Co-op Sets Ground-Breaking

As a prelude to their annual business meeting Saturday, stockholders of Dimmitt Wheat Growers, Inc., will use a chrome-plated shovel to break ground for their

\$10 million corn milling plant.

The ground-breaking ceremony will begin at 4 p.m. Saturday at the plant site just east of the cooperative's main elevator complex.

THE SHOVEL will be passed from hand to hand so that all stockholders who want to can take part in the ground-breaking. Saturday's ceremony will be

symbolic only, since actual construction of the multi-million dollar mill won't begin until later in the year.

After the ground-breaking, DWG stockholders will meet at 5:30 p.m. Saturday in Dimmitt High School auditorium for their annual business meeting and barbecue.

THE BARBECUE will be served at 7 p.m. in the DHS gym.

Two directors and three associate directors will be elected Saturday to succeed Calvin Petty and Ben Haberer on the associate board.

Nominees for the senior board are Ezell Sadler and Carl King for

the post being vacated by Petty, and Haberer and James Welch for Haberer's post. (Haberer has served only one term; directors are limited to two.)

FOR THE associate board, nominees are Bob Huseman and Albert Schonenberger for Tony Ackar's post; George Sides and Milton Bagwell for James Welch's chair; and Charles Rickert and Elbert Summers for the post being vacated by Ben Holcomb.

The new board will convene immediately after the business meeting to elect officers for the coming year. Present officers are Frank Wise, president; Calvin Petty, vice-president; and Jerome Brockman, secretary-treasurer.

Garden hose leads from exhaust pipe to pickup seat

Suicide Ruled In Death Of Kenneth Edward Beat

Funeral services were held in Dimmitt Tuesday afternoon for Kenneth Edward Beat, 33, who was found dead early Monday in a pickup truck in front of his trailer home on SE Fourth St.

JUSTICE OF THE PEACE Earl Harrison ruled suicide when a garden hose was found attached to the pickup's exhaust pipe and leading into the small window on the driver's side of the vehicle. Judge Harrison ruled that Beat died of carbon monoxide poisoning in a self-imposed asphyxiation plan sometime between 11 a.m. and 12 noon Sunday. The hose was held securely in the exhaust pipe and small window with wipe cloths.

Beat was employed as a mechanic at Farmers' Supply Co. and was found by a fellow worker

who missed him at work Monday morning. The body was found lying on the pickup seat in a highly decomposed state.

Beat was born Sept. 11, 1934, in Kindman, Kan. He was a veteran of the Korean War and had been employed at Farmers' Supply in Dimmitt for six years.

SURVIVORS include his wife, Patricia; a young daughter; his father, George A. Beat of Kind-

man, Kan.; one sister, Sister M. Georgine of Great Bend, Kan.; and two brothers, Leonard of Pratt, Kan., and Gilbreath of Cunningham, Kan.

Rev. Raphael Chen, pastor of the Immaculate Conception Church here, officiated at graveside services held at 4 p.m. Tuesday.

Burial followed in the Castro Memorial Gardens under the direction of Dennis Funeral Home.

Dimmitt Woman's Father Found Accidentally Shot

Funeral services were held Friday afternoon for Mr. Sherman Sweatmon of Muleshoe who was found fatally shot Tuesday.

MR. SWEATMON was the father of Mrs. Jimmy Presley of Dimmitt.

After a day-long search, the 55-year-old owner and operator of the Progress Gin and also co-owner of Dimmitt Gin was found dead beside his pickup truck 20 miles northeast of Muleshoe.

JUSTICE OF THE PEACE J. R. Thornton ruled accidental shooting. Officials said Sweatmon had apparently been rabbit hunting. The gun was found on the pickup floor in a leather case with the end blown out.

Other survivors besides Mrs. Presley include his wife, Mary; six sisters, Mrs. L. H. Wall, Mrs. L. J. Sullivan, Mrs. B. C. Hammonds, Seale Get FFA Degree

Two Dimmitt Future Farmers of America received the State Farmer degree at the FFA state convention in Lubbock Wednesday through Friday.

JOEY HAMMONDS, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Hammonds of 610 W. Stinson St., and David Seale, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. O. Seale, 310 W. Dulin St., were honored for productive farm projects while in the Dimmitt High School farm club.

To qualify for the distinction, boys must have been active in FFA for two years, must have had two years of instruction in vocational agriculture, must demonstrate proficiency in parliamentary procedure, must be able to lead group discussion for 40 minutes, must have earned at least \$500 with a supervised farming program and must show outstanding ability evidenced by leadership and cooperation in student, chapter and community activities.

Hammonds, a senior at Dimmitt High School, is an active member of the Dimmitt FFA chapter, represented the chapter at the district, area and state meetings as well as one national convention in Kansas City, Mo. He has also served as reporter and historian for the local chapter. Hammonds was a member of several meats and crops judging teams.

FOLLOWING diversified farming trends, Hammonds earned his project money from farming cotton and grain sorghum and raising steers and barrows. He has exhibited his livestock at major shows as well as in the Castro County Show.

Seale is a former vice-president of the Dimmitt FFA club, a member for four years, chairman of several committees during the four years and is a 1968 graduate of Dimmitt High School. He is a veteran of junior and senior chapter conducting teams on the local and district levels. He participated in land judging at West Texas State College.

SEALE ALSO presented a diversified supervised farming program which included cotton, grain sorghum, wheat, lambs, steers, barrows and sows.

Then Saturday night everyone travels back to Dimmitt for the Miss Grain Sorghum Queen pageant at Dimmitt High School with Bo Bryant heading the pageant committee.

Old Settlers will be in the spotlight Aug. 15 and the committee urges former residents and original settlers to hitch at the watering trough on the courthouse square and arrive in time for registration at 9:30 a.m.

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Ladies Convert Stamps to Milk

Don't throw away that postage stamp—it's worth a cup of milk to a German orphan.

IN A unique kind of stamp-saving bage, Mrs. Fluff Hacker, Hart grocery store owner, has been collecting US postage stamps three years for a German orphanage.

When she accumulates a box of cancelled stamps—which doesn't take long, since many Hart residents help her—she sends them to Mrs. Ires Garrity in Commiskey, Ind., mother of Bill Garrity of Hart.

Mrs. Garrity turns the stamps over to the treasurer of her church who boxes them and mails them to an orphanage at Uber Bad Oeynhausen, Germany.

THE ORPHANAGE, in turn, trades the stamps to German collectors and agents, who pay with milk instead of money.

The Indiana church project keeps milk coming to the children in the orphanage.

The orphanage is a privately operated one. The lady who founded it left a trust fund for its operation, but rising prices eventually overtook the endowment and the orphanage had to look for other means of financing. The unique stamp plan was the result.

EVERYBODY in the country sends stamps to us to save for this project," Mrs. Hacker said.

"We have the address of the orphanage, if any church or group here wants to take on the project," she added. "I don't have time to conduct a local project myself, but I'll clip and save stamps for it."

THE RULES of the stamp-clipping are to leave one-fourth inch of the envelope around each edge of the stamp when clipping it, with the perforations intact on all four sides; to count the stamps and enclose the number on a slip of paper when packing them, to mail in a corrugated cardboard box; and to send no more than three pounds at a time.

And if you don't want to start a project of your own for the orphanage, but would still like to

take part, clip your stamps and mail them to Mrs. Fluff Hacker at Hacker's Grocery, Hart.

She'll save and send everyone of them—including the one on the envelope you mail her.

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
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Avoid Divorce Tax Problems

Every year there are a number of Texas couples who decide to "split the blanket."
DIVORCE IS enough misfortune, without getting into tax problems in the process. Under Texas community property laws, the earnings of both spouses up to date of divorce is community income. When the couple files their income tax return for the year, each spouse has to have the total earnings up to the date of divorce, the total withholding tax and the total itemized deductions or tax credits, since by law each is required to file an income tax return on their one-half share. They must also declare their separate income, credits and deductions for the rest of the year after the date of divorce.

It works out much better to settle the entire matter at the time of the divorce. In any case, don't be one of the several thousand Texans that will get involved in an income tax audit of your income tax return for the year of your divorce.


THOMAS has initiated an office to advise students of their legal free tuition rights offering advice to students of other colleges and prospective high school graduates, as well.

He pointed to the Connally-Carrillo Act which, Tomas said, "so few people knew of, we decided to form this information office." A student in the top fourth of his class from a family with a total income not exceeding \$1,800 can attend a Texas state supported college with tuition and fees paid by the state, Thomas explained.

The Connally - Carrillo Act was passed by the Texas Legislature in 1967 to provide that a graduate of a Texas accredited high school can attend college in this state.

Thomas urged eligible students to write or call the scholarship advisor, Cooke County Junior College, Gainesville.

Hailstorms Damage Is \$29 Million in 1968

The unusually large number and severity of catastrophic hailstorms in Texas the first six months of 1968 caused an estimated insured loss of approximately \$29 million, the Texas Insurance Advisory Association, Austin, reported today. The figure does not include automobile damage.

THE TIAA emphasized that the \$29 million of insurance payments to Texas policyholders represents only a portion of total damage this year in Texas. It said this figure included only hailstorms where the insured damage was \$500,000 or more.

The TIAA noted that there were numerous smaller wind and hail storms which will result in a substantial additional known claims when individual insurance company payments are completely tabulated.

Communities hit by the catastrophic hailstorms were: Big Spring, May 5, \$2,000,000; Cleburne, April 27-28, \$1,000,000; Dal-

las County, April 28, \$13,500,000; Greenville, April 27-28, \$1,150,000; Marshall, April 27-27, \$3,000,000; Midland, May 9, \$2,500,000; McKinney, May 16-17, \$1,000,000; Vernon, May 16-17, \$500,000; and Odessa, June 7, \$3,000,000. Other parts of North central Tex-

Grain Lots More Profitable When Marketed On Hoof

Grain sorghum marketed on the hoof could be the answer for both grain and swine producers in Texas, Dr. Donald B. Hudman, Extension swine specialist with Texas A&M University, says.

ACCORDING TO tests conducted at the Stiles Foundation Farm near Thrall, grain sorghum fed to market hogs netted twice as much as grain sold at harvest-time in the area. On the market, grain was valued at about \$2 per hundred pounds, but the hogs returned about \$4 per hundred.

In the nursery unit, pigs from four to five weeks of age raised to 75 pounds, consumed about 100 pounds of feed per pound of gain. Hogs from 75 pounds to finishing, about 210 pounds, consumed approximately three and one-half pounds of feed per pound of gain.

The herd average at the Stiles Farm was approximately 334 pounds of feed per 100 pounds of gain, including sows and boars.

IN THE TESTS, 196 sows have farrowed 2,077 pigs, but more important, says Hudman, is the number of pigs per litter — 10.6. At 35 days of age the litters averaged 9.4 pigs, or about 2 pigs per litter more than the national or state average.

The term "mortgage lifter" could once again be applied to hog raising in Texas if producers follow good production practices, says the specialist.

Market hogs should weigh approximately 200 pounds at 154 days of age for optimum economic production.

A DESIRABLE product must be marketed by the hog raiser and it should be one which the consumer wants and demands. About 90 percent of the market hogs should grade "Number One."

"Today, Texas producers must shoot for the meat-type hog with a loin-eye area of about four and one quarter inches. An even better indication of the amount of meat a hog is carrying is the back-fat-probe — an ideal hog is one with a back-fat measurement of 1.4 inches or less," Hudman says.



West Children Share Parents

For seven West children sharing parents with orphaned children is fun and they do it gladly in their service to Christ.

THE SEVEN are children of missionaries — Mr. and Mrs. Dale West.

The West family visited in Hart last week while on a trip to Amarillo to leave Sandy, 18, and Paul, 16, in that city for fall enrollment in high school.

For some members of the West family it was the first trip to the U.S. from their native Mexico where the family runs El Ranchito del Rey in Saltillo, Mex., a home for about 30 orphaned children.

THE WEST family first traveled to Mexico as independent missionaries working for three years in Guadalajara in 1958.

"After three months we were ready to give up because we just couldn't learn the language," Mrs. West admits. "But we decided to try it for at least three months more and by this time we were learning the language from the children we took in."

Dale and Nelda West had both surrendered for missionary work with the Southern Baptist Association before they even met. West was graduated from Baylor University in 1952 and had been the pastor of the Moody-Friendship Baptist Church while attending Baylor. He was the pastor of several Baptist Churches including South San Francisco for one year, Harvey Baptist Church in Stephenville, Emanuel Baptist Church in Las Vegas, N.M., and two years Glendale Park Baptist Church in Dallas for two years. During his career as pastor, West was not getting any younger and we wanted to do missionary work because that is what we had been

called to do so we just got up and left for Mexico," Mrs. West explains.

Ranchita del Rey in Saltillo is a home for 30 orphaned Mexican children near the village of Los Gonzalez near the outskirts of Saltillo. The children who come to the home may stay as long as they wish. The Wests admit they have taken children from two days to seven days old. The field, a water well, three large ranch houses used for dormitory, dining hall and recreation hall.

El Ranchito also operates a small restaurant in downtown Saltillo which serves American foods and provides jobs for the older residents of the home.

THE WESTS traveled to Mexico with four children, Sandy, Susan now 14, and Rachel, now 11. Since then, Mark, 9, Philip, 8, and Joey, 3, have been added to the clan.

The younger Wests speak Spanish fluently and speak English with a strong Spanish accent. The four older West children switch between the two languages easily.

Amarillo school officials told the Wests that the transfer of Sandy and Paul from Mexican schools to the Texas school system is a completely new experience for the system.

"THEY JUST had not had any transfers from another country like that," Mrs. West said. "So they didn't know how to classify them."

Sandy and Paul have finished secondary schools in Mexico. Now they want to get a high school diploma and enroll in college.

The Wests planned to visit in Dallas and San Antonio with relatives before returning to their home.
