Bronte Gins First Bale of 1940 Cotton

The hum of the gin machinery was heard abroad in the land again, Monday afternoon. August 19, 1940, as the first bale of the season was ginned.

The lucky first bale went to Renza Lee of Maverick. The bale weighed 413 pounds. The bale was ginned by the Farmers gin and was bought by the same Company. The price paid was 10 cents a pound. The first bale this year was about three days later than in 1939.

Mr. Lee is proving himself a "first baler," as he also carried a bale to Ballinger and got first place and also a bale at Maverick and got the same honor.

The business men of Bronte contributed a first bale premium to Mr. Lee amounting to \$14.50.

Bronte Water Not Contaminated

B. D. Mackey, superintendent of Bronte's water system, has received good news from Austin. It was feared that the water in the city lake might be bad. Mr. Mackey sent water and had it analyzed by the state laboratories. Reports have come that there is no contamination.

However, Mr. Mackey advises that for the sake of safety each and all should continue to boil the water. Let everybody take notice and take no risk.


Various games were played by those present. After the gifts were opened by the bride and groom, watermelon was served.
