### Sale of Cattle Subject To Income Tax

The sale of cattle is subject to income tax, no matter what the proceeds are put to, according to Ellis Campbell, Jr., Dallas Dis-trict Director of Internal Reveue Service.

Numerous questions at farr tax schools have pointed up mis understanding on the part of some farmers. The sale of cattle, land, and other farm capital as-sets are taxable no watter who-ther the proceeds are reinvested in similar property or not

ther the proceeds are reinvested in similar property or not.

There is one exception in the case of condemnation proceedings or other involuntary conversion. Farmers having a problem in this area were advised to get a free copy of the "Farmer's Tax Guide" from their country Agent or the Internal Revenue Service. nue Service.


