Winters State Bank Shows A Healthy Condition

The daily balance of the Winters State Bank of November 3, 1939, with the bank's balance of the same date in 1938 has come to the desk of The Enterprise. And the showing is most heartening.

With the short crops in the Winters-Bronte sections of country, it is difficult for our people to keep from feeling "blue". But when the cash and deposits of the Winters State Bank of the present and the same period a year ago are taken into consideration, it is shown that conditions are not so terrible, after all.

November 3, 1938 the deposits in the Winters State Bank were \$857,617.83 and the cash balance was \$286,522.88, while on November 3, 1939, the deposits were \$914,166.23, and the cash balance was \$495,913.10. This shows that this bank had on the above date \$56,548.40 deposits in excess of the same date last year, and \$209,392.22 more in cash in its vaults as against the same date last year. Snug sum of difference, eh?

Congratulations to President Jno. Q. McAdams and his bank.

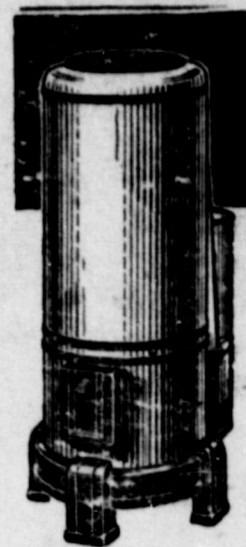
