Coke Pioneer Buried At Old Ft. Chadbourne

Last issue of The Enterprise carried the brief announcement of the death of Haywood Christian, of Fort Chadbourne, at Tucumcari, New Mexico, at the home of a son, where he had gone to spend a time with his children.

The body was returned late Thursday afternoon to the home of deceased where it lay in state until Friday afternoon, at 2:30 o'clock. The body was then taken to the Old Fort Chadbourne cemetery, and following religious services, conducted by Elder G. B. Sliger of Hylton, a minister of the Church of Christ, the body was laid away beside the companion of his youth, who preceded him in death ten years

Deceased was a native of Tennessee. He was born in Haywood County, in that state, February 16, 1852, and would have been eighty-seven years old his next birthday.

Deceased came with his parents to Arkansas when a little boy and was reared to young manhood there. CARBON MONOXIDE GAS DANGEROUS IN CAR

AUSTIN, TEXAS .- To minimize the danger of carbon monoxide during the winter weather, motorists are urged by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, to check up now on the exhaust systems of their automobiles for defective connections and leaks.

"This unseasonable weather will give way to winter soon and it will be necessary to drive in closed cars. Carbon monoxide may seep inside from leaky connections and overwhelm occupants of the car," Doctor Cox warned.

He said that "warming up" a car in a closed garage is the greatest cause of carbon monoxide deaths Leaks from manifold connections, cracked manifolds, defective mufflers, leaks from loose muffler connections and leaks from hot air heater connections are potential sources for release of carbon monoxide and should be checked, Doctor Cox pointed out.

"Pay particular attention to these items and remember that proper carburetor adjustment causes minimum production of carbon monoxide and that the highest proportion of this gas is produced by an idling motor.

The State Health Officer said that headaches which occur during long drives may be an indication that carbon monoxide is leaking into the car. Sleepiness, dizziness, fatigue and in extreme cases, paralysis are other symptoms of carbon monoxide leaking into the car. Truck drivers making long drives are particularly vulnerable, he stated.

Doctor Cox described this gas as being colorless, odorless, and tasteless. When in the air it gives no sign of its presence and is taken into the blood instead of exygen. Suffering or collapse result from lack of oxygen,





Post Office Observing 25th Parcel Post Anniversary

The entire force of the Blackwell Post Office this month is observing the twenty-fifth anniversary of the establishment of the Parcel Post System.

The anniversary of Silver Jubilee is being observed nationally, during the month of November, and the Post Office Depart_ ment will feature a campaign to inform the public as to the service offered by the Parcel Post

The local Postmaster pointed out that restrictions upon parcel post shipments have been liberalized during recent years, making it possible to transport almost anything weighing less than 70 pounds. Many persons don't know that queen bees, turtles, horned frogs, baby chicks, and baby alligators have been sent by parcel post.

Parcel post services, at first, was carried on by a somewhat skeleton force of employees. Today the 45,000 post offices in the Nation and 35,000 rural routes covering 1,28,000 miles daily provide a convenient service which delivers "anywhere to everywhere."

Parcel post now provides for C. O. D. and insurance arrangements, and each has been an important factor towards developing the service and contributed greatly to the point of efficiency now maintained in the service the Nation over.

In spite of the length of time parcel post has been in operation, the postal employees find that the public generally is not fully aware of the scope of the service. It is the purpose of the anniversary observance to encourage the public and educate them to parcel post and its advantages. The service originally was opened for the benefit of rural areas and today every rural area is given special considerations. The cast of shipment to the rural resident, is from two cents to three cents less on the package than the resident of a city.

Maurene W. Steuart, postmaster, urges the cooperation of every patron of her office and all the patrons on the rural route to contact either she or any employee of the post office, and ask the benefits and uses of the Parcel Post System. Let's make this the month of November one of Mailing packages.


