## U.S.D.A. War <br> Board to Hold <br> Meet, February 7

The Coke County U. S. D. A War Board met in the Count Agent's of fice at 2 P . M., Satur day, January 24, 1942, on call of the ehairman. The new chair man, f. B. Allen, was introduc ed and opened the meeting. The
primary purpose of this meeting primary purpose of this meeting
was to set a date to hold a meeting and conduct an educational program outline of the State U S. D. A. War Board to all agri cultural agency workers and farm and ranch committeemen in the county. This meeting was set to be held February 7, 1942 at Robert Lee, Texas
At the Board meeting Mr. Allen emphasized the importance of urging all farmers and ranch-
men to conserve and take care of all burlap sacks and wrappings that they might have, or that which may come into their posapproximately all burlap used in approximately amported from India and that source has been prac tically cut off due to the war in the Far East. Mr. Allen also emphasized the fact that approximately eighty per cent o the total of burlap imported this country is used by farmers
in buying and selling their prod in buying and selling their prod-
ucts, there being four hundred ucts, there being four hundred
and fifty-nine million orders of burlap purchased by farmer during 1939 and 1940. The chairman reported that to offset he probable shortage of burlap duce course cotton fabries as substitutes. But the heavy demand for cotton textiles for tents, uniforms, and such other essential equipment has limited them to teh aount of the above mentioend material which could be produced. All farmers are urged, therefore, to handle their sacks more careill and make way they can probably offset the shortage. Mr. Allen also emphasized the fact that the evi dent shortage has caused grea concern among the farmers in regards to tires. He urges that every farmer should exert all caution possible in care and
treatment of tires now owned Farmers should see that all foreign matters are kept from the treads and that tires are up to relieve pressure on tires. Tires hould be kept ill should be painted and plugged The chairman advised that certificates for new tires may be issued for tractors, farm implements and trucks used to carry farm products directly to market He explained though that tires couldd not be obtained to transport products to ultimate con sumers. Farmers should inspect their tires and see that they are recapped, retreaded, or vulcanized for their automobiles. Proper attention should be given to all tires on tractors and farm implements in regards to correct pressure.
