Grandmother said that she enjoyed the "party" so immensely that she hoped all those that came to see her on her 92nd birthday would be present again on her 93rd birthday and each one bring someone with them.

Grandmother Woullard was born in Little Rock, Aarkansas March 10, 1848. She came to Texas with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Denton when seven years old and settled in Bell county. She was married to G. W. Woullard Dec. 23, 1867. They moved to Rannels county November 1889 and to Coke county in 1890 and to Bronte in 1894.

Thus for nearly a hundred years this gracious aged heroine has lived and for nearly fifty years her home has been here in Bronte.

A GREAT MAN HAS FALLEN—IN MEMORY OF DR. J. D. SANDEFER

Dr. J. D. Sandefer, president of Hardin-Simmons University, at Abilene, died at his home on the university campus, in the late afternoon, Friday, March 22, 1940.

As the above intelligence was broadcast by radio and the press early Saturday morning, gloom was cast over the whole country and especially the great southwest.

For, there was no greater man of his time, or of all time, as for that matter, who ever lived and wrought in the affairs and destinies of men. While columns and columns have already been written about him, much of which has been relative to his public life as president of a great university and as to his scholarship and his constant touch through life with public affairs, we think of this great man, and cherish him, and shall cherish long as memory shall function, as to his private life and character, as well as his public ministries in the affairs of men.

And the writer doubts whether there is another person living, outside the intimate family circle, with one possible exception, who knew this great and beloved man more intimately than we did, as to the intimacies of his own private ideals of life and character. For, it was a third of a century ago that he and the writer first became friends. Both of us were men at that time sufficiently young to recognize that the best part of life was yet before us. Deceased was several years our senior and had made more rapid progress in life than we in his struggles for mental preparation and in places of responsibility he had assumed. Therefore, we felt towards him then, and have always, through life, felt that way, as if he were an older brother, and could, and would, give us aid and timely advice as to our own problems. Through the years the friendship ripened until the last decade has been one of as intimate and beautiful friendship as could exist between two men.

Therefore, this Easter Sunday, as we write this, while the cloud-laden skies shut out the beautiful sunlight, our heart is sad and lonely beyond words, and we feel as "one who walks in a banquet hall deserted."

Dr. Sandefer was a great man everywhere—great physically. He was a portly and imposing man in his physical stature; he was great intellectually—a man of wide and ripe scholarship. But, greatest of all, he was great in his stature as a lovable, Christian gentleman of the highest ideals, touching both private and public life.

In the early 1930's, deceased was last in our home. Hours we whiled away, rehearsing our journeys through life since first we met and the friendship was formed. He told us of his impressions of us the first time we met which was at a public gathering. Both natives of Arkansas, and born in communities not far separated from each other, we had a common ground on which to stand as our friendship ripened through the years. His last visit to our home was just shortly after the last great sorrow came to us in the death of our little girl. He was as kind and tender and gentle towards Mrs. West and myself as if he had been a brother. The beautifully sympathetic words he spoke to us and the childlike prayer he prayed for us are "like apples of gold in pictures of silver," and will linger with us in memory sweet as the songs of the angels. In our last hours together he told us of the plans and dreams he still had with reference to the university of which he was president. He told us that he had come to the place in life where he had but few interests—but those interests, we learned as he unfolded to us, were broad enough to include the weal of mankind in general, and his family and Hardin-Simmons University in particular. He told us that he understood well that the years of active service that remained to him were few but he expected to crowd all into those years he possibly could.

The writer feels as to ourselves that we were born in the most fortunate period of the world. We were born early enough that the lives of the great in the generation before us touched our life—it has been our good fortune to know intimately quite a few of the great men and women of Dr. Sandefer's generation. Yet not one who was greater than he. And we were born late enough to live and be active in the period of the world following the World War which brought a new era in many ways relative to the fundamentals of life. Hence, it has been ours to see the struggle between the ideals of the generation of the great before us and the ideals of many of the present day. Therefore, after all, it remains that the great fundamentals of human life and character and destiny do not change, and that in the cardinal virtues are still the hope and destiny of the world. But, now, as only a very few of the great men just older than ourselves, like Dr. Sandefer, remain, we find our heart in a state of indescribable loneliness. But, we take heart and will strive to stand for the great fundamentals of life as bequeathed to us by men like the great man, our dearly beloved friend, over whose passing we sorrow today. And as we think of his fine unselfish, generous life and his fine character which has been an inspiration to multiplied thousands of young men and young women struggling to get their bearings in life and equip themselves for lives of usefulness, we recall the words below as reminding of the immortality of his life and the power, beauty and immortal glory of a life lived after the fashion in which he spent his years:

"Let me live in a house by the side of the road,
Where the race of men go by,
The men who are good, and the men who are bad,
As good and as bad as I.
I would not sit in the scorner's seat,
Or hurl the cynic's ban,
But let me live in a house by the side of the road,
And be a friend to man."

D. 1940, then and there to answer a petition filed in said Court on the 28th day of December, A. D. 1938, in a suit, numbered on the docket of said Court No. 1486, wherein M. G. Reed is plaintiff, and J. R. Johnson and wife Nola B. Johnson, and Nelson Johnson and wife Estelle Johnson, and Mrs. Mattie Daniel (a widow) are defendants, a brief statement of plaintiff's cause of action being as follows: plaintiff alleges that said J. R. Johnson and his said wife executed and delivered a deed of trust of same date, recorded in Vol. 18, Page 112, of Deed of Trust Records of said Coke County, covering the South 1-2 of Section 3, Certificate 592, Abstract 208, H. E. & W. T. Ry. Co. land, in said Coke County except 6.1 acres thereof owned by the K. C. M. & O. Ry. 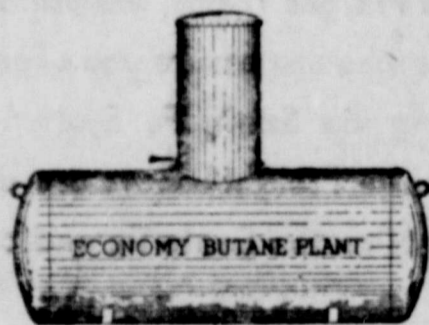

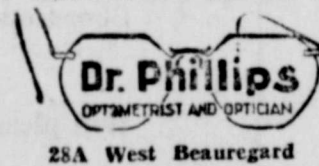

JERRY SADLER WILL OPEN CAMPAIGN FOR GOVERNOR

AUSTIN, March 26—First big blast in the 1940 Gubernatorial sweepstakes will be fired April 4, by Jerry Sadler, rugged young member of the Texas Railroad Commission.

The colorful and dynamic Sadler will reveal his platform and proposals over a statewide hook-up Thursday night, April 4, from 8 to 9 P. M. The broadcast will be carried by radio stations WFAA, WBAP, KPRC and WOAI.
