

If this is true, then all else is true - then a'l that Jesus said, did and commanded through His apostles is true. The Bible and the Bible alone reveals the religion of Christ. Everything must be measured and approved or disapproved by the Divine standard of the New Testament. If creed and dogma, if sacrament and ritual do not agree with the scriptures they are wrong. Since Jesus has "all authority" in heaven and earth (Matt. 28:19, let us hear Him and restore His way!


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Hart to Open Against Bula **Friday Night**
