "Uncle Bill" Kellis, veteran editor of the Sterling City News Record, said practically, in an attempt to answer our article three weeks ago, expressing the wish that we were a rich man so we could give one hundred dollars for the name of each who contributes to the cause of prohibition. We expressed the wish in calling attention to an article that "Uncle Bill" had printed in his paper to the effect that bootleggers were contributing to the prohibition fund.

Knowing "Uncle Bill" all these many years, and that he has had long experience as an editor, we did not believe he would make such an allegation, unless he had the undisputed proof. Feeling that if his allegation was true that the preachers and the good women leading in the prohibition fight were being imposed on—or else "for the love of money" the leaders in the cause of temperance were betraying the masses of the preachers and the good women of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, in accepting "blood money" from such unholy sources. In either event we felt, the leaders of prohibition at Austin, and everywhere else, should be advised of the allegation. If it was found to be true, and prohibition leaders were receiving "tainted money" innocently, they should refrain from accepting such funds, and if it could be shown by indisputable proof, they were accepting such funds from such sources, with knowledge of that fact, the whole group should be exposed and held up to the ridicule and censure of all honest-minded people. And in the latter event, "Uncle Bill" Kellis would be doing an everlasting service for the cause of common honesty and common decency, to expose the guilty ones, both preachers and women.

Hence in our article to which "Uncle Bill" is referring, when he makes the two above statements at the beginning of this article and to which he gives two columns in an explanation and attempt to justify his accusation, we expressed the wish that we were a rich man, just for one thing, and that was that we might offer one hundred dollars each for every bootlegger who had contributed to the prohibition fund.

But, imagine if you can, our deep regret, and still deeper disappointment, at the above confession of "Uncle Bill," admitting that he cannot name a single bootlegger who has given a penny, admitting that had we money to offer, it would do him no good that he cannot name a single instance where such an infamous act, unbecoming fifth ward politicians, has occurred.

Since "Uncle Bill" throws up his hands and freely and honestly admits that our "bet is safe"—that he absolutely has no such knowledge of such an infamous transaction, we are going to express a desire to change our wish and that is: We could wish that we were a rich man so we could offer one hundred dollars to every preacher and every woman connected with the handling of funds for the promotion of temperance and prohibition, who will furnish undisputable proof that a bootlegger has contrib-

ed as much as one penny to the cause of prohibition. And, now, "Uncle Bill" the above is such a sure way of getting at the bottom of this serious charge, don't you want to join us in the good wish, so you, too, could offer an additional one hundred dollars to the preachers and good women for such proof?

But, to do "Uncle Bill" exact justice—(knowing "Uncle Bill" long as we have, and knowing his "love of fair play" always)—we quote the whole paragraph that contains the latter of the first two sentences above:

"Now when we see a cloud of sisters and brethren lobbying in the legislature, we know very well that some of them can't afford that luxury, and that someone has contributed to their expense. Why shouldn't a bootlegger do this? Does not the life of his business depend on keeping things as they are? He couldn't make a living without the present law to aid him, yet, he cannot afford to come out in the open. YOUR BET, BROTHER WEST, IS A REAL SURE THING. I COULDN'T NAME THEM FOR THE LIFE OF ME. But I still say that sums are being contributed for the cause of the bootlegger. You may call it the cause of prohibition if you want to, but you know that is the pabulum on which bootleggers thrive."

Notice, the simple and innocent turn "Uncle Bill" gives the controversy. He says: "I still say that HUGE SUMS are being contributed FOR the cause of the bootlegger. You may call it the cause of prohibition if you want to."

There is a vast difference in saying that "HUGE SUMS" are being contributed for the cause of the bootlegger and in alleging that bootleggers are contributing to the prohibition cause.

Sometimes, men in their mad enthusiasm for their cause will make unwarranted allegations against the opposing side and, it seems, now, that this is one of those instances. "Uncle Bill" with all his high regard for absolute square dealing, and his undeviating fidelity to the truth and to facts, let his enthusiasm for the return of the infamous liquor rule, lead him this one time into an accusation against the preachers and the good women of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, which, when confronted with his printed allegation admits that he does not know of a single instance of such debauchery on the part of the ministers and the good women. But, just like "Uncle Bill," when his attention is called to the charge he made, and he does not have the facts to establish his accusation, his rugged honesty would let him do nothing else but admit that he had made a charge without evidence—then he admits that the charge, serious as it was, was only based on his conception of the issues involved—that when anyone, preacher, university president, a mother, or anyone else, contributes to the cause of prohibition, he is so grossly ignorant as to what he is doing, he contributes to the cause of the bootlegger. Excuse us, "Uncle Bill"—but we simply have just got to take time to take a hearty laugh at your predicament and the easy way you slip out of it.

No, we will not laugh either—for the cause is too serious in which we both, "Uncle Bill," are supposed to be equally and hon-

**CROP LOAN FUND LOCAL COMMITTEE**

T. P. Metcalfe, district field supervisor of the Crop Production Loan Fund, was in Bronte Thursday. While here Mr. Metcalfe gave The Enterprise a call and explained to us more fully with reference to the Crop Loan Fund, the Federal Government has made available to those farmers who need aid to finance themselves while making a crop.

Mr. Metcalfe advises that the time limit for getting a loan from this fund is April 1—after that date no more loans will be made. Hence the farmer who delays about this will find himself in a predicament, should he need aid in growing his crop.

The rate of interest on a loan from this fund is 5 1-2 per cent. Frank Keeney and B. F. Bridges are the local committee through whom anyone desiring to make application who resides in this section, is to make application. They will make out the application for one who is eligible for a loan.

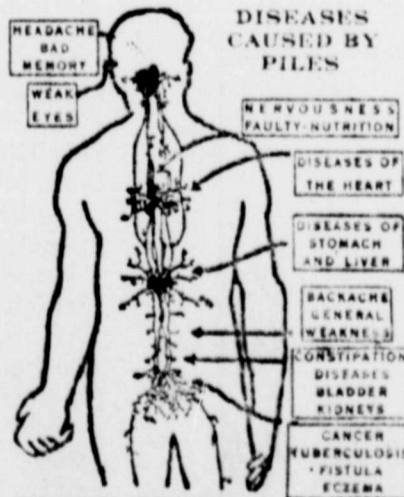

 estly interested.

Your interest, "Uncle Bill," in "the sisters and brethren," as you call them, "lobbying" in the legislature, (for prohibition) we know very well that some of them can't afford that luxury, and that someone has contributed to their expense," is a very grandfatherly solicitude you have for "the sisters and brethren."

And, since you show such unselfish interest in behalf of those at Austin who are working against the return of the saloon, which, if I remember correctly, in recent months you have denounced as an evil, and that its

return will never be tolerated by those who want booze brought back, let us institute an inquiry and see if you and I can agree as to who might be contributing to this holy and good cause.

To begin, do you suppose, "Al Smith that distinguished (?) democrat—(you note, "Uncle Bill" I adopt your method of spelling and spell "democrat" with a little "d." I got that from your way of spelling "jim ferguson.")—that man who became the chief of bolters in the democratic party and the morning after he was nominated by his party at Houston, he wired that he accepted the nomination but utterly ignored his party's platform—how much, do you

put down as Al's contribution to "the sisters and brethren" at Austin who are there trying to save our people from becoming a nation of drunkards? You state in cold print, then, I will state likewise as to whether or not you have under-rated the contribution of "Al, the chief bolter," to the cause of prohibition—or "the cause of the bootlegger," as you term it.

No, no, "Uncle Bill," I am wondering if we haven't been guessing wrong, all the way thru this inquiry. Do you reckon it could be "Sister Sarah Hughes" the female legislator, you know, "Uncle Bill," who "whooped up things" down there at Austin the other day and was going to rush an amendment to the state constitution and make "Texas wet as the Atlantic ocean," whether the Federal repeal amendment should go through or not. And you know, "Uncle Bill," one of the male colleagues of this "female legislator" got anxious about the "sister" and rose and suavely and anxiously asked: "Is the lady from Dallas thirsty the reason she is so anxious to rush this bill through?" It might be, "Uncle Bill," that the bootleggers at Austin were not "functioning" freely that day—for "Sister Hughes" answered her "male colleague", by saying: "If I were thirsty, I would know where to get the liquor." Do you suppose it could be, "Uncle Bill" that "Sister Hughes" is contributing to the support of "the sisters and brethren" in Austin who are there in the interest of the bootleggers, as you say, and the "sisters and brethren" are failing to "punch up" the bootleggers?

"Uncle Bill," in all sincerity, I believe by this time you are as fully convinced as I am that the ministers and the good women who are working in Austin against the return of liquor rule with all of its accursed evils, with the rarest exceptions, are sweet, modest, pure, gentle women, as your mother and my mother were, and the preachers there are pure, high-minded Christian gentlemen, with the few possible exceptions, working conscientiously and in keeping with the tenets and teachings of their churches, and serving without compensation, trying to

beat back and defeat the hordes of greedy brewers and others who will commercialize vice and bring shame, sorrow and curse upon curse to this fair American land, all for the sake of a profit out of the miseries of men, women and children; and that every nickel practically contributed to their expenses is from legitimate and moral sources.

The benedictions of heaven on every sincere man and woman who is working anywhere or in any righteous way, to prevent the return of the most damnable institution that ever cursed any people—the American saloon, or the liquor traffic in any form!
