## Methodist Revival Meeting to Begin

## THEIR LITTLE BABE DIES

After a lingering illness for several weeks in a San Angelo sanitarium, little Shirley Jean Wrinkle, nineteen months old baby girl of Mr. and Mrs. Willie Wrinkle, died in the early morning hours, Tuesday, March 10, 1937. Interment was in Fairview cemetery at Bronte, late Tuesday afternoon, following religious services.

The religious services were held at the Kickapoo Baptist church, north of Bronte, conducted by the pastor, Rev. C. L. Carroll of Richland Springs, assisted by Rev. Lewis Stuckey, pastor of the Bronte Baptist church, and the writer. As the little white casket rested quietly in the altar of the church, beneath an embankment of early spring flowers, the Scriptures were read by Rev. Stuckey, calling attention that such as baby Shirley Dean, according to the Lord Who loved little children and "put His hands on them" and blessed them, would be in heaven. Pastor Carroll spoke of the utter impossibility of the parents and grandparents and others of the family circle to bring their darling baby back, but it was an eternal verity that they each and all could go to her. The church choir sang tenderly the old hymns of the church, and Mrs. Noah Pruitt and Miss Pearl Mae Warner sang, "How Beautiful Heaven Must Be!"

The little body was carried to the cemetery and was tenderly put away to sleep until the Lord shall come again. The sympathy of their friends go out to the young parents and others of the family circle, in the hours of their loneliness.
