By way of explanation as to the above petition and its appearance in The Enterprise:

Monday about noon, John Burroughs of Robert Lee called The Enterprise editor by long distance telephone and told us about the instrument and its contents. Mr. Burroughs asked if The Enterprise would carry the petition as a news item to which we replied that we would, as it was a matter of public interest. Mr. Burroughs told us he would come right over.

In a short time Mr. Burroughs reached our office. He showed us the petition and made further explanation, which we will give further on in this article.

By way of further explanation, we were "playing good neighbor" with our long-time friend and co-publisher, S. R. Young, editor of the Robert Lee Observer. Mr. Young had secured the contract for printing the primary election tickets from Mr. Gardner, who as county chairman, has that matter in his hands. Mr. Young being a very busy man, subtlet the printing of the election tickets to The Enterprise. When Mr. Burroughs arrived at our office we had the print. After seeing the petition tickets in type, just ready to and conferring with Mr. Burroughs he informed us that he had not seen Mr. Gardner personally relative to getting the name of Dr. Griffith on the ballot for county chairman, but had left a copy of the above petition at Mr. Gardner's office. Mr. Burroughs requested that we call Mr. Gardner and he would pay for the call. Mr. Gardner had not seen the petition. Being advised as to the petition and its contents he said that he would go to his office, get the petition look up the law and then would call us and advise. This Mr. Gardner did. He said that if there was dissatisfaction as to himself as county chairman, he would be glad to be relieved of the duties the office imposes—but he stated that the law was clear as to the matter and those favoring the petition had waited too late to file the petition for it to be legal—therefore, he could not afford to accept the petition and place the name of the gentleman named in the petition as a candidate, on the official ballot. **W. H. Rampy Addresses People In Letter Below**

Winters, Texas, June 28, 1942.

To the people of the Ninety Second Representative District; Dear Friends:

I want you to know that, even though this is a free country people may do as they please, long as they do not infringe upon the rights of others, that I appreciate very much the fact that I do not have an opponent this year. I also want you to know that it was a real pleasure to serve you during the Regular and First Called Session of the Forty-Seventh Legislature. I am aware of the fact that I made many mistakes but hope to profit by those mistakes and thereby be able to render a greater service to my District.

Due to the Tire Rationing Program, and the fact that I only have two spare tires on my car, it will be impossible for me to make an active campaign, which I would like very much to do, in order to discuss with you the various problems confronting the next Legislature. But, please remember that I will appreciate hearing from you at any time, and I assure you that I will appreciate your views on any subject.

I am cooperating in every possible way with the Administration, to help bring about a speedy and victorious end to the terrible conflict that is going on and about which we are most concerned. I am also doing all I can to prevent the Gasoline Rationing Program in Texas which, if put into effect, will seriously handicap the Victory Effort, rather than help. Especially would gasoline rationing hinder the farmers and ranchers of West Texas, also such a program would disrupt our schools, the Highway Department and other State Agencies, because of the decrease in revenue derived from the oil industry. I sincerely hope that gasoline rationing can be avoided in Texas.

Again let me say that it was a pleasure to serve you during the last Legislature, and that I will appreciate your consideration and support, even though I do not have an opponent. **O. C. Fisher Speaks of South's Record on the Pension Act**

Congressmen, in voting themselves a life pension in case of defeat, and in abusing the franking privileges by sending 10's of thousands of stampless campaign matter through the mails at the tax-payer's expense, are not setting the high example that becomes the spirit of the times, District Attorney O. C. Fisher, candidate for Congress, charged in a radio speech at Brownwood Saturday.

Referring to the Pension Act, Fisher pointed out that the lower House of Congress passed it unanimously last December 1, and passed it a second time unanimously on January 21st. By the terms of that bill, he said, it would have been possible for a defeated Congressman, of proper age who had served as long as 5 years, to have bought himself a life pension with but one payment of \$1.31!

In pointing to the abuse of the franking privileges, Fisher said when Congressmen send letters or printed matter through the mail of a private or political and not of official nature, without paying the 3c stamp tax, the sender becomes a tax dodger.

Fisher told of how the present Congressman of the 21st district, for example, had on last April 8 delivered a political address over the radio station KNEL, announced as "a paid political broadcast," and then, labeled "The Progress of our War Efforts," sent 10s of thousands of copies to poll tax payers over the district without stamps.

"In behalf of the hard-pressed tax-payers," he said, "I must raise my voice in condemnation of that practice."
