The PIK plan - to pay farmers with surplus commodities
instead of money for cutting back further on their production rigiead of money for cutting back further on their production originated with the Texas Corn Growers Association, which is
headquartered in Dimmitt. The TCGA board proposed the plan to the USDA in November as a way to reduce crippling uurpluses, cut government storage and price-support costs,
stem overproduction and help farmers weather the cost-price crisis overproduction and help farmers weather has driven many out of business. The PIK plan is similar - but not idenstical - to programs
used in the 1930s to help curb cotton production and in the 960s to help ease a feed-grain surplus.
The program applies to five major US crops - wheat, cotton,

participating in the government's acreage set-aside program may, under the new PIK plan, take additional land from
