

'High noon' approaches for Dimmitt RR depot

Monday will be the deadline for filing "exceptions," or disagreements, with the examiner's proposal to the Railroad Commission of Texas concerning the proposed closing of the railroad agency in Dimmitt.

The proposal, drawn up by examiner Jim B. Cloude following a hearing in Dimmitt March 10, recommends granting the request of Burlington North-

ern (formerly Fort Worth and Denver Railway) to close the agency in Dimmitt and handle the work through the Plainview agency.

Cloude recommended that the commission adopt the proposal along with several conditions, including that it be for a trial period of one year, pending final determination of the effect of discontinuance on the public

convenience and necessity.

Notification of the proposal was issued July 19, with 20 days allowed for exceptions to be filed. The exceptions must be received by the Director of the Transportation Division by Monday, with copies sent to each party of record. Also, replies to exceptions may be filed within 15 days from the due date for exceptions,

which would be Aug. 23.

Because of the various deadlines, the final decision cannot be issued before Aug. 23, so it will be some time after that before the final decision will be made known.

"In all probability, some exceptions will be filed," said Carl Collyer of Bruegel and Sons Elevator in Dimmitt.

The examiner pointed out that he concludes,

based on the record of the proceeding, that the public convenience and necessity does not require the continued maintenance of the agency station at Dimmitt.

"The standard established by the courts, however, is not profitability or activity, but public convenience and necessity. The examiner is of the opinion that, under applicant's (Burlington North-

ern) plan, the public convenience and necessity will not be impaired," the report stated, going on to say that, "Of the agent duties listed at the hearing, none require the maintenance of a base agency at Dimmitt."

Functions presently handled by the agent at Dimmitt include ordering of railcars, preparation of switch lists, signing of shipper order bills of

loading, calculation of demurrage, tracing of lost railcars, preparation of loss and damage reports, arrangement of leases of railroad property and distribution of car seals.

The proposal set forth by BN would improve service to the public, according to the examiner's decision, in the following ways: expanding hours of service from the present 8 hours per day excluding holidays

to 18 hours a day including holidays; computer access at Plainview for tracing lost cars; and increased efficiency.

Cloude enumerated the primary disadvantages to include: the direct service agent from Plainview may be overloaded with work during the harvest season; communication of switching or other instructions to

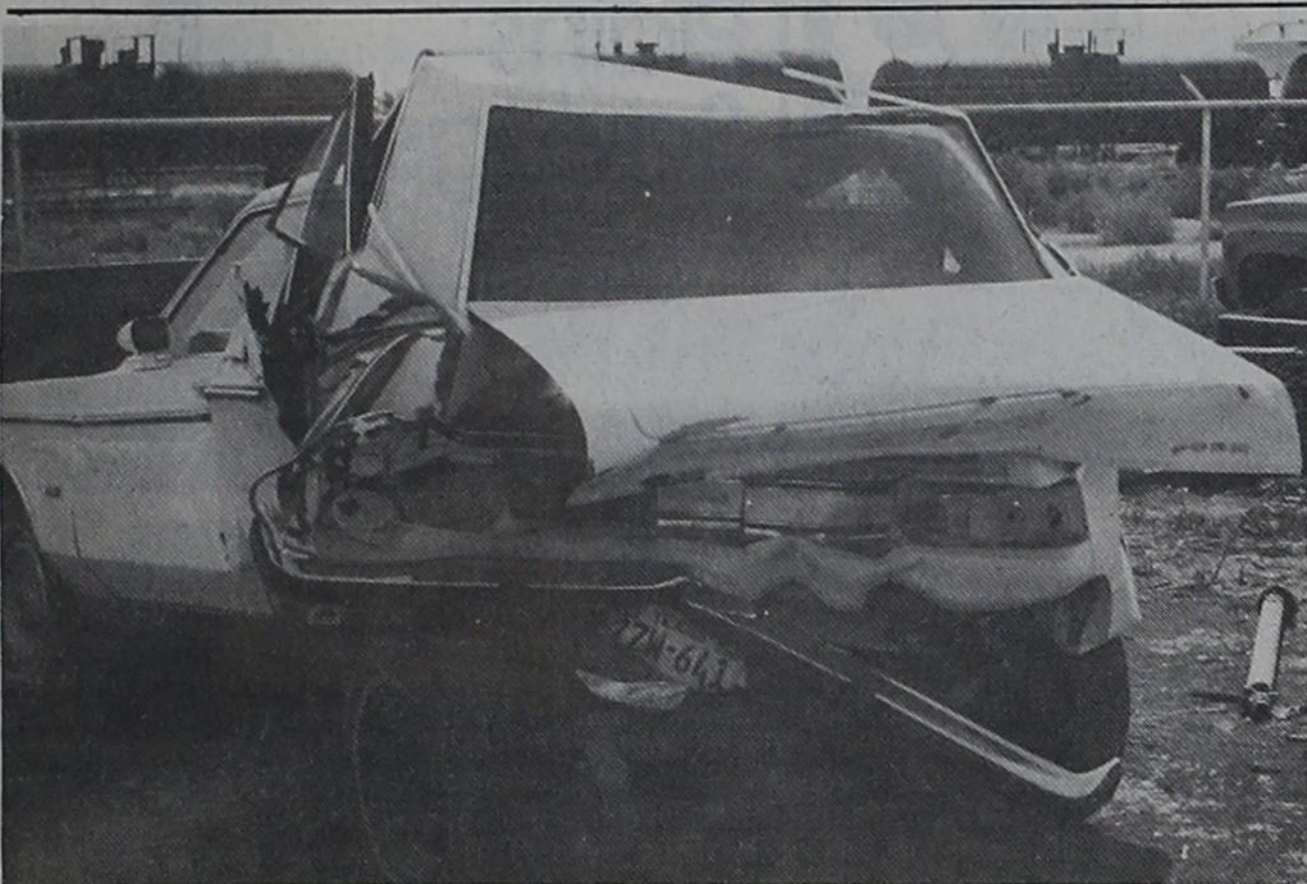

Liability insurance is revised

Family escapes bizarre crash

Mr. and Mrs. Alejandro Trigo and their daughter, Delia, are thanking their lucky stars after a brush with death in a bizarre accident July 25.

Their 1980 Ford Granada was demolished in a rear-end collision on Highway 60 near Umbarger. But luckily, the Trigos weren't in the car at the time.

Here's how it happened: Mr. and Mrs. Trigo had taken Delia, a 1983 Dimmitt High School graduate, to West Texas State University for orientation, and the family was en route home. It was about 5 p.m.

Trigo, who was driving, was due to go to work on the night shift at the Amstar plant here at midnight. He hadn't slept any that day, so he decided to let his wife drive the rest of the way home so he could take a nap in the back seat. He pulled the car off the highway.

Mr. and Mrs. Trigo were both standing outside the passenger side of the car, with the door open, while

Delia gathered her orientation papers in the back seat and prepared to move up front.

Then Mrs. Trigo noticed that a pickup coming from behind them was veering off the highway.

"He's coming too close! He's going to hit us!" she said.

Before her words sank in on the others, Mrs. Trigo pushed her husband aside, grabbed her daughter and pulled her from the car.

"The pickup hit our car right after she pulled me out — just as soon as we got out of the way," Delia said. "I guess we were probably no farther than two yards from the car when the pickup hit it."

Delia still didn't realize what was happening.

"My mother was the only one who actually saw the pickup hit our car," she said. "I was facing away from it, still wondering why she had pulled me out. All I saw was our car fly up in the air, make half a turn and land on the ground. The gas tank was

leaking when it came down."

None of the three were hit by any flying metal.

The impact crushed the rear end of the Trigos' car, threw the spare tire from the trunk into the front seat, jammed the driver's seat against the steering wheel and rammed the rear seats into the front ones.

"Some of my stuff is still in the car because we couldn't get it out, it jammed everything together so much," Delia said.

"I don't think there would have been any chance that I'd be alive now if my mother hadn't pulled me out," she said. "If we had all been in the car when it happened, I think the only one who would probably have survived would have been the one on the passenger side of the front seat. It wasn't as jammed as the other seats were."

Two other cars driven by Dimmitt residents came

At Monday night's meeting of the Dimmitt Board of Aldermen, the board voted to revise the city's professional and other liability insurance, decided to wait until the next meeting to revise the schedule of building permit fees, agreed to amend the ordinance governing water and sewer services, and approved appointment of a Mayor's Council on Beautification.

Review of the policy received on the city's professional liability insurance, which the board agreed to purchase at its July 5 meeting, revealed several exclusions.

"We couldn't view the policy until we agreed to purchase the insurance, but now we feel that some changes need to be made," Alderman David Hays explained.

Local insurance agent Ronnie Parker of Brown and Parker Insurance pointed out to the board that one of the policy's provisions excluded coverage of anyone connected with the airport or with the utility department, but noted that they could be included in the coverage by adding 10 percent to the premium price.

Parker also recommended to the board that they purchase a \$3 million "umbrella policy" to provide additional coverage over and above the city's regular liability coverage.

"What this will do will be to take into account the limits of coverage on each type of liability coverage, except professional liability and raise the limits of coverage up to \$3 million. For instance, if the city's regular policy provides coverage up to \$500,000 on auto liability, the umbrella policy would cover anything between the \$500,000 and \$3 million," City Attorney Jack Edwards

Cleveland is state's 'Coach of the Year'

Chosen by the Texas Sports Writers Association, the Coaches of the Year in four sports were announced at the Balfour Hall of Honor Awards Luncheon last Wednesday, during the 24th annual convention of the Texas High School Coaches Association in Fort Worth.

The rest of Texas learned last week what Dimmitt fans have known all along: Ken Cleveland is the Texas High School Basketball Coach of the Year.

In presenting the award, TSWA President Barry Robinson cited the rare 38-0 record which Cleveland's Bobcats compiled this year against competition of all classes as they swept to the Class AAA state championship. The Bobcats were the only undefeated team in the state.

The 38-0 season in 1983

explained.

It was stressed that the professional liability coverage would not be included under the umbrella. But with the additional coverage in other areas, the aldermen felt that they would not need the \$5 million professional liability coverage they had agreed to purchase, and decided to reduce it to \$2 million.

The \$5 million policy was going to cost \$6,248 for three year's coverage. The \$2 million policy will cost \$4,641 plus 10 percent to cover the exclusion of airport and utility personnel. Again, the premium will be paid in yearly installments of 37 percent of the premium, which figures out to an 11 percent interest rate.

Also, board members were informed that the policy excludes coverage for most of the functions of the police department. They agreed to let Parker look into specialized policies for police coverage.

Exclusions were also listed that would not give coverage to the city dump or sewer plant, or for cases involving defamation, including libel and slander, or for cases involving bodily injury or illness.

City Manager Paul Catoe expressed dissatisfaction with the many exclusions, but the board agreed that they did need what coverage was provided. Parker pointed out that the main purpose of the policy is to cover the city in case of any errors or omissions by city employees or elected officials in the performance of their duties.

Dimmitt building contractor Don Hargrove appeared before the aldermen to say that he was "shocked" at the cost of building permits in the city.

He presented a schedule

of fees charged by surrounding towns to cover the construction of a 2,000-square foot structure at a cost of \$80,000.

Dimmitt's fee of \$373 was far above the \$20 charged by Plainview and Tulia, which were the next highest on the list. Other towns and the fees charged included Littlefield \$15, Hereford \$10.50, and Friona \$1.

Hargrove requested that the board consider adopting the same fee schedule as Plainview. However, he noted that spokesmen for several of the towns surveyed said that they were considering raising their fees.

Catoe told the board that the city has been using the fee schedule included in the standardized building code adopted in 1982. He said that the City of Amarillo uses a scaled-down version of the same schedule, charging about one-third of what the standard schedule shows, which would put the fee at \$134.50 for an \$80,000 structure.

Calling Dimmitt's fees "ridiculous," the aldermen agreed that they needed to be changed, and discussed the possibility of making the changes retroactive and granting refunds. The board will consider the matter at their next meeting after further investigation.

The aldermen also authorized Edwards to draw up a revision to the water and sewer ordinances that would allow owners of rental property or businesses that share a water meter to be exempted from paying the second minimum charge if the second structure is unoccupied, similar to the occupancy provisions governing hotels and motels.

"It was a very good meeting," King said. "I am very encouraged." He said Gov. White was "very receptive" to the proposed legislation.

"Gov. White was very encouraging and agreed that something needed to be done," King said.

The purpose of the meeting was to convince the governor to let State Sen. Bill Sarpalis reintroduce his bill which would bring irrigation gas prices back under the regulation of the Texas Railroad Commission.

Besides King and Sen. Sarpalis, Bruce Rigler of Plainview, president of the Plains Irrigation Gas Users Association; Bill Clevinger of Wildorado; and David Smith of Hart

attended the meeting with Gov. White.

The Texas Corn Growers Association led the fight for gas legislation, in conjunction with the Gas Users Association, during the regular session of the state legislature.

King and the executive directors of the PIGUA were to meet with Energas officials Wednesday morning in Plainview to discuss the future reduction of gas rates and other matters.

Collision kills one, injures five locals

A two-vehicle collision east of Friona Monday resulted in the death of one person and injuries to seven others.

Dimmitt residents Ostolio Sanchez Ramos, 47, Irene Ramos, 25, Tina Ramos, 12 and Billy Ray Aleman, 9, were injured in the accident. Also injured were David Garcia, 14, and Delia Barrientez, 47, both of Hereford.

Maria Reyes, 19, of Hereford was dead on arrival at the Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona.

According to the Department of Public Safety,

Reyes' car was in a north bar ditch of the road facing east, trying to make a U-turn to head west. The vehicle collided with a westbound car driven by Ostolio Sanchez Ramos.

All those injured were treated and released, except for David Garcia, who was admitted to the intensive care unit and later transferred to a private room. Garcia was in stable condition Wednesday morning after Monday surgery.

Services for Miss Reyes were held Wednesday at Kingdon Hall of the Jehovah's Witnesses in Hereford, with Leo Monte-

mayor officiating. Burial was at West Park Cemetery, under the direction of Rix Funeral Home.

Born in Hobart, Okla., Miss Reyes lived in Dimmitt with her family in the mid-1960s, moving to Hereford when she was 3 years old. She was a 1982 graduate of Hereford High School and a Jehovah's Witness.

Survivors include her mother, Delia Garcia, of the home; two sisters, Silvia Reyes and Hope Garcia, both of the home; a brother, David Garcia of the home; and her grandfather, Juan Barrientez of Hereford.

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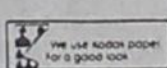

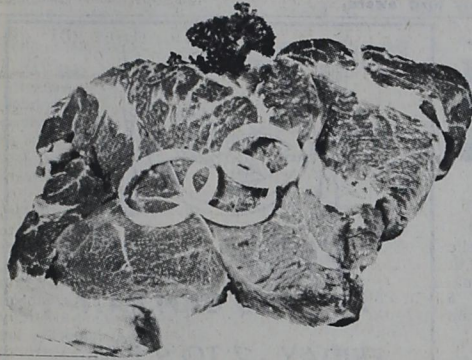

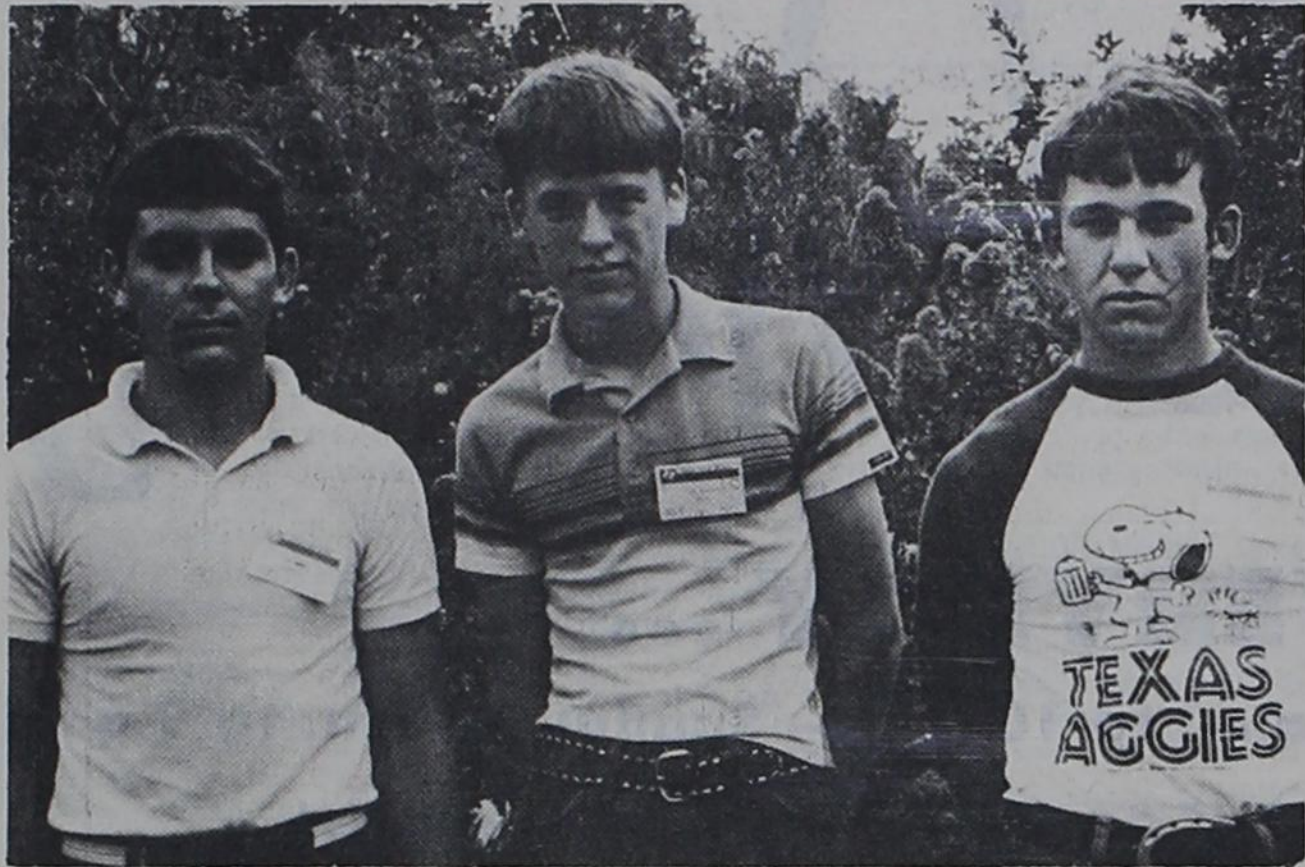

upon the accident scene immediately and stopped to help. They were Mr. and Mrs. Ray Phillips, and Polly Patterson and her grandson, Mikey. "The dust was still flying when we drove up," Phillips reported.

Mr. and Mrs. Phillips took Delia to a nearby store, where they called the Highway Patrol and the wrecker service and she called relatives in Hereford to come and pick them up. Meanwhile, the Pattersons stayed with the wreck victims at the scene.

The driver of the pickup — 22-year-old Michael Axe of Route 5, Hereford, a student at Texas State Technical Institute in Amarillo — received a scalp laceration and possible other injuries. He was taken by a passerby to Deaf Smith General Hospital in Hereford, where he received emergency treatment.

Axe was cited by the Texas Highway Patrol for failure to drive in a single marked lane. His pickup, a 1974 Ford Courier, was demolished. "After we got back (to the accident scene), I saw that his (Axe's) head was bound and he had blood on his forehead," Delia said. "He asked if we were all right, and we asked him how he was. He said, 'I'm fine; I fell asleep.'"

As if one accident weren't enough, the Trigos were involved in another one on their way home. They had been picked up by relatives from Hereford in the relatives' van and were on the "Big Daddy" cutoff road between US 60 and US 385 when her cousin, who was driving, started to pass another car. The woman driving the other car started a left turn as the van was passing, and the two vehicles collided. "So we had to stay there and wait for the Highway Patrol and go through the whole thing again, and after we got all that taken care of, we finally came on home," Delia said.

A Dawn woman is in St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo and her husband is in Deaf Smith General Hospital in Hereford following a two-vehicle accident Monday morning involving Ronnie Griffith of Dimmitt.

Sharon Johnson of Dawn was reported to have a brain bruise, a broken leg and a broken pelvis, along with other injuries. Her husband, Ronnie Johnson, received a fractured skull and is being held for observation. Their 4-year-old son received "a couple of bumps on the head."

Griffith received shoulder and chest bruises and was treated and released at Deaf Smith General. He is still recuperating at home.

Griffith, who is employed by Riverside Chemical of Hereford, was returning from making a delivery at about 10 a.m. when the accident occurred at the intersection of FM 809 and FM 1062, about five miles north of Dawn.

Leroy Burgess, manager of Hereford Riverside, reported that the company vehicle Griffith was driving, a 1981 Chevrolet pickup valued at \$9,000 was a total loss.

Investigating DPS Trooper Darrell Matthews reported that Griffith was traveling west on FM 1062 and Johnson, driving a '79 Plymouth Horizon, was driving north on FM 809, when Griffith failed to yield at a stop intersection. Matthews said that Griffith was issued a citation in the accident.

Area men buy bank

Two members of the Board of Directors of the Farmer's State Bank in Hart were among five area businessmen who took over the Metro Bank of Midland, which failed recently.

The new owners of the Mid-Cities National Bank are Roy Ryan of Dumas and Jerry Powell of Lubbock, both directors of the First State Bank in Memphis and of the Brownfield State Bank and Trust, as well as the bank in Hart.

Other owners are Borger residents Edgar Blair, David Warren and Billy Riley. Federal officials chartered the Mid-Cities National Bank on Sunday after looking at several bids for the failed Metro Bank, located between Midland and Odessa at the Midland Regional Airport.

Metro Bank had lost \$6.5 million to \$7 million because of poor lending practices when the state banking board ordered it closed.

The new owners agreed to pay the government \$850,000 for the bank and will assume about \$29.9 million in deposits and other liabilities.

In turn, the FDIC will advance the new bank \$17.3 million in cash and retain \$20.2 million in assets.

the train crew will become more complicated; receipt of an agent signature on bills of lading may be more difficult; the local agent will not be available to execute loss or damage reports; communication with BN officers will require long-distance telephoning; and customers will lose face to face contact with the agent.

Cloudt outlined ways that the disadvantages could be taken care of, including requiring BN to provide adequate relief personnel during peak seasons; requiring BN to provide communication equipment adequate to maintain communication between the base at Plainview, the direct service agent and the train crews; authorizing train conductors to sign bills of lading for inbound shipments and encourage receivers to obtain surety bonds payable to BN for the release of shipments; giving all shippers the option of signing their own bill of lading on outbound shipments; use of a toll-free number for customer service; and requiring the direct service agent to travel to Dimmitt to conduct loss and damage reports as necessary.

During the trial period, the examiner suggests that the commission require the applicant to record all traffic handled at Dimmitt and all complaints regarding such service and file a report on the information following the year's trial period.

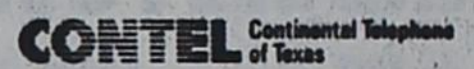
Selby discussed with the club the history and purpose of Rotary International and urged the members to share Rotary. He also discussed the future of Rotary Clubs.

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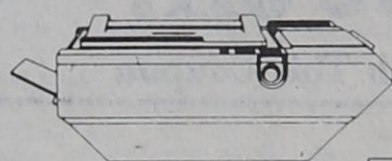
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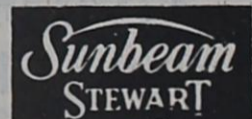
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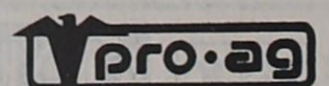
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Weatherization services available

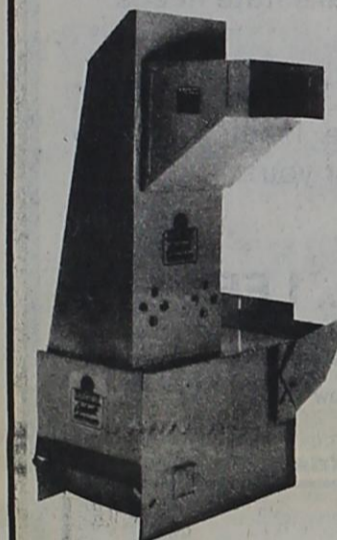

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Mixed drink taxes are up

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said recently that collection of the state's 10 percent mixed drink tax during the second quarter of 1983 was up 5.4 percent over the same period last year.

Bullock said the state collected \$37.9 million in taxes on the sale of mixed drinks during the quarter.

Bullock's office is sending checks totaling \$11 million to 219 counties and 416 cities as their share of the gross receipts tax on mixed drinks for the second quarter.

The state's general revenue fund will receive the balance — \$26.9 million — of the tax money collected.

Texas cities and counties each receive a 15 percent rebate of the tax collected on mixed drinks sold within their boundaries under the law that legalized the sale of mixed drinks in the state.

The mixed drink tax is

collected by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission and city-county rebates are sent out quarterly by the Comptroller's office.

Bullock said the mixed drink tax brought in a total of \$74 million during the first half of 1983.

During the months of April, May and June of this year, mixed drink sales in Castro County totalled \$81,741.50, yielding tax revenue of \$8,174.15. The county received a remittance of \$1,226.12.

The remittance for the City of Dimmitt was \$895.85 out of total tax revenue of \$5,972.36 based on sales of \$59,723.60 for the three months.

Nazareth received \$88.52 from the \$590.16 generated in tax revenue based on mixed drink sales of \$5,901.60 for the quarter.

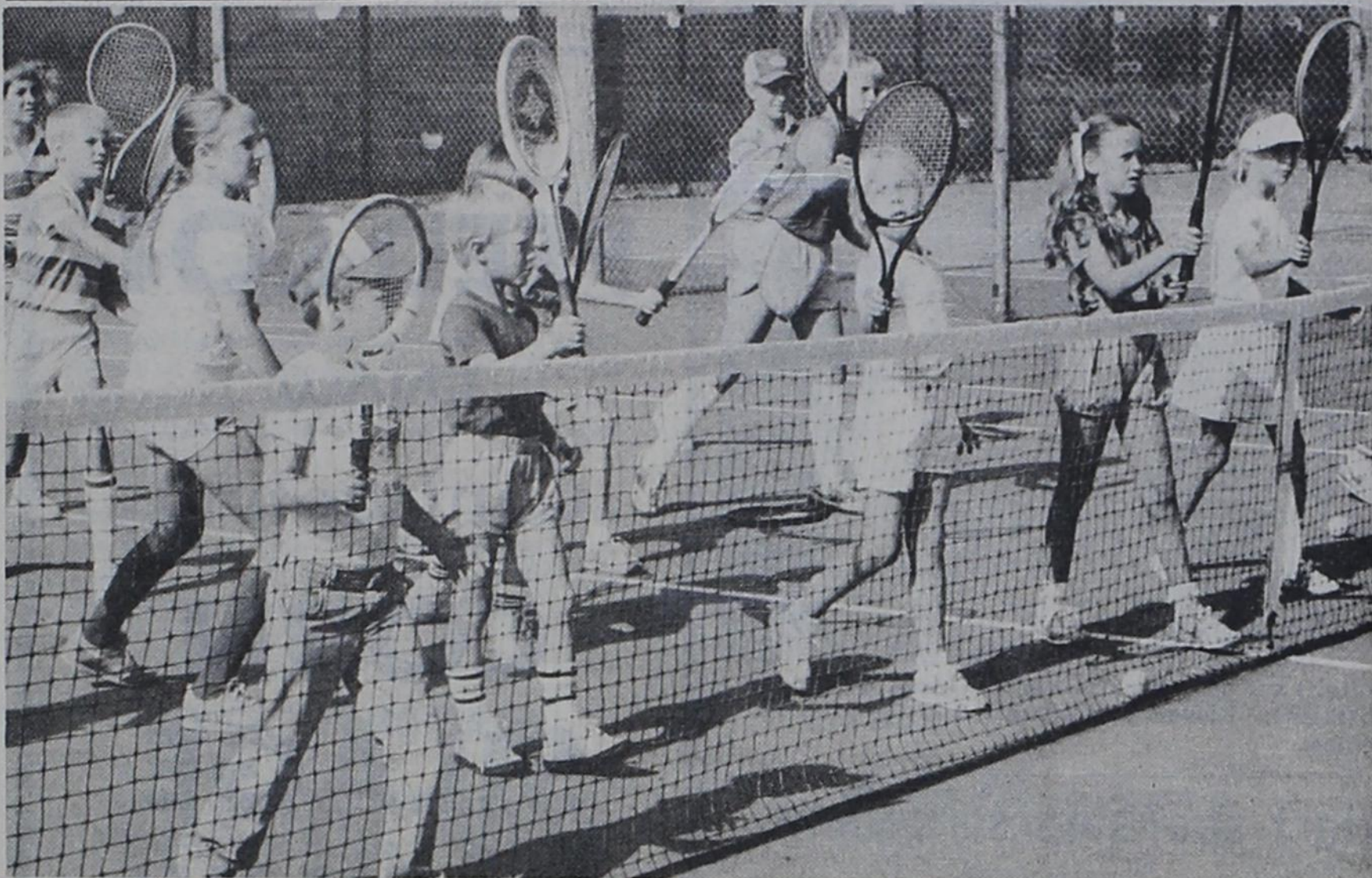

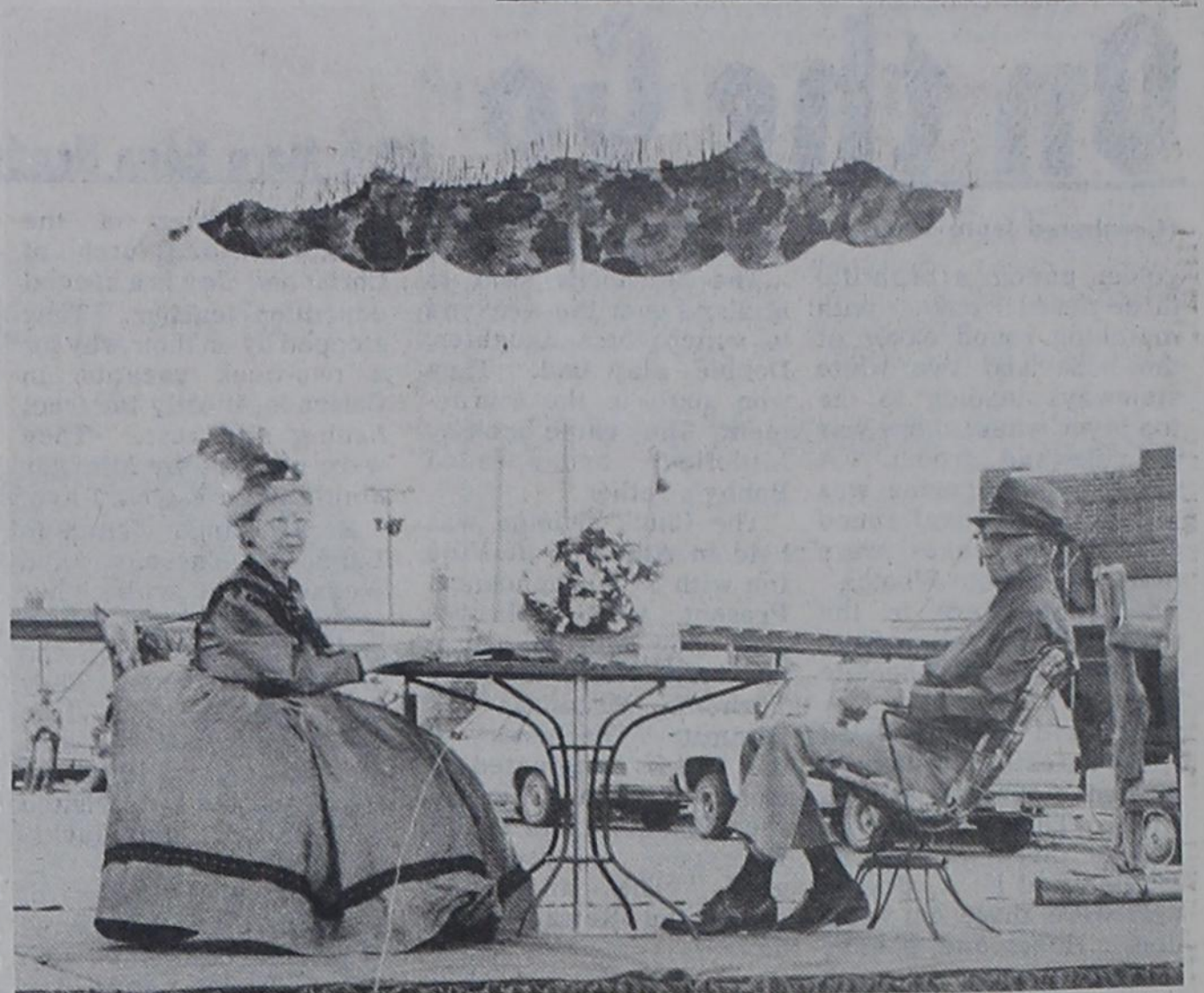

Vegetable harvest is 'great'

With summer nearing its end, the local vegetable harvest is progressing and things are looking good for producers.

"The prices are good, the weather has been beautiful, and the quality of the onions is outstanding," Alan McClure, manager of Dimco Inc., said. "The onion harvest is better than average this year."

Dimco has been averaging 435 50-pound bags per acre of onions and 175 100-pound bags per acre of potatoes, McClure said.

Since Dimco does not store any vegetables at the plant, McClure sees no problems ahead.

"We pack them up as soon as they come in, and get them out as fast as we can," he explained.

The Western Vegetables pickle plant is moving right along with its harvest also. Plant Manager Lee Kimball said Western expects to keep harvesting cucumbers until the last of September, "if Mother Nature will leave us alone."

Western Vegetables is still harvesting its early crop of cukes, and so far the yields have been better than average.

"We have a great average. We are getting 7,000 to 8,000 pounds per acre, and we are on the fourth picking," Kimball said.

He added that normal harvests end with seven or eight pickings, but this year he expects to have eight to 10.

Kimball foresees no storage problems, but the heat has added a little extra work.

"We have to go in more often, and stay on top of the fertilizing and watering," he said.

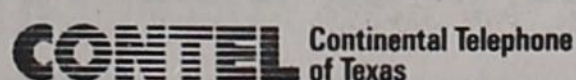

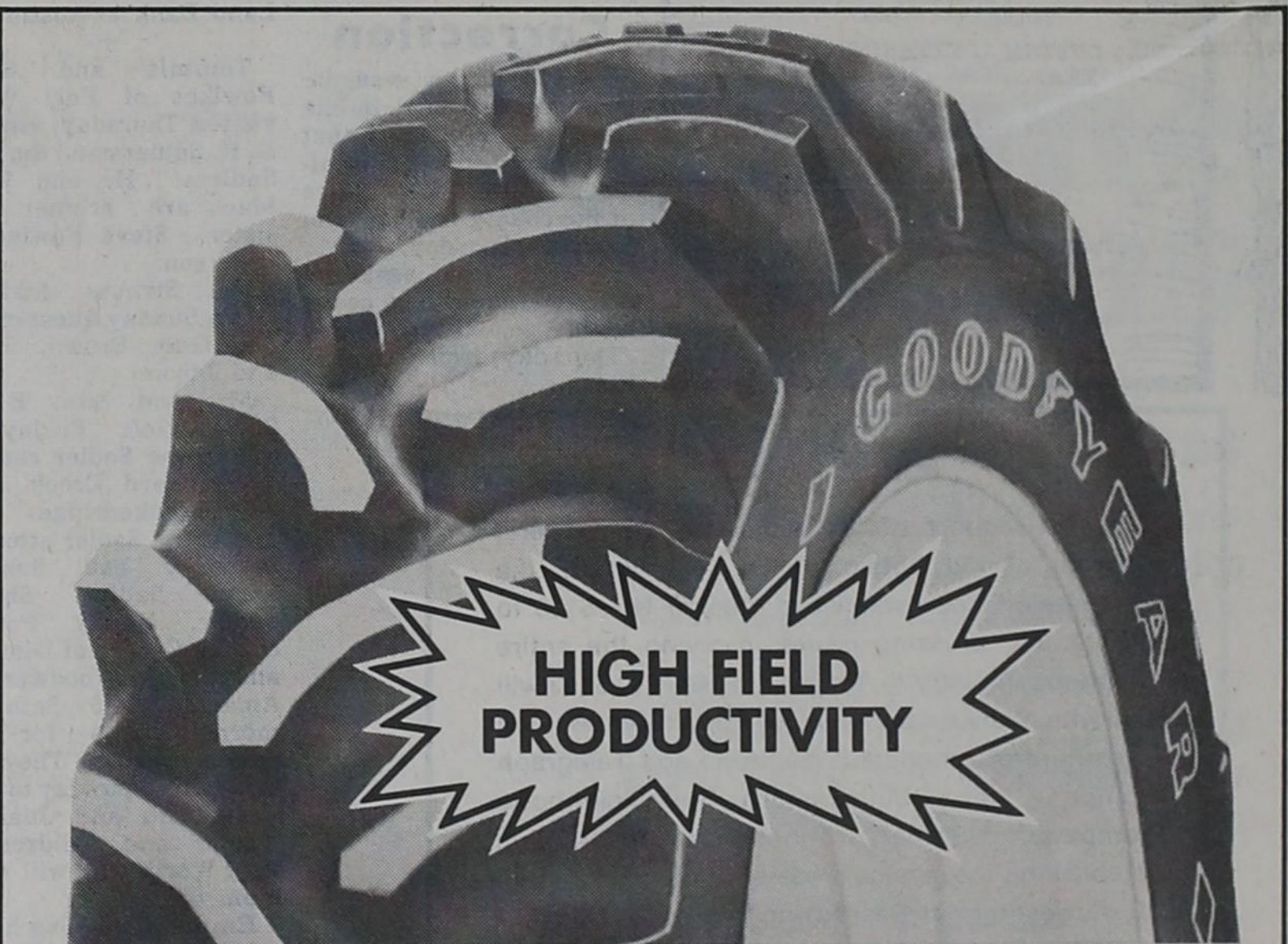

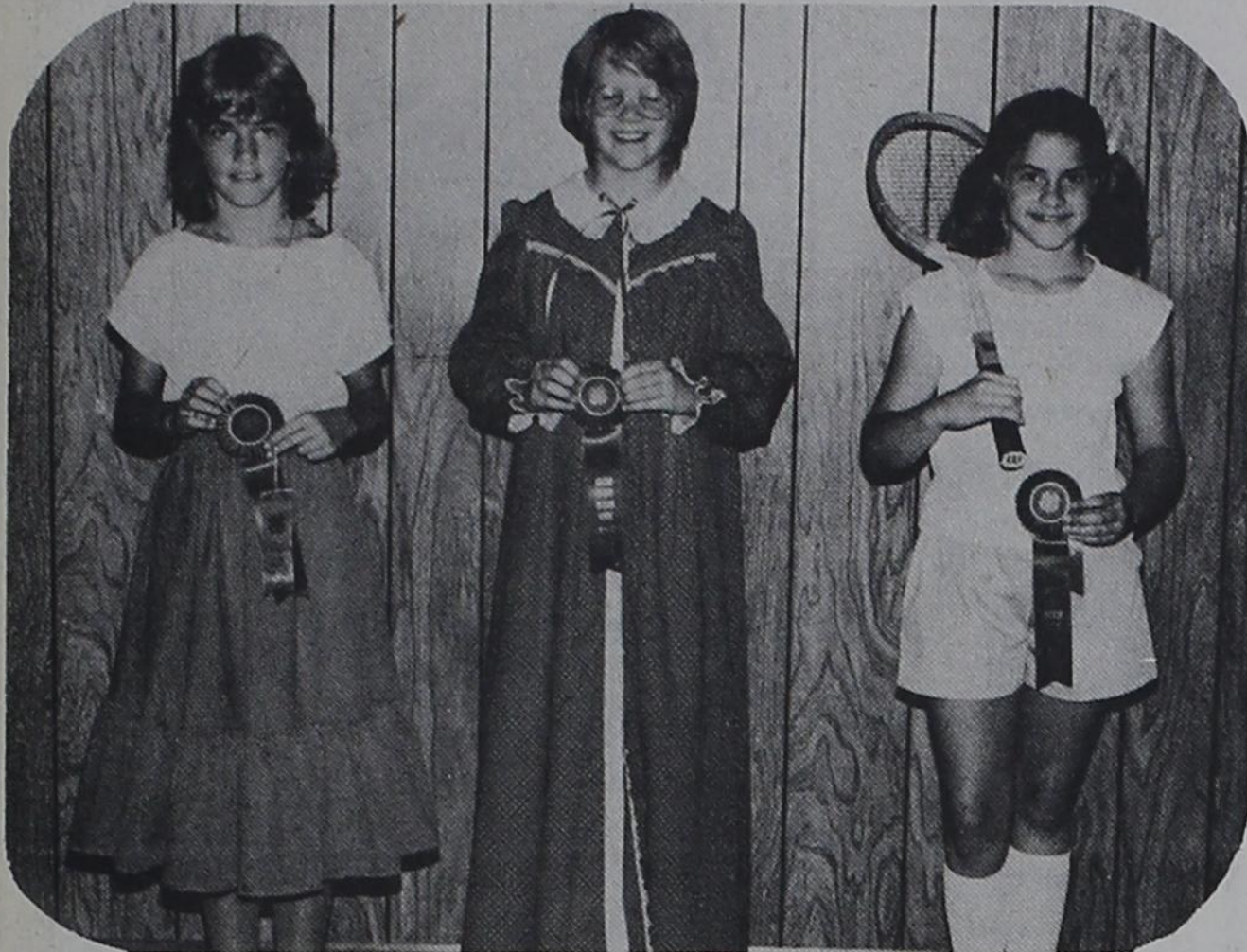

Mrs. Blanton bitten by snake

Irene Blanton of Dimmitt is in Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt recuperating from a rattlesnake bite she received on her lower right leg Sunday evening while picking corn a mile south of Dimmitt. "My husband, George, was with me and we were picking some corn on the Donald Wright place, when I stepped on this rattlesnake and it bit me on the calf," Mrs. Blanton said.

in the field and he came running when I hollered, and he saw the snake, too," she said. "I can tell you, I was literally scared to death."

Blanton said the snake appeared to be between three and four feet long, but he couldn't say exactly, because the snake was partially coiled.

"I tied a scarf tightly around my leg and we hurried to the car and headed for the hospital. Fortunately, Dr. Murphy just happened to be there when we arrived and he administered the anti-venom," Mrs. Blanton related. "I didn't realize it before, but they inject the serum right into the place where the bite is."

Mrs. Blanton said that the snake left only one puncture mark, but added that it was still plenty sore. She said there was heavy swelling, discoloration and fever the first day, but things are improving.

although she will have to stay off of the leg for quite a while.

Leaving the field in such a hurry, the Blantons said that they did not take the time to try to kill the snake. Wright and several others went back a couple of times to the same area, but failed to find it.

"I didn't get my corn, and I'm sure not going back for it either," Mrs. Blanton quipped.

City is named in lawsuits

The City of Dimmitt and City Patrolman Calvin E. Davenport have been named as defendants in lawsuits filed by Estella Mendez on behalf of Sammy Mendez, a minor, and by Juan Melendez on behalf of Tony Melendez, a minor.

The suit stems from a traffic accident which occurred in Dimmitt June 9, 1982 on North Broadway.

According to news reports from the time, Davenport was driving a city patrol car to the scene of a motorcycle-car accident when his patrol car was in a collision with a car driven by Tony Melendez. Sammy Mendez was a passenger.

City Attorney Jack Edwards reported that Davenport had previously filed a suit against Melendez, and that the case was scheduled for hearing Aug. 14.

The identical suits filed by Melendez and Mendez allege that Davenport was negligent in the operation of the city vehicle, saying that he "failed to maintain a proper lookout; wrongfully failed to yield right-of-way; failed to maintain a proper speed; failed to make proper application of brakes; failed to use emergency apparatus available; and failed to sound horn."

The suits state that the City of Dimmitt is liable for the action of Davenport as an employee, and for the damages.

News reports stated that those involved in the accident received cuts and abrasions.

The plaintiffs allege that they have "suffered severe physical and mental pain and anguish and in all reasonable probability will continue to suffer for a long time into the future."

No dollar amounts were stipulated in the suits. Edwards said the original suit and the subsequent suits could possibly be consolidated and a new hearing date set.

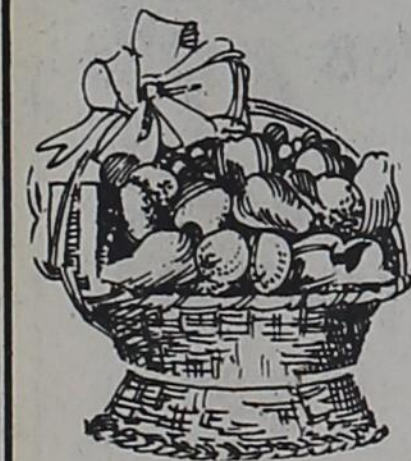

CFO Retreat set for Aug. 5

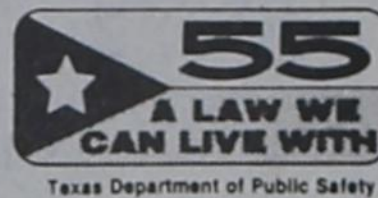
The Texas Panhandle Camp Farthest (CFO) Retreat will be Aug. 5-7 at Ceta Canyon Methodist Camp near Happy.
