HOUSEWIVES HERE JOIN CRUSADE AGAINST TAXES

Joining a nation-wide crusade against taxes that "are raiding the family pocketbook by increasing the cost of living," Bronte women today launched formation of a local unit of the National Consumers Tax Commission.

The appointment of Mrs. O. H. Willoughby, as chairman of the Bronte group was announced from the commissioners headquarters in Chicago. Mrs. Willoughby has been active in club work here.

The new chairman declared the commission, a "non-political, non-profit" organization, is conducting a nation-wide drive by housewives against hidden and other taxes that add to the burden of the consumer. Plans call for the formation of units in every city and town in the country.

The anti-tax drive is being led in this state by Mrs. Kenneth C. Frazier of Dallas, the President of the commission, and Mrs. Volney W. Taylor, of Brownsville, the Texas member of the Commission's national committee.

"Hidden taxes raise the cost of everything we buy, including the necessities," Mrs. Willoughby declared. "most of us pay these taxes without knowing it. It's little wonder families have difficulty making ends meet for example, hidden taxes add 11 cents to a 29 cent purchase of meat, \$10 to every \$30 of rent, \$1.95 to a \$5 hat and \$1.56 to a \$4 pair of shoes."

Mrs. Willoughby said a survey by the commission showed that taxes now equal to 23.6 percent of the national income.

A campaign will be started soon, she said, to inform Bronte's buying public of the inroads hidden taxes are making in the family budget.
