Prospects and conditions under which the schools open this year are rosy.

In the first palce the faculty is made up of those who have their degrees, assuring the highest degree of efficiency in the work of those who are to direct the activities of the student body for this year.

There are 326 in the scholastic enrollment this year, there being only two less than the enrollment last year. Considering the conditions that obtain, that is a remarkable showing.

The Blackwell schools now have 23 1-2 units of affiliation, which is also a splendid showing for the school.
