SANTA FE SYSTEM CARLOADINGS SHOW LARGE INCREASE

The Santa Fe System carloadings for the week ending May 13, 1939 were 19,986 as compared with 18,306 for the same week in 1938. Received from connectiins were 5,153 as compared with 4,757 for the same week in 1938. Total cars moved were 25,139 as compared with 23,363 for the same week in 1938. The Santa Fe handled a total of 26,022 cars during the preceding week this year.



lomyelitis be controlled?" full infomation on the nature of the disease, its mode of spread, and related points must be at hand. As a result of research, much of this information has been obtained.

It has been shown experimentally that the disease can be transmitted by biting insects, such as mosquitoes and ticks, and as a result of experimentation on other methods of transmission and field studies, the theory of insect transmission, particularly by mosquitoes, is generally accepted as the way the disease is spread in nature. In ordr for mosquitoes to carry the virus, they must have available a source of the virus. During the early stages of an attack of the disease in a susceptible animal, the virus, or causative agent, is found for a short time circulating in the blood stream. Mosquitoes sucking the blood of an animal at that time can carry the infection to other suceptible species. It has been found that a large variety of mammals and birds are sceptible to the virus of encephalomyeli-These include beside the tis. horse, the ox, sheep, goat, dog, rat, mouse, gopher, chicken, pigeon, duck, and vulture. During the past few months, man also has been shown to be susceptible.



(Continued from last week) volved, the case incidence and actual losses from death of animals were much lower this year than last.

At this time I would like to call attention to the fact that the incidence and continued rapid spread of encephalomyelitis in horses in the past few years have probably been with-out parallel in the history of infectious disease of animals with the exception of outbreaks of foot-and-mouth disease, and we are indeed fortunate that research work vigorously under-taken at a number of institutions over a period of 8 years has placed effective weapons in our hands to combat the ravages of
