



Next we touched Venice-"the city beautiful." Our hotel was on Grand Canal, close to Doge's palace and St. Mark's cathedral. One of the strangest things with reference to Venice is that it has the largest garage in Europe, and yet there is not a car in Venice. The people come in from the surrounding places, leave their cars in the garage and take vessels into Venice. There are 150 canals and 400 bridges in Venice. The streets are canals, but there are sidewalks along in front of the places of business. You take a boat and go to the place you wish to visit and you can walk on the sidewalks to the next cross street, and there is the bridge over which you can pass to the next street.

From Venice we went to Rome by train. Rome is 550 miles from Venice. Rome is the most important city in Italy, as here the vatican is located. Here we saw St. Peter's Cathedral and the Vatican City.
