OBTAIN SLAUGHTER PERMITS

Coke County farmers who slaughter meat for sale were urged this week to obtain their slaughter permits before Thursday, April 1st.

Individual permits will be issued by the county USDA war board at the local A. A. A. office, R. B. Allen, board chairman, said.

Under the new meat management program, announced several days ago by Secretary of Agriculture Wickard, any person who slaughters animals for the delivery of meat must, in all instances, obtain a permit to slaughter. Farmers who slaughter animals only for home use need not obtain permits, but a permit is required if they deliver any of the meat to others. All slaughterers also must keep complete records of all livestock slaughtered.

HAVE YOU INSURED YOUR COTTON FOR 1943?

The dead line for cotton insuranie is midnight April 1st. We cannot afford to waste manpower and other production costs on uninsured crop losses.

If you do not understand about cotton insurance, if you will call at the A. A. A. office or contact your Community Committeeman they will be glad to explain cotton insurance and its advantages to you.

Protection is assured cotton farmers against loss from all unavoidable hazards, such as drought, bollweevil and other insects, frost, flood, plant diseases, storm, wind and hail.

Remember: if you wish to insure your cotton crop, you have until midnight, April 1st.

COTTON ALLOTMENT IS INCREASED

Coke county farmers may exceed their allotments by 10 per cent this year without loss of AAA payments, Christine Roach secretary of the AAA announced this week.

She also explained that farmers who plant up to 110 percent of their allotments would not be liable for cotton marketing quota penalties nor would they forta penalties nor would they forfeit cotton loan privileges.

Payment of 1.1 cents per pound on the average yield will be paid only on the individual cotton allotments and will not be made on any acreage in excess of official allotments, which already have been sent to county cotton farmers.

Loan privileges, however, will cover the entire production, provided the planted acres are not more than 110 percent of the allotment.

At the same time Mrs. Roach announced the 10 percent increase in planted acres this year, she said that Federal Crop Insurance also would include all the cotton planted within 110 per cent of the 1943 allotments. During 1942, protection was limited to insurance of the produc-

Under this year's program, 90 . percent of the warcrop goals established for any farm must be met before payments will be made.


