Bronte Gas Dealer Wins Free Trip As Best Seller

Geo. Thomas, Magnolia service station operator, is "just a little bit tickled." And it is all because "George" had occasion in recent weeks to show other Magnolia dealers throughout his district, which is the Fort Worth district, "just how to put it over" or rather "just how to put the gasoline through the hose."

The Magnolia Company inaugurated a gasoline-selling contest some months ago, among its dealers in this district, offering a three days' free trip to different places of interest in Texas, to the winners, under the rules under which the contest was inaugurated. The goal was to have the largest increase of the sales of gasoline over the previous month, according to the class of dealers in which the dealer was classified. In Mr. Thomas' class there were twenty-five winners, and Mr. Thomas was the fifteenth man in his class, making only fourteen dealers in the district, in his class, who had larger monthly increases of sales than did Mr. Thomas.

The contest closed August 31, and the free trip by the winners will begin September 20th. There will be sixty-nine winners in all in the party. The party will leave Fort Worth September 20 and their itinerary will carry them to Beaumont, Port Arthur, Sabine Pass, Galveston, a trip on a ship out at sea, Houston, Huntsville, including a visit to Sam Houston's old home and to the state prison. The party will be out three days, with every nickel of expenses paid by the Magnolia Company.

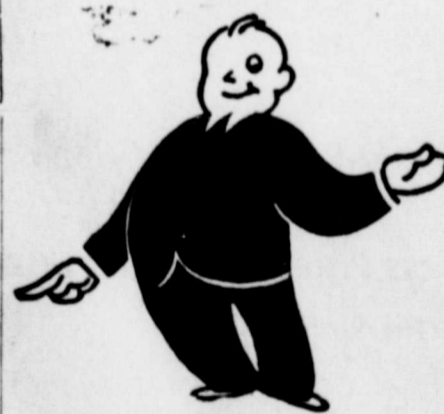

There is no question of more vital importance touching the permanent prosperity of West Texas than that with reference to the growing of small grain.

To this time the question of growing small grain in West Texas has been a naphazard venture—all the odds have been against the small grain farmer. The insects and other enemies of small grain, as well as the drouth has made the venture to grow small grain one of great risk. But, men have been studying the question and therefore, those who grow small grain now, do not assume such tremendous risk, provided they take advantage of the information available regarding the matter.

Smut in wheat is one of the greatest disadvantages in the growing of wheat successfully in West Texas. No man, perhaps has given more thought and study to smut in wheat than has C. L. Smut Treatment

Below is the address I delivered over KRBC, at Abilene August 22, 1938 on "SMUT TREATMENT OF WHEAT:"

In the Crop Year of 1937 we estimate that the farmers in the northern part of Runnels County and the southern part of Taylor County lost at least \$50,000.00 because of STINKING SMUT in wheat.

Most farmers were convinced that something must be done, so for the next planting the farmers around Winters, Bradshaw and Lawn purchased over 650 pounds of the New Improved CERESAN and 150 pounds COPPER CARBONATE for treating wheat. Result: Our estimate for Crop Year, the farmer lost only about \$3,000.00 by not treating wheat.

New improved CERESAN is easy to use and only takes about 1-2 ounce per bushel of wheat and is a sure preventive if used at least 24 hours before planting; however the treatment may be made as long as two months before planting, with good success; but a longer time than this is not advised, as there is a chance of the treatment weakening when exposed too long.

Smutty wheat, in our opinion, should never be treated for planting, but get good, clean wheat and treat that. Smutty wheat has been treated and the smut killed, but we do not think anyone should take that risk.

Smutty wheat cannot be used in milling flour without going through a very expensive process and even then it is doubtful if it will make a good quality flour. It is not good for feed without washing. That is the reason for having discounts, as high as 7c per bushel. And smutty wheat is always lighter in test which brings an additional discount in price. The yield is also cut, sometimes as much as ten bushels per acre—thus making the loss very heavy.

Smutty wheat is very expensive to the elevator operator because he must have three extra bins to handle the three grades of smutty wheat. Operator's loss is also heavy because of mis-grading, as very often, he will grade a load of wheat as light smut and get a heavy smut grade at market.

It doesn't take much smut to take a dockage in price; 25 smut balls in 250 grams — light smut
26 to 50 smut balls in 250 grams — medium smut
Above 50 smut balls in 250 grams — heavy smut
Wheat with smut tagged ends and no smut balls is docked for heavy smut. This is the wheat in which the smut ball has been blown out during threshing or combining.

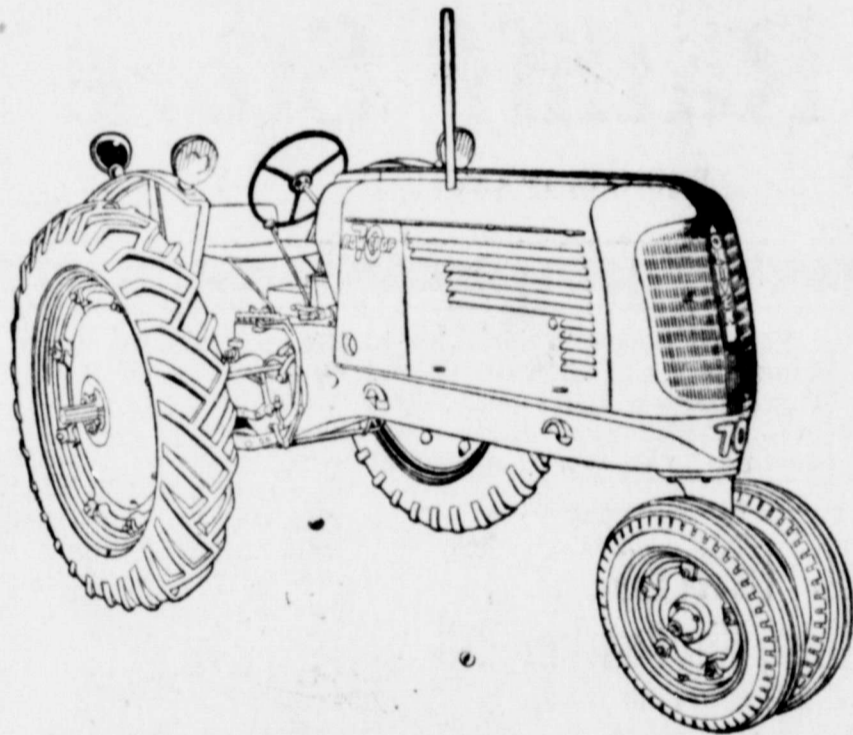

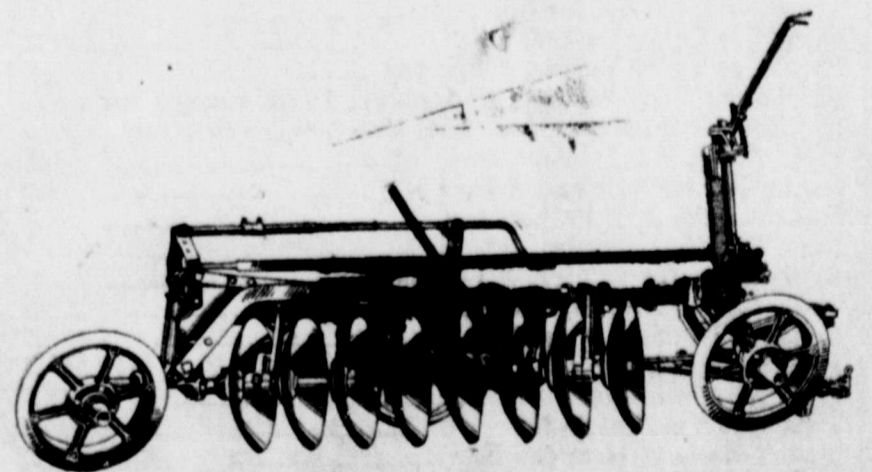

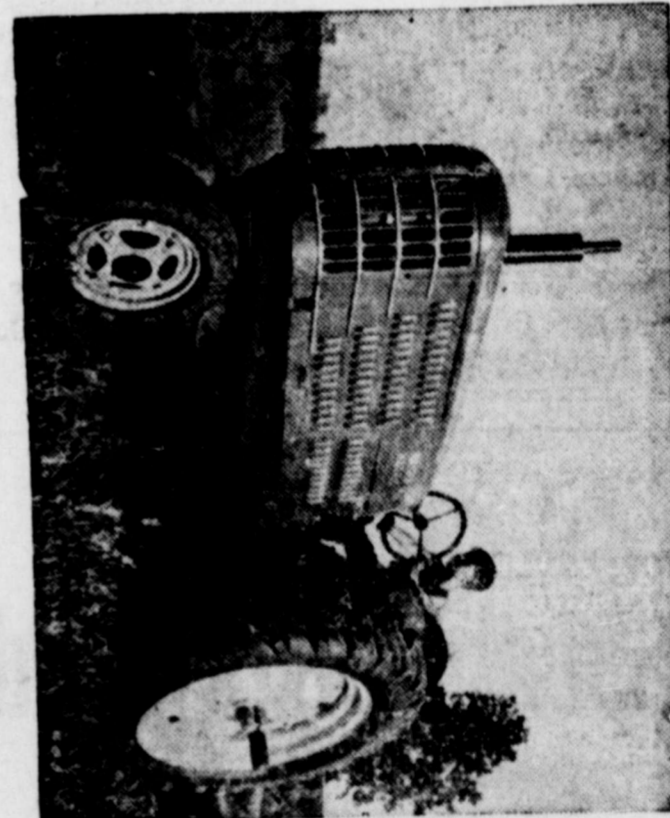
