SWEETWATER LIVESTOCK SHOW AND SPRING REVUE IS PLANNED ON A LARGE SCALE FOR NEXT WEEK

Sweetwater has already become a livestock center of West Texas and all the citizenry of that fine little West Texas city are cooperating to make the show next week the best ever.

And not only the Sweetwater merchants generally but most of the others of the citizens, both men and ladies, are interested in the Spring Revue that is scheduled for Tuesday evening, March 21. The revue last year was a sweeping, swishing, smiling, laughing success. But it could not be otherwise—for, when the "gals" of Sweetwater, with the lovely matrons included, go on "dress parade"—boy, it's a sight of feminine pulchritude worth going many miles to see—even to the "youngsters" in the editor's class. LEGISLATIVE ACTIVITIES

The Senate this week passed a bill by Senator Roberts to consolidate the office of the State Reclamation Engineer with the General Land Office as an economy measure. The author said this would save the state \$25,690 a year. Both the Reclamation Engineer and the General Land Office approved the consolidation.

Walter Woodward of Coleman, who served our district in the Senate for ten years, was confirmed for the position of Life Insurance Commissioner.

The Senate granted the request of Governor O'Daniel that he be permitted to withdraw the name of Judge J. C. Hunter of Abilene from consideration as Highway Commissioner, and awaited a new appointment by the Governor.

The House killed a bill to raise the truck load limit to 20,000 pounds. A compromise bill calling for an increase to 10,000 pounds was still in the Senate Committee.

The Senate passed the Medical Practice Act 30-0. Objections to new provisions in the bill voted by various groups previously had been removed by amendments.

The House Constitutional Amendments Committee this week recommended an amendment to the constitution carrying a 2 1-2 per cent sales tax and a 25 per cent increase in natural resources taxes to pay old age pensions, teachers' retirement and aid to destitute children. The measure will probably be considered in the House during the next few days. It now appears that the real issue of the session concerning funds for these purposes will be whether or not the Legislature votes direct or submits an amendment putting the tax levy in the constitution.

At the request of some of my constituents, I introduced a bill making it unlawful to keep sun perch or bream less than five inches in length, and catfish less than fourteen inches in length. Whether the bill passes or not depends upon the wishes of my constituents, and I would be pleased to have the opinion of anyone who might be interested in such a measure.

I introduced and the Senate passed a resolution congratulating the Governor on his 49th birthday.—Penrose B. Metcalfe, 25th Senatorial District, Austin, Texas.

ALL FARMERS NOW HAVE ACCESS TO FEDERAL AID

The Farm Security Administration is now making loans to some of the most able farmers in the county and is not limited, as it once was, to the farmer who has been on relief, it was made known today by F. R. Andrus, FSA's County Supervisor.

"Let me say right here that Farm Security Administration loans are made only to those who are unable to obtain adequate financing from any other source," the supervisor said. "The borrower who can get the financing which he needs from a bank or from any other private financial institution is not eligible for an FSA loan. But there are some types of loan which even fairly large farmers and ranchmen can obtain only from FSA."

Farm Security has made many loans this year to farmers or ranchmen who were in need of more capital to buy livestock or to rent more acreage. In these cases, the operator was always hard-pressed, and many of them had to meet with their creditors and get their debts adjusted. Farm Security will not lend to a man who is in such a hard situation that he has no prospect of paying off old debts as well as new. If the old debts are too heavy, FSA helps to work out an agreement with creditors by which the debts are scaled down.

"Many of these borrowers are fairly large operators, and the loans sometimes run to several thousand dollars," the supervisor aid.

He also pointed out another type of farmer served by FSA, who can get all the money he wants at the bank for his individual operations. But he may occasionally need to use big-scale equipment for a few days, or a pre-bred sire, and yet have too little need of it to own one himself. He is eligible for one of the cooperative enterprises which FSA is financing.

Only ten per cent of farmers in this state have taken advantage of these opportunities offered by FSA to date, said the supervisor. Those who cannot get adequate financing from any other source were invited by him to call at the Farm Security Administration office.

INFLUENZA IS RAGING OVER TEXAS NOW

AUSTIN, March 16 — The first week of March showed 1,000 cases of influenza in Texas. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued the following statement on the disease.

"In its present form the symptoms may range from a common cold to high fever, back ache and prostration. However, pneumonia as a complication represents a real hazard and it is well known pneumonia is an exceedingly dangerous disease. The remedy is go to bed upon the first appearance of the cold and remain there until advised by a physician before one can safely get out of it.

"Everyone should realize that in its lightest form influenza can very easily become a serious matter. Prevention is far better than cure and the careful observance of a few common sense rules will materially strengthen ones resistance to an attack of influenza. Some of these rules are:

- "(1) So far as possible avoid contact with members of families with colds or influenza.
- "(2) Keep the feet dry.
- "(3) Wash the hands before meals.
- "(4) Avoid unnecessary fatigue.
- "(5) See that your alimentary system is regular in action."

Murry Gilreath who has been ill for several weeks is reported as being improved at this time. It is hoped that he soon may be fully recovered.
