A cheese demonstration cottage and processed was given by Mrs. Gilkerson in the Home Making Department of the High School. Points on the food value and the quantity per person was studied. Statistics show that a family of five should consume two tons of milk, butter and eggs a year.

Many ways to obtain the required amount of dairy products in salads, puddings, and foods of various kinds were brought out.

## Biographical Sketch of J. S. Craft, Deceased

In our last issue The Enterprise carried a brief announcement of the sudden passing of J. S. Craft of Blackwell, who died, Wednesday night, July 15, and interment was in the Blackwell cemetery, Thursday afternoon, following religious services at the Blackwell Methodist church. The religious services were conducted by the presiding elder of the Sweetwater district of the Methodist church, and Rev. W. L. Porterfield, pastor of the Blackwell Methodist church and Rev. J. L. Haines, pastor of the Bronte Methodist church.

Since our last issue, announcing the death of deceased we have been given many of the facts of the life of this oldtime citizen and pioneer of Coke county and West Texas.

Deceased was a native Texan, and was born at Elgin, Bastrop county, in 1868.

November 13, 1889 deceased and Miss Emma Copeland were united in marriage, at Salado, Bell county. To them eight children were born, seven of whom, with their mother, survive, to sorrow over his passing. The children are Bertha Craft, Abilene; Leonard, Tahoka; J. L. Blackwell; Mrs. D. L. Barnes, Oglesby; Mrs. Roe Jordan, Blackwell. Mrs. F. G. Lowe, Quemada; Mrs. W. H. Maxwell, Jr., Bronte. Besides the companion and children there are 15 grandchildren and one great grandchild. Two brothers and two sisters also survive. One of the brothers, C. K. Craft from Kempner attended the last rites.

November 13, 1939 Mr. and Mrs. Craft celebrated their golden wedding anniversary.

In 1895 deceased and companion moved to Wingate, Runnels county where they resided for four years. In 1889 they moved to Coke county and have spent the last forty-three years in their present location—hence but very, very few older citizens of the county remain, as to point of years of residence in the county.

Forty years ago deceased united with the Methodist church—and to his church obligations he was always faithful. In the Blackwell community in the days of his more active life, he was always in the forefront for everything that was for the good of his community and West Texas and the world at large. He was progressive in his ideals and his friends say that he always wanted the better and finer things of life to prevail. So, it was a large attendance, we are advised, of those who attended the lastrites and paid tribute to this fine Christian gentleman, good citizen and devoted husband and father.

## Free Training for Defense Jobs in War Plants

Pointing out that more than 80 per cent of all jobs in Texas war industries are filled by workers who have had specialized training, Mr. L. L. Ruttle, manager of the San Angelo office of the United States Employment Service today urged people in this area who wish war plant jobs to apply for the necessary training in the free National Defense schools.

"Most of these war industry jobs," said Mr. Ruttle, "are entirely new to Texans. Special pre-employment training is necessary before the employers will hire people to fill them. This training is provided to both men and women free of charge by the National Defense schools, and local people should investigate them through the Employment Service, which refers trainees to the schools."

The training program is operated jointly by the state and federal governments, and provides courses to prepare workers for aircraft, shipbuilding, munitions and other jobs in which there is or will be a heavy demand. It is virtually impossible to get one of these jobs without the training which has already landed thousands of workers in good paying war jobs.

Machine Shop, Aircraft Engine Mechanics, Aircraft Sheet Metal (including Riveting), are the courses offered. The training is open to men between the ages of 18 and 65 years, and to women between 18 and 45. The demand for women workers, who can fill most of these jobs, (Continued on last page)

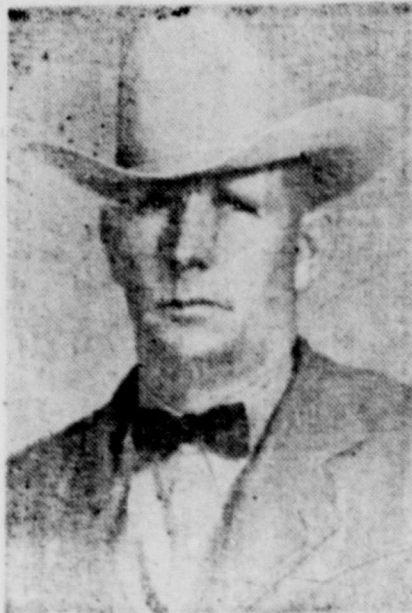

is increasing. Mr. Ruttie stressed the fact that the training is entirely free, the only cost to a trainee being that he must support himself during the six to 12-week training period. Even this is not true in all cases, since boys and girls from 17 to 24 years may be assigned to National Youth Administration war work centers where they will be boarded and paid a small wage while training.

The National Defense schools are operated on a 24-hour daily basis so that all equipment can be constantly used and provide training at all hours for the trainees who must work while attending.

**Household Fats Salvage Program for Coke County**

The Bureau of Industrial Conservation has set up the Fats Salvage Program, giving each family a goal of between one and two pounds of waste cooking fats per month, which would yield well over a half billion pounds per year. Housewives are being asked to save their fats in metal containers such as coffee cans or other tin cans and, when one or two pounds have accumulated, to sell them to their local butchers at a price that will average about 5c a pound. Coke County's goal under this set up will be approximately 1377 pounds of fats per month—let's exceed these goals.
