## MRS. W. L. MAY DIES IN EL PASO HOSPITAL

Many hearts were made sad in and around Bronte Friday when the news came that Mrs. W. L. May, formerly of Bronte, but for several years had resided with her husband and family at Las Cruces, New Mexico, was dead.

Deceased died in a hospital at El Paso where eight days before she had undergone major surgery. The body was returned to the home at Las Cruces, where, Sunday afternoon, following religious services, at the St. Paul Methodist church, of which deceased was a member, interment was in the Masonic cemetery in that city.

Deceased was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Williams, deceased, who sleep side by side, in Bronte's beautiful Fairview cemetery, and was born at Waco April 14, 1888, making her to be 49 years, three months and five days old when death came and called her from loved ones and friends.

Coming with her parents to Bronte when only three years old, she spent her childhood and girlhood days here, growing to beautiful young womanhood. Her family was one of the pioneer families of Bronte and this part of West Texas who had to do with the shaping of all this country in its ideals of life and public welfare.

December 12, 1905 deceased was married to W. L. May, who also belonged to one of the old-time families of this part of the West. They resided at Bronte and Roscoe until 1931, at which time they went to make their home at Las Cruces. To them five children were born—two girls and three boys, who survive and all were present for the funeral, and with their father sorrow over the passing of their mother. Besides the husband and children one sister and four brothers survive. The sister is Mrs. R. L. Keyes, Bronte; the brothers are Eugene Williams, Big Spring; Martin, Knott; Walter, Ackerley, and John of

## SENATOR JOE ROBINSON

Not since the death of William Jennings Bryan has the nation been shocked as it was Wednesday morning, when by wire and radio it was heralded around the world that Senator Joe Robinson of Arkansas was found dead in his apartment in Washington.

As to his public career we will let others who know Senator Robinson write. We speak of him only as to his private life.

Joe Robinson was a "commoner" in the real sense of the term. Having fought his way up, he was "of the people, for the people, and by the people," in all his thinking.

Senator Robinson was a "gentleman," in all its meaning—a "gentle man"—a man of gentle mien.

He was a lover of little children. The writer and wife have tender recollections of Senator Robinson in this particular. It was ten years ago the 4th of this July. We had reached our "old home town," Seaford, in Arkansas, on the morning of July 3. Early on the morning of the 4th Senator and Mrs. Robinson reached Seaford and came to the hotel to await the time for them to go to another town some twelve miles away, where Senator Robinson was the speaker of the day at a 4th of July celebration. Our little girl who was then four years old was playing about in the hotel lobby. Senator Robinson became attracted to her and engaged her attention. Soon they were romping and playing and attracting the attention of all who came in. And though Senator Robinson was just from the halls of congress where he had been grappling with world problems and dealing with men from all the lands of the earth, and though men and women of high position were calling to meet their senator, yet even as courtesy would permit he would turn back to his new-made little girl friend—and seemingly, forgetting himself and his high position for the time being, at least, down on the floor he romped and played. And it was plainly written on his face that far as that morning was concerned he was not "United States Senator Joe Robinson" with the destinies of a republic resting upon him—but, just a man as free from care as the child with whom he was romping and playing and as hilariously happy as the little baby girl whom he held on his knees and gazed into her baby eyes.

Being old-fashioned in our religious thought and one hundred per cent orthodox concerning man's future state, as we write this, we wonder—oh, we wonder!—if it may not be that now Senator Robinson and our baby girl, who left us nearly five years ago, are romping and playing together in the Garden of God as they did on that July morning a decade ago! Of course, if only we knew it was thus, we would be supremely happy! Only by faith, however, can we wait and hope—and this "hope we have as an anchor to the soul."

Notwithstanding, the above intimate and happy incident leaves the parents of the little girl with whom this great world character played as another little child, only golden recollections of him.

And, truly, a man, after all, is greatest when he is most like a little child!
