

The biggest mistake that most poultry raisers make is their failure to keep a good mash before their birds at all times. I have found from 25 years experience in the chicken business that it cost me a whole lot more to produce eggs from a flock that has not had access to a good mash at all times than it does to produce eggs from a flock that has had mash before them from the time they were hatched until I sold them as old hens. In other words it cost more not to feed chickens than it does to feed them everything they want in the way of mash, grain, green feeds, etc. I make money with chickens because I feed them good mash all the time.

You are doing fine work for poultry raisers, and please let me make this suggestion: Do everything possible to encourage poultrymen to employ scientific management practices and above all else, urge them to keep a good mash before their flock all hours of the day and every day in the year.
