### Harvest Swings From Milo to Beans

There's no letup between crops this month for the county's hard-pushing combine crews.

**AS MORE** and more producers wind up their big milo harvest, many are shutting off their combines just long enough to refill and re-gear them before aiming them toward the soybean fields.

A tremendous soybean harvest is expected this year, with 16,000 acres planted in Castro County — 9,000 of them on cotton land that was hauled out and plowed under earlier this year.

According to the county's elevator men, the soybean harvest is just getting started in some areas but is already 50 to 70 percent complete in others.

**PRICE IS** holding between \$2.30 and \$2.35 per bushel cash or loan, with most of the beans going into loan, elevator operators said.

Most elevator men said they expect Castro County's producers to come up with an average of 25 to 35 bushels per acre — although a few producers are hitting high above this average already.

Aaron Isaacs of Dimmitt Wheat Growers said he has received one crop that averaged 49 bushels. Jack Gregory of Castro County Grain Co. reported a top yield so far of 40 bushels, with 16 the lowest. J. R. Brown of Bruegel and Sons Elevator Co. reported a high of 40 and a low of 20. Deryl Clevenger of Hart Grain Co. said his top has been 58 and his lowest 23, while DeWayne Brown of Farmers Grain Co. of Hart has registered a top average of 51 bushels.

**SOYBEANS**, which are still gaining in economic importance because of their versatility, go into such widely varied products as cooking oil, frozen desserts, cattle feed, artificial meats and nylon. County producers this year are using the "yellow beans" to take up the slack from a hard-hit cotton crop.

Many of Castro County's soybeans are still ripening and others are waiting in the field until the milo harvest is completed, elevator men said, but they estimated that the county's 1957 soybean crop will all be in the elevators by mid-November.

**MEANWHILE**, the big milo harvest is clicking along, with the weather co-operating except for early-morning dew. Many milo fields that had too high a moisture content last week are plenty dry now for cutting.

Elevator operators said the milo harvest is now 65 to 80 percent complete and that averages are holding about the same as they reported last week — from 2,200 pounds per acre in the hardest hit hill areas to as high as 10,000 in some fields.

Castro County Grain Co. reported that it recorded a new high Sunday — a 9,860-pound average, actual weight.

**WEATHER** is the big factor now, and for the past week it has acted so through it knew the county's producers could use a good break.

"The weather is ideal — the best I've ever seen for a harvest," J. R. Brown said.

And as the harvest went into its all-important final stretch, Clevenger added: "Just pray for us."

Two prowler incidents in the past week have put law officers on constant patrol near Dimmitt's junior high and elementary schools.

**THE FIRST** incident was reported after school hours Tuesday of last week, when two junior high school girls complained that a man tried to pick them up as they walked home.

He was wearing only a T-shirt, the girls reported.

Although the girls differed in their descriptions of his car, they agreed that it was a late model two-tone.

Sheriff Jack Cartwright reported this week that a similar incident by a partially clad man in a car occurred in Silverton Monday afternoon. He said the Silverton prowler could have been the same man who tried to pick up the Dimmitt Junior High School girls last week.

**A SECOND** incident occurred Monday afternoon, but wasn't reported until 10 o'clock that night, the sheriff said.

Two grade school girls were walking home from school when an elderly man in a white car reportedly tried to lure them into his car. The girls refused and ran.

The mother of one of the grade school girls reported the incident to the sheriff's office Monday night, and city and county law officers have been patrolling the school areas constantly since.

**"WHEN THIS** type of incident happens," Sheriff Cartwright said, "a girl should get the license number of the car and run to a phone as fast as she can—anybody's phone—and call the sheriff's office or the operator."

### It's Candy Time For Servicemen

Bethel Home Demonstration Club will again sponsor its "Candy for Castro County Servicemen" Christmas project this year, and the candy-making deadline is Nov. 10.

**THE LADIES** are appealing county-wide for candy makers, servicemen's addresses and money for postage.

Candy should be individually wrapped to prevent breaking and sticking together, and should be packed in coffee cans. Each can should be cross-taped lengthwise all the way around to make sure the top will stay on.

**CANDY SHOULD** be taken to the Farm Bureau office, where the Bethel HD ladies will box it and address it for mailing. With only two weeks remaining until the mailing deadline, the ladies said early candy would be appreciated.

Money for postage, a'so, should be left with Mrs. Nelda Tuttle at the Farm Bureau office. Mrs. Glenda Ricker reported that the club has \$21 left in its mailing fund from last year.

**ADDRESSES** should be taken to Mrs. Raymond Hance in the county agent's office at the courthouse. Mrs. Hance compiled the original mailing list last year and will update it for this Christmas.

Mrs. Welch emphasized that addresses are needed for all of the county's servicemen—both in the US and overseas.

"Anyone with a son, friend or relative from Castro County who is serving anywhere in the military should give his name and address to Mrs. Hance," Mrs. Welch said.

She added: "Because of the complicated type of addresses our servicemen have, the complete address should be printed out and either taken or mailed to Mrs. Hance—not telephoned in."

**LAST YEAR**, Castro County candy-makers sent 58 five-pound boxes of candy to servicemen. Each man on the mailing list received at least one box, and those in Vietnam got two each.

Gifts to CROP are put to use under church supervision in more than 40 countries, strictly on the basis of need. CROP's exports of contributed and purchased food and supplies since 1947 have totaled \$17½ million, and its designation to other agencies, such as Catholic Relief Services and Lutheran World Relief, have totaled more than \$2 and cashed million.

THE HAPPY LIFE  
By Ronnie Parker

The angel announced the birth of Christ by saying, "I bring you good tidings of great joy" (Luke 2:10). This news brought joy because it told of a Saviour. There is joy in becoming a Christian and there is joy in living the Christian life.

The greatest and happiest life is the Christian life. If there was no life after the grave; if there was no heaven of bliss, still the Christian life would be the best possible life to live. There is joy in obedience, joy in sacrifice, joy in service and love for others, joy in worship and joy in winning souls to Christ and indeed this is Christianity.

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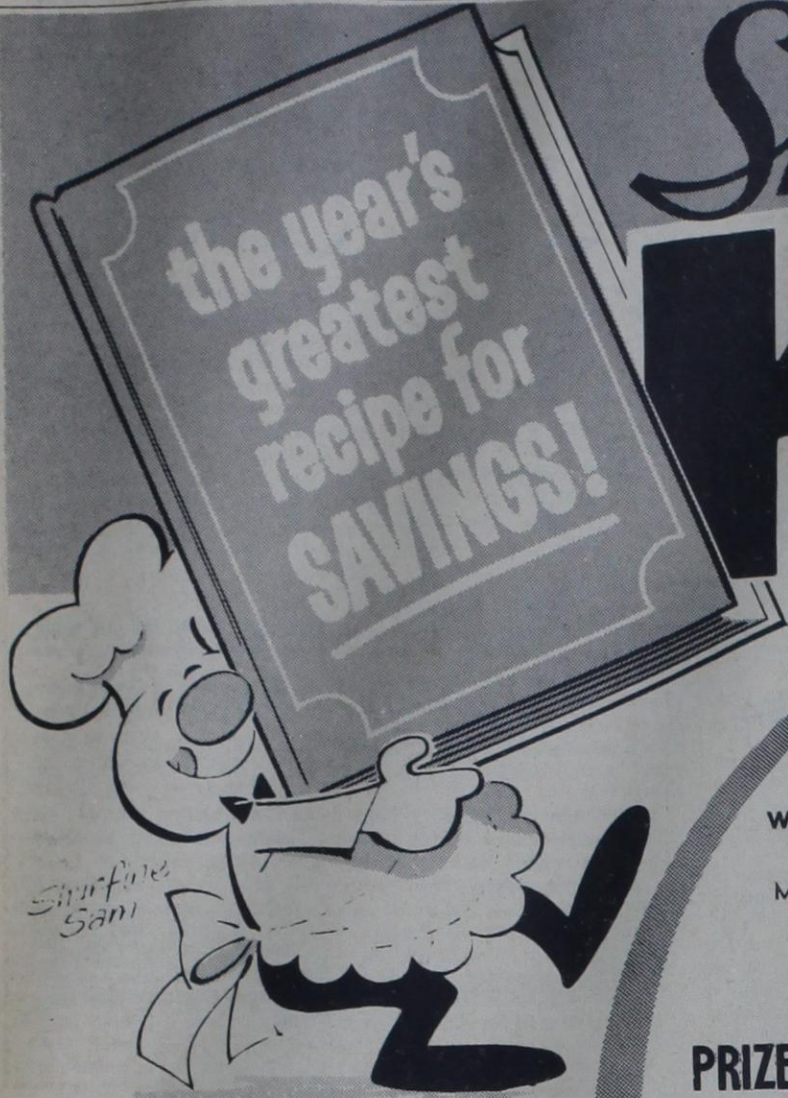
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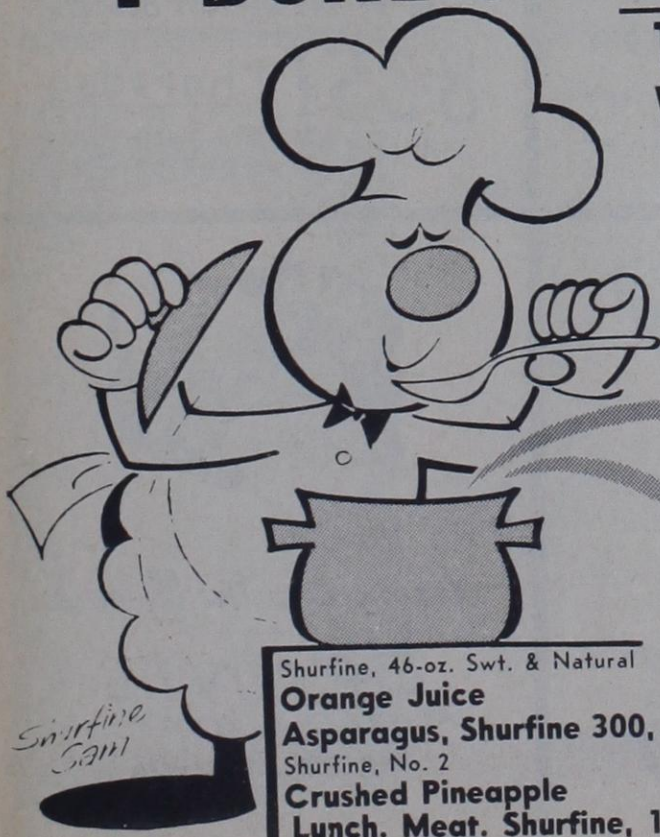
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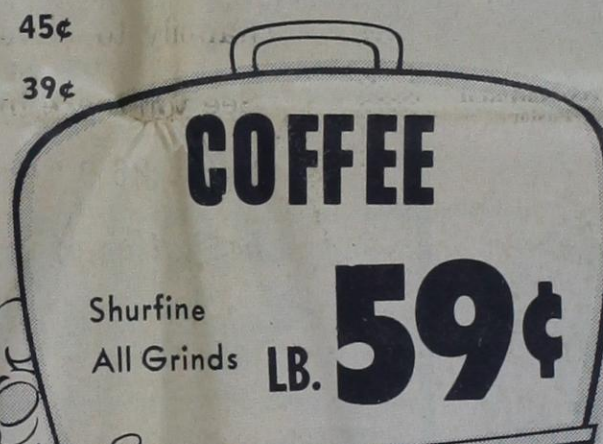

**REMEMBER TO be prepared** or all the little gobins who will come to see you Tuesday. It will be fun to see all the different characters. When I was little, boys were usually cowboys, devils or ghosts, and girls were witches, princesses, brides or ghosts. Now we even see all kinds of space creatures.  
I have found some very interesting information about some Halloween superstitions. Since the holiday was begun by the Celts in 834, each country has developed its own customs — some romantic, some eerie.  
In Scotland, young girls blindfold themselves and pick cabbage from the garden to find out if their future spouses will be young or old, poor or wealthy, and of sweet or sour disposition.  
IN IRELAND, a special Halloween food, cauldron, is used to foretell the future. In a mixture of mashed potatoes, parsley and chopped onions, a ring is placed to indicate marriage, a doll for children to come, a thimble for an old maid, and a coin for wealth. When the symbol is in your serving, you learn your future.  
Apple bobbing contests originally held romantic superstitions. It was believed that if the girl who was the apple slept with it under her pillow that night, she would dream of her future husband. Or, if she stood in front of a mirror, combing her hair and eating the apple, she would appear in the mirror over her shoulder.  
There are many other customs and superstitions dealing with Halloween. Superstitious persons guard themselves against wizards and their traditional associates — toads, cats and owls.

### Cotton Program Changes Outlined

Details of the 1968 Upland Cotton Program have been announced by Charley Hill, county office manager for the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

The principal changes from the 1967 program are:

- (1) THE REQUIRED diversion for farmers who wish to be cooperators in the acreage diversion program has been reduced from 12.5 percent to 5 percent of the regular allotment. The payment rate will be 10.76 cents per pound.
- (2) The payment rate for voluntary diversion (up to additional 30 percent of the allotment) has been reduced to 6 cents per pound.
- (3) The rules for measuring cotton planted in a skip-row pattern have been changed to those rules used from 1962 through 1965.

**MAJOR program provisions** which remain the same as for 1967 are:

- (1) The national acreage allotment remains unchanged.
- (2) A referendum will again be held by mail (Dec. 4-8) to determine if the program will be operative.
- (3) The national projected yield remains unchanged.
- (4) The domestic acreage allotment provisions remain unchanged.
- (5) THE LOAN rate remains at 20.25 cents per pound for Middling 1-inch cotton at average location.
- (6) The cotton diversion program is continued and is voluntary.
- (7) Price support payments will be made as in 1967. (The rate at 12.24 cents per pound, however, will be higher.)
- (8) Small farm provisions are continued.
- (9) Export market acreage remains the same.

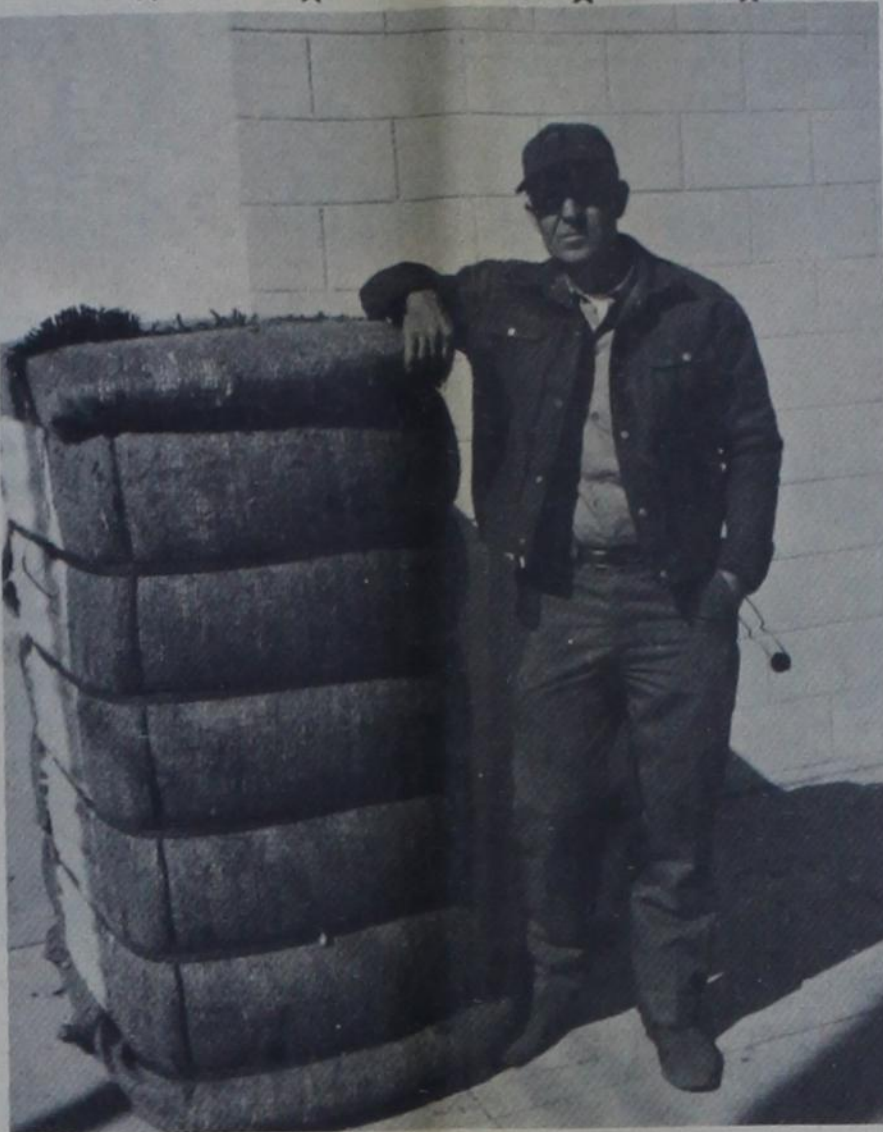
They exchanged vows in a double-ring ceremony at Muleshoe's First Methodist Church, with the Rev. Frank Perry performing the ceremony.

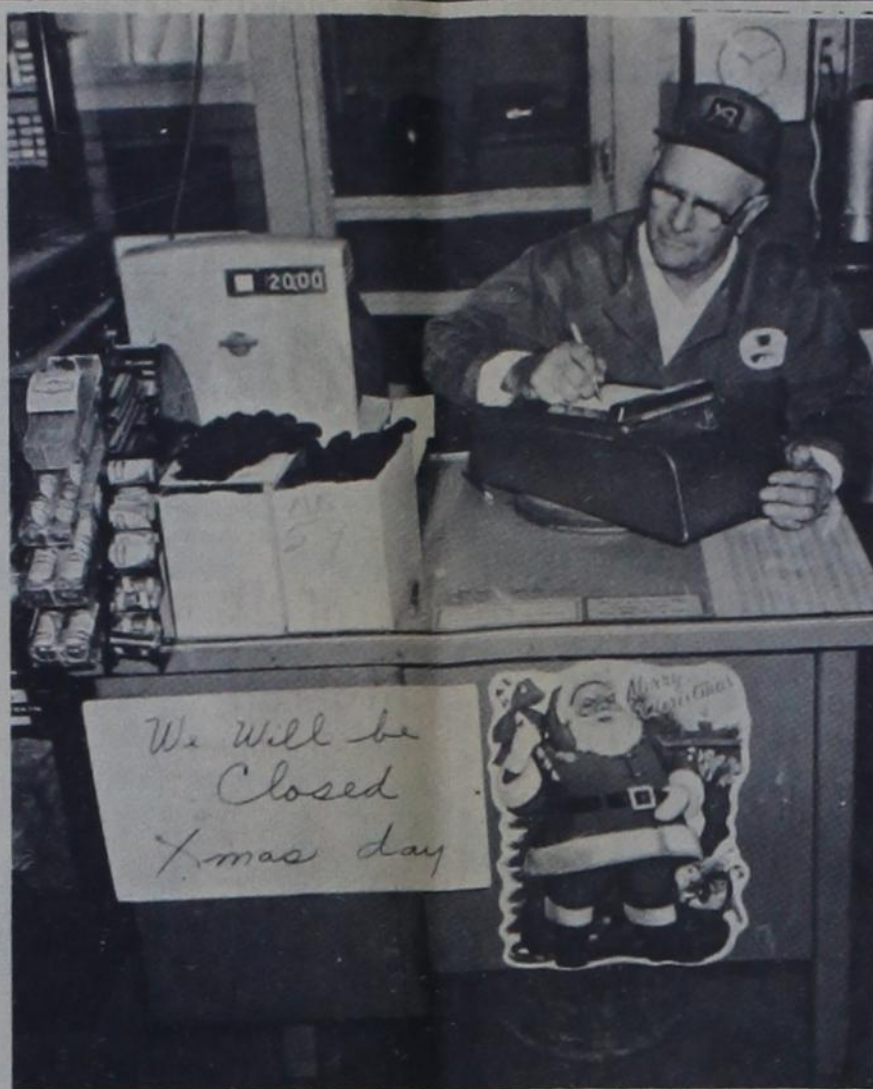

## Barnes in Race For No. 2 Post

House speaker Ben Barnes announced last week that he will be a candidate for lieutenant governor in next spring's primary election.

BARNES MADE his plans definite at a Capitol press conference. He said that he would open state campaign headquarters in Austin. Here are parts of his statement of candidacy:

"After careful consideration, I have decided to become a candidate for lieutenant governor in next year's primary election. This decision is not dependent upon future decisions or announcements by any other person.

"IN RECENT years, Texas has made tremendous gains in a number of important areas — in education, industrial expansion, water conservation, technical and vocational training, and in employment and rising income. . . .

"Despite our dramatic gains, great challenges loom before us. I believe I can make a greater contribution to our state's future in these years just ahead in the important post of lieutenant governor.

"Today, as never before, the future of our dual system of government is in peril. The federal government has monopolized available sources of public revenue. Federal funds raised in our state are returned to us with obligations, conditions and requirements designed to make us subservient to the will and the whim of the master planners. We must rapidly correct this federal abuse of power through an active and progressive state government. . . .

"LET US FOCUS more attention on the problems of agriculture. The farmer and rancher operate at the mercy of the elements and the market place. We need to develop new and expanded markets for Texas agricultural products. We should work for a strong, stable, profitable price structure for our farmers and ranchers. We need programs to retrain farm workers displaced by mechanization and to attract industry to rural areas. We need to revitalize the rural life in our state.

"These are some of the major assignments that we face. It would be easy to ignore their existence

or deny their importance. But such a course of action would lead only to decay and decline. Texas and Texans deserve more — and demand more — from their leaders in public life. As lieutenant governor, I shall do all in my power to see that we meet these needs and aspirations of our state.

"This is not a task for any one man — or for any few men. We need the cooperation and help of all Texans — both in public office and in private life. As speaker of the House of Representatives for two terms, I have learned to work in harmony and cooperation with the other 149 members of the House. As lieutenant governor, I fully expect to work in harmony and cooperation with all the members of the Senate, and with all other officials at the federal, state and local levels of government.

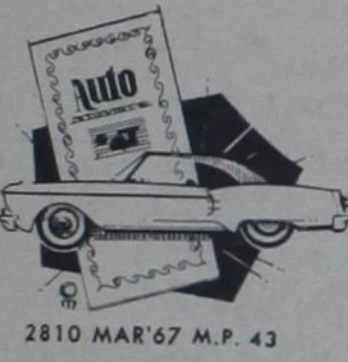

# Chiefs Ambush Bobcats Into Second-Place Tie

A fired-up bunch of Friona Chieftains, knowing they had to beat the Dimmitt Bobcats to stay in contention for the District 3-AA title, took charge and handed the Bobcats their first district loss, 13-0, Friday night in Friona.

**THE CHIEFTAINS** dominated play. They ran 64 offensive plays to 42 for the Bobcats, led in total yardage 15 to 4, and in total yardage 243 to 98 for the Cats. This ball control proved to be the margin of victory.

A scoreless first half marked by numerous punts told fans the game was going to be close and tough. Dimmitt punted the pigskin four times and Friona gave

the ball up by route of the toe twice. The Chieftains got one penetration in the second quarter; but the Cats threw them back across the 20 to keep the first half scoreless.

David Land's kickoff marked the beginning of the second half and Friona took over on its 21-yard line. The Chieftains stalled out at midfield and the Bobcats took over a Friona punt on the 10-yard line and looked for a long drive.

**BUT THE** Chieftains got the big break of the game as they jumped on a Dimmitt fumble off the option play deep in Bobcat territory at the 15-yard line. From the 6-yard line, Chieftain Quarterback

Johnny Barker hit Larry Graves for the score. The conversion was kicked by Sahara Gonzales, and Friona had a 7-0 lead.

The Bobcats took Friona's kickoff and drove determinedly to the 36-yard line of the Chieftains before the Friona defense took over on downs. Barker took the ball to midfield with a 25-yard run as the third quarter ended.

The Bobcats got hot again and hit hard after taking the Friona punt on the 13-yard line. But the Bobcats couldn't move against the huge line of the Chieftains and punted to the Friona 40. But moments later a fumble recovery by senior guard Glen Murrell gave the Bobcats the ball on their own 33.

**JOHN HAYS** drilled passes to Hutton and Thomas, but Friona got another good break by taking over on a bad snap of a Dimmitt punt on the Bobcat 35.

The Bobcats again caused a Friona fumble as senior tackle Gary Crum jumped on the ball at the 29-yard line to stop the drive. But moments later Friona intercepted a long Dimmitt pass and took over at the Friona 29.

Chieftain halfback Tony Perea broke tackles and rambled to the 11-yard line of the Bobcats. A broken clock caused confusion for the two teams, but Friona managed to score on the last play of the game as Barker took the ball 11 yards for the score. Dimmitt blocked the point-after kick after the clock had run out with the scoreboard showing a revised total of 13-0.

**THIS MARKED** the first time this season that Bobcats had been held to less than 200 yards total offense, and also the first time Dimmitt had been held scoreless. Friona also became the only opponent to rack up more first downs than the Bobcats.

After the game, the Bobcats agreed that the Chieftains "seemed to know where all our plays were going — they had us well scouted."

This is a "must" game for both gridiron rivals, and will take the spotlight in the District 3-AA scene. A loss by either team would virtually ruin chances for a district title.

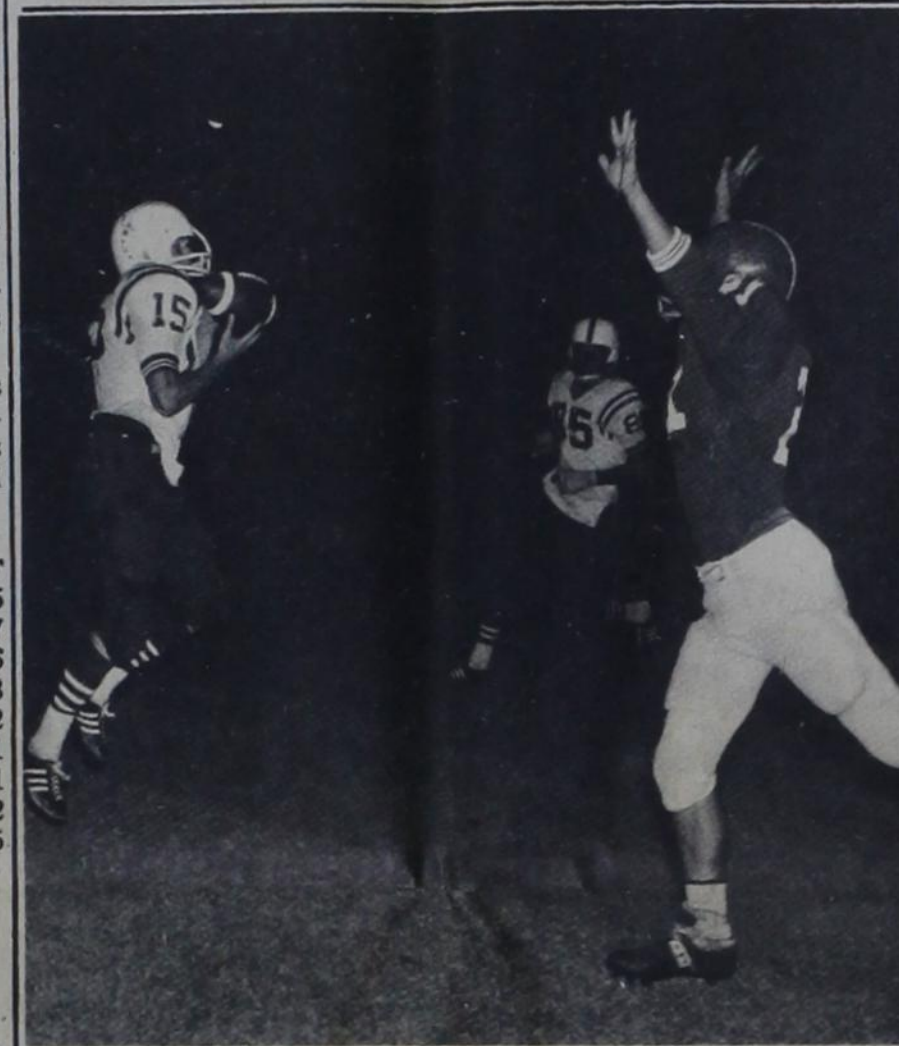

## State Spotlights 'Clean Air Week'

"Of all the dangers our advanced civilization has created, none is more serious than the pollution of our air. We can purify our water before we drink it. We can restore the scarred and lacerated landscape. But we must breathe the air as it comes to us, polluted or not."

IT WAS IN THE light of this statement by President Lyndon Johnson that he proposed to the Congress the Air Quality Act of 1967 and called for all-out government and industry cooperation in an expanded attack on air pollution.

During the week of Oct. 22-28, Texans — like Americans throughout the nation — are observing the 1967 version of Cleaner Air Week. The significance of the special week this year has taken on new dimensions after the Texas Air Control Board put much effort into establishing and carrying out regulations controlling pollution of the air in Texas.

Objective of Cleaner Air Week is three-fold: to create better understanding of community, state and regional problems related to the protection of the nation's fresh air supply; to promote cooperative effort by everyone toward the solution of such problems; and to encourage individuals and groups to play major roles in coordinated control efforts, particularly at the community level.

CLEANER AIR Week, observed throughout the United States since 1949, mounts a national information program on neighborhood budgets with maximum use of local resources.

Endorsed by three presidents and hundreds of governors and mayors, it is sponsored by the Air Pollution Control Association, an organization made up of thousands of individuals and groups in this country and abroad.

Because of a high degree of volunteer activity by individuals and groups, Cleaner Air Week is carried out on a smaller budget than some less-publicized and less public service-oriented "weeks." However, in Texas the event is given statewide publicity through the State Health Department, combining efforts of the divisions of public health education and occupational health.

Last year the state health agency won one of 10 nationally recognized blue-ribbon awards for its efforts to educate the public on the need for cutting back air pollution.

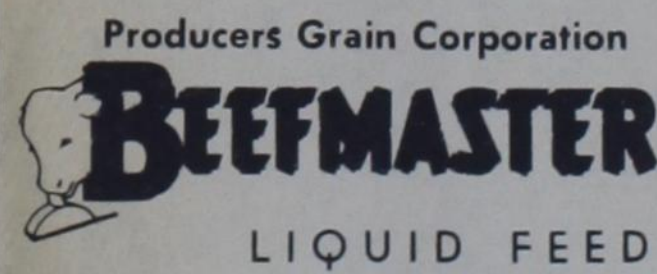

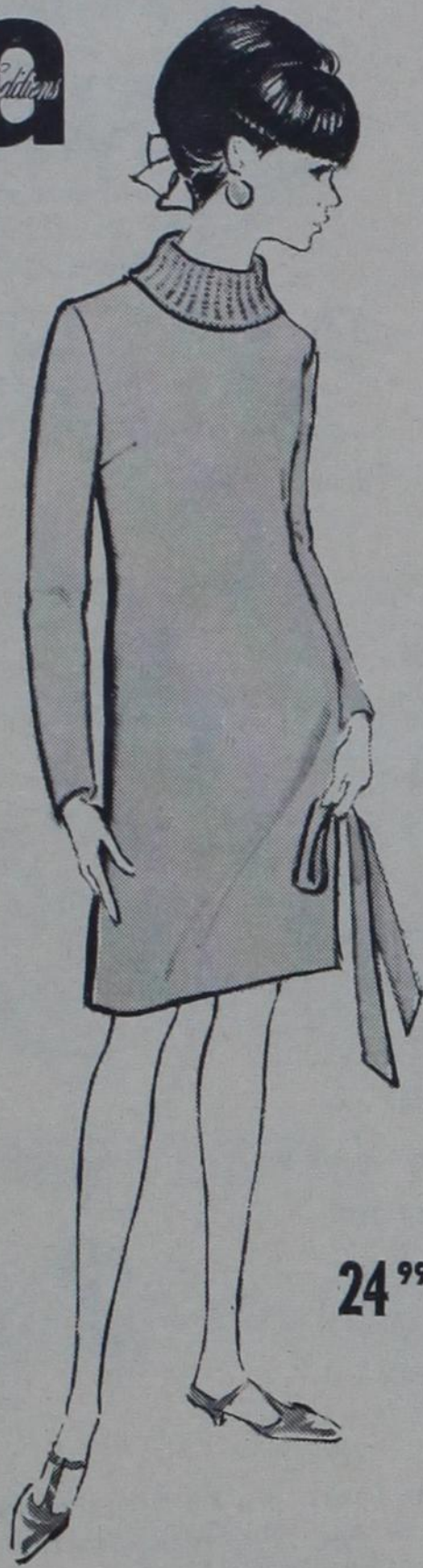

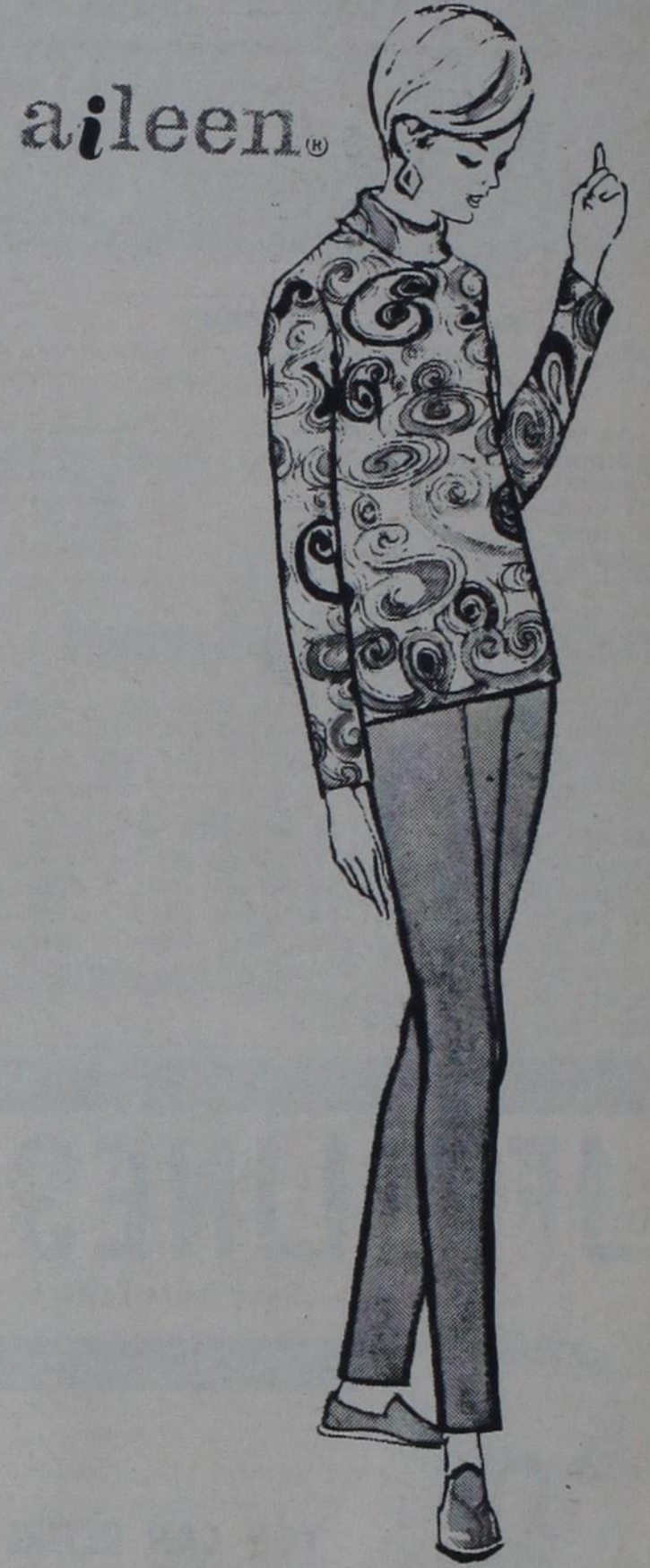
