JACK RABBITS FOR CHICKEN FEED

The average Jack Rabbit will weigh after skinning and cleaning about four pounds. Here is prime meat feed for a flock of sixty-four laying hens a day.

Nothing makes hens lay like fresh meat. All egg rations, advocated in poultry journals, by experts call for a liberal amount of meat scraps and bone meal.

Extreme care should be used in the preparation of this ration to prevent filth which always breeds disease. A good plan of sanitation is to kill and clean the rabbit, dispose of the skin and entrails by burying or burning.

If a meat chopper or sausage grinder is available grind or chop the meat bones and all as near as practical, then feed fresh not more than one pound to 16 hens to begin with. If no meat chopper is available hang up in quarters or pieces in the chicken yard. Be careful to remove all leavings. Nothing breeds disease among chickens but refuse and filth.

Do not feed a chicken any meat that is not fresh and clean—"grubs" or "wolves" in the rabbit's back can do no harm, as they are but the larvae of large flies, but be careful of maggots, screw worms, and their "blows" or eggs. Keep the yard clean. The Jack Rabbits in the last forty years apparently have broken up the set down strike of the prairie dogs in Coke county, and are now moving freely and rapidly around. So, why not bring the Easter Vision true and put him to producing eggs. One Jack Rabbit is worth three dozen eggs.

Wednesday evening, May 19, Prof. S. O. Murdock of San Angelo, deputy state school superintendent, will deliver the address before the graduating class.

There are twelve members of the senior class this year—six girls and six boys.

Prof. O. L. Conger, superintendent, is completing his fourth year in that capacity with the Norton school. Recently he was unanimously and enthusiastically chosen by the board of trustees to the same position again.

Six members of the faculty, besides Prof. Conger, have been re-elected to their several positions again. Two of the faculty did not apply for their positions again. Mrs. Ray, who until her marriage Christmas was Miss Homa Lee Childress of Miles did not seek re-election. Miss Gladys Lehman who has successfully taught in the school for several years did not ask to be elected again, as she plans to enter other work.

The faculty chosen thus far, besides Superintendent Conger, are: W. E. Elkins, principal, C. M. McGlathery, Miss Pearl Locke—high school.

Sixth and seventh grades, Miss Bessie Mae Wheeler; fourth and fifth grades, Miss Lucille Todd; primary, Miss Eunice Lilly.

The two vacancies in the faculty will not be filled at present.
