South's Attack on Versailles Treaty Revealed by Fisher

Congressman Charles L. South, in a speech made on August 30, 1939, assailed the Versailles Treaty that followed the World War as a cause for turning of Germany into an 'out-law nation,' and South branded that treaty-from Germany's standpoint-as "unjust, unreasonable, and without the spirit of conscience," District Attorney O. C. Fisher, candidate for Congress, revealed in Independence Day spee hes made at Brady, Sabi-

"The victorious nations," respective offices sought, sub- South was quoted as having said, "were drunk with victory and thus put the yoke of defeat too heavily on the German State. So. secretly," South continued "Germany rearmed and has grown to be an outlaw, seeking to regain her lost station.

Fisher produced and read from a photostatic copy of a letter, written and signed by South, addressed to J. J .Goodfellow of San Angelo, dated September 11. For District Attorney, 51st Ju 1939, in which South set out the quotations from his speech, given above, and South said, they were "substantially correct."

"I do not share that live of thought," Fisher said. "Hitler's ability in the short space of six years to build a murderous war machine of unparallelled proportions is proof sufficient that the Versailles Treaty did not deprive him of access to a good share of the natural resources of the world." "Yet," he went on, "some few people, in luding Congressman South, have taken the position that Germany was forced to rearm in order to regain that which, they claim, she was unjustly deprived of at the end of the last war."

Pledging himself to "an all-out war effort," Lester Boone, Fort Worth Representative, has formally announced his candidacy for the Texas Railroad Commission, and called attention to the fact that it was one of Texas' most vital fac-tors in the war effort. He further pledged in his announcement to

Boone, who is now serving in
the Texas Legislature from Fort Worth, sponsored the Omnibus Tax Bill which made possible the payment of old age pensions, teachers retirement pay, aid to the blind, and aid to crippled and dependent children. As a member of the House Military Affairs Committee, he aided in the passage of the Texas Defense Guard Bill, which became a law, thereby giving Texas greater security in the present crisis.

"I pledge an administration of harmony and will cooperate with other members of the commission," Boone said in his announcement. "I pledge myself to an all-out war effort in this vital department of State Government and will attend all commission meetings."
