





### Equine Encephalomyelitis Or Sleeping Sickness In Horses

In 1938 the most severe outbreak of sleeping sickness occured in this county. This disease made its first appearance in 1935, there having been some 7 or 8 cases reported. In 1936 there were only two cases reported. In 1937 there were 10 or 12 cases reported, and in 1938 there were approximately 38 cases reported. This disease is evidently increasing in this area and is becoming a menace to horses and mules. Because there has been so little known about this disease, it has been very difficult to control and is very expensive.

In order to inform horse and mule owners in regard to this disease and to advise them to vaccinate their animals at this time, we are offering you below:
