## Bronte Defeats Norton, 23 to 0, While Lake View Rolls Over Mertzon, 27 to 6

The Bronte Longhorns and Lake View Chiefs remain nose and nose in the District 8-B football race.— These two clubs tied in a frothy game, 6-6, in San Angelo several weeks ago and are undefeated in district strife.

Coach Woodrow Wilson Mullen's Bronte Brigade Banged to a 23 to 0 victory over Norton Friday afternoon in Norton. John Douglas Auten's Lake View outfit bolted to a 27 to 6 triumph over a lively set of Mertzon Hornets Saturday night in the San Angelo Stadium.

### Bronte scores many ways

Bronte tabbed one of its touchdowns at Norton when Liles blocked a punt on the eight and Hudman thumped across for the counter.

Bronte tabbed from 56 yards away on line plunges by Hudman Rogers and Vaughn.

Bronte's other touchdown came from midfield mainly on bucks with Vaughn carrying over on the finish.

Olivas counted a safety (two points) on a blocked punt.

Bronte tabbed all three conversion points, one on a pass and two on line smashes.

Taylor and Lacy, backs, and Crockett, guard, were outstanding for the losing Norton team.

### Mertzon Eattles Gately

Two pretty hot little clubs functioned in the Bobcat stadium for all of the evening while Lake View and Mertzon fans in attendance froze.

Lake View's victory score, 27 to 6, is no indication what a fiery fight the outmanned Mertzon team put up.

The Hornets were a sharp threat all the way with Sid Cox until late in the fourth quarter ever a menace and throttling what looked like certain touchdown gallops by Chief ball-bearers.

Cox, fastest running back on the field, went out in the final chukker with a severely sprained ankle and later was cramping considerably, so was kept in the hospital.

Adams of Mertzon was a powerhouse tackler and in the waning stages was on the receiving end of a pass from Hebbbs that he developed into a 68-yard touchdown play then on the final fling went into the passing role himself and ALMOST sent Mertzon over for another counter.

The picture is one that deeply touches the home—touches the home at its foundations. It is in the early morning hour. Two sweetfaced children with school books under their arms, with their pet dog running at their side, are leaving the stepstones of the home for school. A fond doting, smiling mother stands on the doorsteps, looking at the children as they go away, her face beaming with pride and love and devotion. Her last word to them are "and DO be careful." How that breathes out of the mother's heart—for, that is the universal heartbeat of motherhood: love and devotion to and anxious care for her children.

The copy of the ad proceeds to state that everybody, all parents, want their children to have an education. After praising the Texas schools, the ad gives out the information that the oil industries pay 24,000,000 dollars in taxes for school purposes, which says to the educating of the children of Texas.

In the above particular, the oil industry in Texas is indispensable to the welfare of the children with reference to their educational privileges, hence it becomes everyone to see to it that the oil industry is treated fairly, and not imposed upon.

**Noted Chemist Declares Science Can Outmode War**

Science can eventually remove economic causes for war, writes Dr. Harrison E. Howe, editor of "Industrial and Chemical Engineering," in the current Rotarian magazine. Geographic or man-made monopolies of raw products that have provoked wars in the past can, he believes, be broken by laboratory research workers.

carbon, salt, petroleum and water are already on the market, he points out, and the cost of synthetic rubber will decline as it goes into mass production. "There was a time when men might have fought for rubber. The scientist believes that time is past.

No longer are manufacturers of films and plastics dependent upon camphor imported from Japan. When prices went up, scientists created a synthetic camphor actually better than their natural product. Heavy natural deposits of nitrate in Chile gave that country a monopoly on that material used in fertilizer and gunpowder—until scientists devised a way of making nitrates from nitrogen in the air. Today it would be ridiculous for any nation to go to war to control Chilean nitrates.

Modern science affects international relations in two ways, asserts Dr. Howe. On one hand it tends to make the world economically interdependent — by making the automobile owner dependent upon rubber from Malaya, for example. But science tends to break up national monopolies—whether based upon climate or geography or created by tariffs or cartels—by inventing substitutes for natural products. In its latter function, he believes

science offers hope for the decline of economic stimuli to war.

"Science can achieve modern miracles," comments Dr. Howe, "but as Dr. Arthur H. Compton, Nobel prize winner, puts it, Science is not enough." It needs the direction of men of goodwill. The Ability to loose new energies carries the responsibility voiced in the hopes of a Britain scientist that the method for releasing the tremendous energy imprisoned in the atom will remain undiscovered until man becomes sufficiently civilized to use it for his weal and not for his woe."—Rotarian Magazine.

**Health Unit Joins President Against Accidents**

Austin, Texas, November 13—The State Health Department has joined the President in his effort to prevent accidents. The rising accident toll is a menace to our national defense program and, unless checked, can seriously hinder our efforts.

Doctor Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, says that fatal accidents are now one of the ten leading causes of death in Texas. Last year, over 4600 Texans died as a result of accidents. Thousands more were injured and countless days were lost from work in non-fatal accidents. In times such as these this useless loss of life and time must be stopped.

Motor vehicles lead the list of fatal accidents in Texas, with

1807 deaths; however, they account for but one-third of the accidental deaths. Other leading causes are: Falls, 675; fires and burns, 490; and drowning, 267. To stop this loss, each person must, of his own accord, make it his responsibility to do all in his power to prevent accidents on the road, in the home, and while at work.

Accident prevention must be practiced all the time to be effective. A person may be careful while at work all day and then relax his caution while driving home and become involved in an auto tragedy. Be courteous be cautious, be careful and prevent an accident from happening to you.

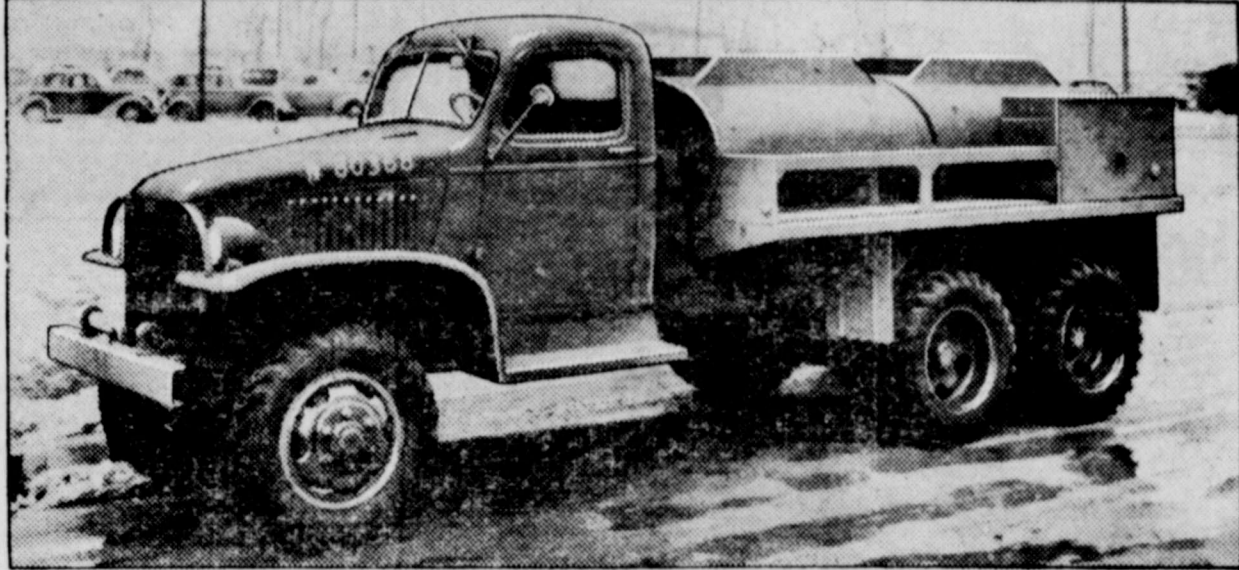

**SHRINE CARES FOR 3,000 CHILDREN**

Admitted to Shrine Hospitals for Crippled Children during the past year were 3,000 patients, according to a remarkable report given by President W. Freeland Kendrick, Past Imperial Potentate, before an annual session of the Imperial Council of the Mystic Shrine at Akron, Ohio. And

out of many patients, a like number of discharged children were cured or materially improved under Shrine care, Mr. Kendrick said. The medical staff performed a total of 4,949 operations. Over \$30,000,000 has been spent in this work since the hospitals first began operations, and over \$800,000 in donations were received during the past

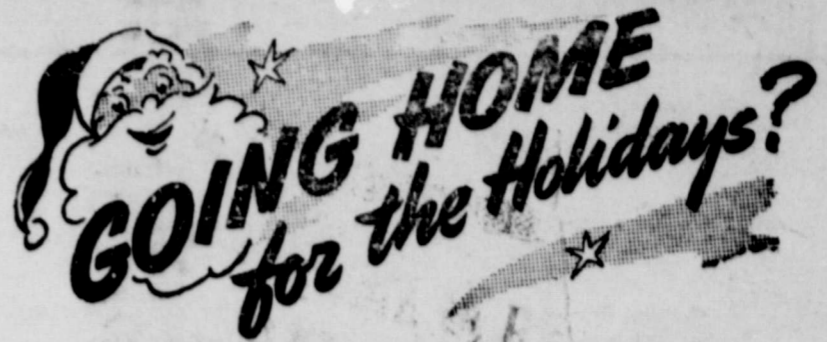
