Beautiful Home Wedding Is Celebrated

Simplicity marked the ceremony in which Miss Bernese Bannowsky, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Bannowsky, Sr., and Mrs. C. J. Bannowsky, Sr., became the bride of B. G. The marriage was solemnized Friday afternoon before an improvised altar, banked with flowers and fern, in the living room of the home of the bride's parents, in the presence of the immediate families and a few intimate friends with Rev. D. M. West officiating.

Prior to the ceremony Miss Cloreta Bruton sang "Cathedral In The Pines," accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Chester Bannowsky, aunt of the bride, who also played the wedding march for the entrance of the bridal party and rendered soft music while the vows were taken.

Morton, Pastor, will celebrate in special services both morning and night in honor of Miss Elizabeth Truly, of Ballinger, Texas, who will leave December 1, 1938 for Richmond, Va., then to New York where on December 10 she will sail on the Steamship Georgic for England, then to Lagos, Nigeria, West Africa as a missionary under the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Miss Truly was born in De Leon, Comanche County, Texas. She was graduated from the Ballinger High School, holds her A.B. degree from Howard Payne College, Brownwood, and the degree of Master of Religious Education from the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas.

Coke County Benefits From Fed. Expenditures

Federal expenditures in Coke County amounted to \$1,186,670 during the 5-year period March 4, 1933 through June 30, 1938, according to a statement released by Ray E. Lee, State Director for the National Emergency Council for Texas. This total, representing an average Federal benefit of approximately \$970 per family, includes both loans and grants made by the Federal agencies.

The loans have been made to business and industry, farmers, home owner, and flood or catastrophe sufferers. The grants have been made for relief and work relief, aid to farmers, public works, conservation work, and social security payments to the aged.

In addition to these loans and expenditures, the Federal Government, through the Federal Housing Administration, has insured modernization and repair notes and has accepted mortgages for insurance in Coke county in the amount of \$10,833 during this period, and has made a farm debt adjustment of \$6,978 through the Farm Security Administration.
