W. H. MAXWELL DIES

Sorrow was universal in Bronte and Coke county, and all over West Texas when the intelligence became current Monday morning that W. H. Maxwell had died in the early morning hours at a hospital in San Angelo where he had lingered for several weeks.

The body was returned to the family home in Bronte where it rested until Tuesday afternoon. Following religious services at the Methodist church, conducted by Rev. J. H. Thompson, the pastor, and Rev. Lewis Stuckey, pastor of the Baptist church, interment was in Fairview.

Deceased was born at Dukedom, Tennessee, October 14, 1869, making him to be in his sixty-seventh year when he was called from the walks of life.

November 11, 1896 deceased and Miss Ava Jones were united in marriage. To them five children were born: four daughters, Mrs. I. M. Cumbie and Mrs. Ernest Ivey Bronte; Mrs. Arthur Tubbs, Robert Lee; Mrs. Earl Barr, Concho, and one son, W. H. Maxwell, Jr., Bronte. These with their mother, a brother, B. C. Maxwell, Paint Rock, and two sisters, Miss Lora Maxwell and Mrs. Ella Garrett, Ballinger, and six grand children, survive to sorrow over his passing.

June 5, 1898 deceased and family reached Texas, arriving at Ballinger. In the early teens he came with his family to Coke county and for thirty years always took an active interest in the affairs of the county. For fourteen years he was county and district clerk of Coke county, voluntarily retiring four years ago. Throughout his career as the one the people entrusted with the depository titles to their property, his was a service that was efficient and altogether conscientious, and there was never the least breath of suspicion with reference to his official service, and on his official record there is not a stain.

The life of deceased was one of usefulness—he always stood for law and order and for the best in private and public life. His life privately was clean and he never thought except in the highest Christian terms and his

There survive to sorrow over the passing of deceased a stepson, Marshall Sims, four sons: Powell, Lewis, Harold, and Lawrence, all of Bronte, and two daughters, Mesdames C. A. Taylor, Bronte, and Jewell Hardin, San Antonio, all of whom were present for the funeral. Beside the above, a number of grandchildren, other relatives and many friends sorrow over her going away.

For fifty-seven years deceased was a devoted member of the Methodist church, having professed faith in Christ when a little girl of only thirteen years, at Sacramento, California, and united with the church. Hence, it was befitting, every feature of the religious services, held in the church at the altars of which she had worshiped so long! The pastor paid her beautiful tribute, speaking on the topic, "A Good Woman."

Deceased a few years ago had for a time apartments with the writer and his wife. We came to appreciate deceased as a gracious Christian and our loyal good friend. We sorrow at her passing, but shall ever cherish the memories she has left us as a cultured, quipply, jovial-natured, gracious Christian woman.

Our sympathy goes out to the sorrowing. life has been a blessing to the world.

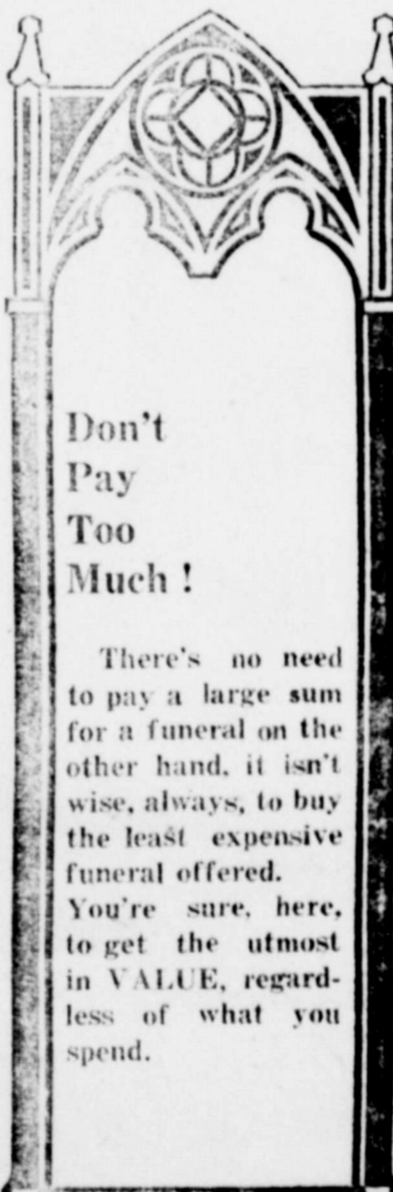

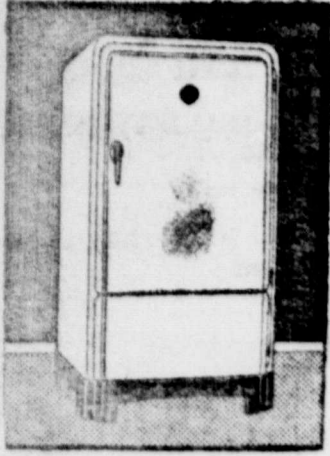

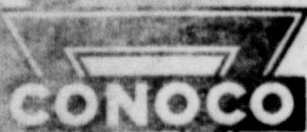
