Two-sport all-stater

Watts is named to all-state team

Jeff Watts of Dimmitt has earned an honorable mention football selections, announced Sunday by the Texas Sports Writers Association.

Watts - already an allstater in basketball - made the football dream squad as an offensive tight end.

The 6-4, 195-lb. senior caught 10 passes for 303 yards and scored five touchdowns for the Bobcats, who finished the 1982 season with a 6-4 record and a tie for second place in District

Watts also was a mainstay for the Bobcats as a punter (42 punts for a 37-yard season average) and as a defensive end (one interception, one fumble recovery and 73 tackles, including 13 quarter-

Watts earned a reputation both as a blocker and as a pass receiver on offense. One of the main strengths of his pass-catching was that he knew what to do with the ball after he caught it.

"Most of his receptions during the year were on drag routes or throw-back routes, head football Coach Gene Griffin explained. "We hit him deep only once during the year, so a lot of the yardage he got (30.3 per pass) is what he gained after catching the senior, second-team line-

Watts was a team captain this year "and filled a very large leadership role" for the Bobcats, Griffin said.

"We're extremely pleased about his selection," Griffin added. "Not only is Jeff a great athlete; he's also a fine young man. He's the kind of athlete every coach dreams about. I think his selection is also a compliment to our program and the things we're trying to accomplish.'

Several universities have expressed an interest in Watts's football ability, including Texas Tech, UT-Austin, Texas A&M and UT-

The all-stater is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Watts.

District 2-AAA champion Littlefield, which advanced to the state finals, landed two players in four positions on the all-state selections and another on the honorable mention list. They were senior Bryan Gregory, firstteam quarterback and firstteam defensive back; senior Scott Lewis, first-team defensive tackle and second-team center; and senior Pat Demel, honorable mention linebacker.

Other area players named to the all-state team included Geryl Lacy, Slaton junior, second team running back; and Kyle Brock, Lockney

Nothing new begun in '82

Although no new construction was begun in Dimmitt in 1982, building permits were issued for a total of \$345,900 worth of expansion and other projects, according to figures released by the city.

\$225,300 of that amount came from six commercial projects, the largest of which was the addition of a 30x30foot storage building at Cargill, Inc., at an estimated cost of \$200,000.

Under the category of alterations to a residence, the largest item was a 1,300square-foot addition to a residence at an estimated cost of \$30,000. The 12 projects registered in this category totaled \$91,000 in value.

In home additions - carports, garages, storages and miscellaneous - 22 projects were registered at a total value of \$29,600. The projects ranged in value from \$100 to \$11,000.

Also, 11 mobile homes were moved in that were registered but no assigned values were listed.

Building permit fees in 1982 were charged according to the size and sometimes the type of building project involved, until in November when the 1982 Uniform Building Code was adopted by the city, including a new fee schedule based on the value of building projects.

Locals make PIK proposals

Taking advantage of the 30-day public comment period on the new Payment-in-Kind (PIK) program, local farmers are drawing up proposals to extend program deadlines and insure orderly marketing of the surplus commodities which producers will receive in return for laying out extra

The Texas Corn Producers Association, headquartered in Dimmitt, is serving as one catalyst for area farmers' suggestions on how to make the program more workable and beneficial to farmers.

The Texas Corn Producers Board is scheduled to meet today (Thursday) at 9:30 a.m. in the TCGA office at 112-A W. Bedford St. to work on an orderly-marketing proposal and consider other suggestions for the new program.

Also, the TCGA is distributing fact sheets, a PIK program calendar and crop-date maps which Ray Joe Riley picked up last week at the USDA in Washington, D.C. The information packets give a full summary of the PIK program's provisions as of its announcement date Jan. 11.

In proposals drawn so far by local farmers, the TCGA is calling for a rollback of several program deadlines.

The Corn Growers are proposing that the USDA:

-Move the sign-up deadline from March 11 to March 31. (The sign-up period will begin Jan. 24.)

-Change the date for county ASC committees to open Whole Base Bids from March 18 to April 8.

-Give producers eight months from the crop availability date, instead of five, to accept title to a PIK commodity or to liquidate outstanding CCC loans.

-Provide producers who liquidate loans on farm-stored commodities with a payment equivalent to a maximum of eight months' storage (instead of seven).

The TCGA proposals also ask that wheat growers be allowed to replant up to March 31 any poor stand of wheat that was originally planted before Jan. 10, and that corn and grain sorghum be made interchangeable for base purposes, adjusted for price differences.

TCGA President Carl King is scheduled to join Assistant Secretary of Agriculture John Ford, Congressman Kent Hance and Tommy Fondrin of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., in two information programs in this area Friday.

The first will be a call-in program Friday afternoon at Radio Station KFYO in Lubbock, and the second will be a public meeting at 7 p.m. Friday at the Hereford Community Center on Park Avenue in Hereford.

The Dimmitt Board of Aldermen has pledged its efforts to protest the closing of the local office of the Fort Worth & Denver Railway Co., as has been proposed by that company to the Texas Railroad Commission.

Two representatives of local rail customers told the aldermen at their Monday night meeting that the closing of the local agency could spell trouble for Dimmitt.

The railway company has asked the Railroad Commission for permission to close its agency here, but before the closing can be approved, the commission must determine that the public will not be adversely affected by the closing.

Shippers who use the railroad, as well as cities or members of the public, may protest the proposed closing by writing a letter to the director of the Commission's Transportation Division at Capitol Station, P.O. Drawer 12967, Austin, 78711. The protests must be received by the commission no later than

If protests are received, a public hearing will be held in the affected area. If no protests are received, the commission will consider the proposal at a hearing in Austin on Feb. 4.

It is emphasized that rail service to and from Dimmitt will not be stopped. It is just that the railroad proposes to transfer the agency work from here to its Plainview office.

"I think that a lot of the businesses Dimmitt has are centered around the railroad. especially the agri-businesses," said Steven Burnett, plant superintendent of Cargill, Inc. "I know that Cargill, for one, would not have come to Dimmitt, if it were not for the railroad

Burnett said that he fell there would be more shipping problems without a loca agent who "could be right or top of things."

"Right now, we can communicate with the train in transit and we can make changes right in the middle of making up a train here," he said, "but there wouldn't be the same flexibility if everything had to go through Plain-

If a Dimmitt customer had a rail car ready to pick up after 3 p.m., it would probably have to wait for the next day's train, since the same-day train would have already gone back to Plainview, according to Hufhines. Also, if a customer called for a rail car to be picked up, but then didn't get it filled after all, the car might be picked up

"There will most likely be a lot of mixups, and definitely plenty of delays," Hufhines surmised.

Hufhines said that Plainview doesn't do as much rail business as Dimmitt does.

"In fact, Dimmitt has more rail business than Lubbock is doing," he added. "I hope we can get a lot of customers to testify to that fact. It should definitely help our case.'

Carl Collyer, manager of Bruegel & Sons, Inc., told the city board Monday that his company plans to register a protest and is also trying to contact other rail customers and concerned citizens to voice their concerns.



Tuesday: Swiftettes vs. Sudan

By BRENDA SCHULTE The biggest drama in North Texas girls' basketball opens Tuesday in Nazareth.

Act 1 of the possible threeact drama will be staged at 6:30 p.m. in Nazareth's gym, when the Swiftettes host Sudan in the two powerhouse teams' first District 6-A meet-

THE CAST: The Swiftettes, the well-oiled machine of Coach Joe Lombard, who have won an unprecedented six consecutive state championships; and the Hornettes, returning most of their talent from last year's team which lost by only two and four points in the teams' two district meetings. Sudan is ranked No. 1, Nazareth No. 2 in Class A in the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches poll this year.

Both teams are undefeated (4-0) in district play, and both boast impressive overall records. Nazareth is 20-2 and Sudan is 21-1.

In the past four years the teams have met six times in playoff games. Sudan has never won. Nazareth won the first four encounters by sizeable margins. But, last season, the Hornettes narrowed the gap, losing by only two and four points, with both games decided in the waning seconds.

THE PLOT: Look for both teams to press, both to start in man-to-man defenses, and both to run disciplined

Nazareth will be depending on its depth, and a proven defensive effort (which has held opponents to 30.1 points a game). The Swiftettes also players to rebound with the taller Hornettes, and provide an inside scoring attack.

Sudan will be counting on its height advantage, and the scoring prowess of Lisa

Nazareth should have the edge in depth, with eight players logging a lot of playing time, including 5-8 post Shari Schilling who comes off the bench to score 10 points a game.

Sudan has six players who see a lot of action, including former starting point guard Missy Fisher, now back on the squad following an injury (broken hand) she suffered earlier this season.

LaDawn Schmucker and Ramona Heiman, both have seen a lot of action, and should help the Swiftettes if called upon.

Playing outside for the Hornettes are wings Shanda Vernon (5-7, six markers per contest) and Jeannia Nix (5-5, averaging nine points). Leading the Sudan charge will be Lisa Wood, recently moved to the point guard position, averaging an impressive 23.7

points per game. Although the Swiftette defense held Wood below her better than 20 point average in the two meetings last year, a hot streak by the 5-9 sharpshooter could well make the difference in the game.

Fisher is Sudan's sixth player, and 5-8 post Shaunda Masten could see some playing time Tuesday.



City sets hearing for mobile home changes

A public hearing on the proposed changes has been set for the aldermen's Feb. 8 meeting at 6:30 p.m. At that time, if the aldermen feel any alterations are needed for the proposals, they must be approved by at least four of the five aldermen.

Copies of the proposals may be viewed at the city manager's office at city hall.

Proposals include changing the boundaries of Mobile Home Zones 1 and 2, and putting more restrictions on the types of mobile homes that can be placed in Zone 2.

Some of the proposals will not affect homes already in place in either zone, but two of the proposals will affect all mobile homes in the city, as well as those moved in later.

Those proposals spell out requirements and time limits for the tying down and skirting of the structures.

The aldermen thanked the zoners for their work and effort in preparing the report and commended them for

"doing a good job." Deciding that benefits of membership outweigh the cost, the aldermen decided to renew the city's membership in the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC). The cost is \$244.68 for the next nine months.

Police Chief Don Franklin told the board that his men have already saved that much in tuition fees for special law enforcement schools by showing membership in the PRPC.

City Director of Administration Jo Hamilton told the board that there is \$20,401.38 now available from the debt service fund, since all of the city's general obligation occurred.

As far as I can understand it, the VA has not yet come up with granting a serviceconnection status for the Vietnam veterans who believe that their condition is related to agent orange exposure; but they are still testing the matter. However, all veterans with discharges under honorable conditions are eligible for medical treatment when other conditions are

The Veterans Administration has launched a special effort to contact all seriously disabled Vietnam-era veterans who could but still haven't taken advantage of its vocational rehabilitation program.

Those efforts include appeals through the news media and by letter, telephone and personal visits, said the Director, Waco VA Regional Office.

Vietnam-era veterans with disabilities incurred during, or aggravated by, military service may be eligible for such vocational rehabilitation and counseling.

In order to apply for those benefits, veterans should visit, write to or telephone the Waco VA Regional Office tollfree number 1-800-792-3271. Help also can be found in the
