FUTURE OF CHILDREN MUST BE SAFEGUARDED IN WAR TIME PERIOD

Austin, Texas, May 28.—"In any war the future of the children must be safeguarded so that they can live and share in the freedom to follow," declared Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"They must be nourished, sheltered, and protected, even in the stress of wartime production, so that they will be strong to carry forward a just and lasting peace.

"Our American Republics sprang from a sturdy people yearning for tolerance, independence, and self-government. The American home has emerged from the search for freedom. Within it the child lives and learns through his own efforts the meaning and responsibilities of freedom.

"Both as a wartime responsibility and as a stepping stone to our future and theirs, all citizens should join together to—

1. Guard children from injury in danger zones.

2. Protect children from neglect, exploitation, and undue strain in defense areas.

3. Strengthen the home life of children whose parents are mobilized for war or war production.

4. Conserve, equip, and free children of every race and creed to take their part in democracy."

LARGE CASH PRIZES WILL BE GIVEN AT COWBOY REUNION

Stamford, May 26—Approximately \$3,500 will be given in cash prizes and premiums in the various events in the thirteenth Annual Texas Cowboy Reunion to be held here July, 2, 3, and 4. Entrants in the rodeo events last year totaled almost 200 cowhands.

The Quarter-Horse show, which is the official show of the American Quarter-Horse Association, and which has proved very popular the past two years will again be held. Prize money totaling around \$600 will be awarded in this exhibit.

In addition to daily cash prizes, special premiums will be given the champions in the bronc riding, calf-roping, and cow-milking contests. A valuable premium will also be presented the winning cowgirl sponsor, the winner in the cutting horse show, and the champion steer-riider.

Best entries in the grand parade and winners in the old fiddler's contest will also be included in the cash prize list.

Tentative plans are being made to enter the cutting horse show as part of the regular rodeo events of each afternoon and night performance, with finals to be held at one of the shows on July Fourth. This unique feature of the Texas Cowboy Reunion is judged on the ability of the rider.

Three performances will be held daily in the arena, a matinee at 8 o'clock each morning and the regular shows at 2 p. m. and 8 p. m.

The program, in addition to rodeo contests, will include trick and fancy riding and roping and the rodeo clown who always is popular with the crowds.

The official state bird of Texas is the mockingbird. At the request of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, the Texas Legislature of 1927 adopted the Mockingbird as the official state bird.

Texas' State Motto is "Friendship," officially adopted by the Texas State Legislature of 1930.
