Sgt. G. O. Hanson Writes Parents From Australia

Rev. and Mrs. A. Hanson are in receipt of the following interesting letter from their son, Sgt. G. O. Hanson, in Australia.



SGT. G. O. HANSON

Sgt Hanson was born at Brady, February 2, 1922, and is one of eight children born to Rev. and Mrs. Hanson. He enlisted as a mechanic in the air corps June 4, 1941 and is a graduate in that department. He also took a course in chemical warfare which means learning how to combat with poisonous gas and how to prevent poisonous gas from inflicting its deadly effects.

The letter follows:

July 9, 1943.

Dearest Mama and Papa:
Well—here I am in Australia, now! We had a fine trip coming over here. We didn't have a bit of trouble.

Everything is certainly turned around here. It is winter time over here now. The winter months are June, July, and August. The summer months are November, December and January. The weather here is just about like it is in Texas in the winter. The people drive on the wrong side of the road. They all so have the steering wheels of their cars on the wrong side. We sure are having a time, trying to learn how to count this money over here. We even get paid in Australian money.

Did you receive the telegram and money I sent you from California? I sure would like to have come home before I left but I didn't have a chance. Here is hoping that the war is over soon so that we can all come home.

How is everyone getting along down home? I sure would like to see you. Well, be good and sweet. Write me every day and I will do the same. Tell all the others of the folks to write, too, because a letter really looks good over here.

Solution Sought of Labor Problems in Coke County

To the farmers in Coke County: The Extension Service has been assigned the job of helping to solve the labor situation. We have written you before about this problem which may become very near to us within the next few months. We are asking the farmers of Coke county to give your assistance toward the solution of the labor problem. Many solutions have been tried in the different sections of Texas. Some have imported Mexican labor; some have secured prisoners of war; while still others have solved their problems by the old custom almost forgotten, of forming "help your neighbor clubs or circles." Our fathers used this method of getting a difficult job done and it worked.

You can render a distinct service to yourself, your neighborhood and your country by helping organize such clubs or circles for the purpose of exchanging work among neighbors. In this way we can take care of much of our cotton picking, maize heading, and pea nut harvesting and threshing. How to go about it? Simply call your neighbors and ask them to join you in a "help your neighbor club or circle" so that when anyone has a difficult piece of work to do he will notify you of his other neighbors and they will come to his rescue on a "swap out" basis or any way that is satisfactory. Let me know what you think of this idea.

We have sent our boys to war. Now, we don't want them to go without some food or clothing just because we failed to do all we could at home.

Kiker & Modgling Lease Thresher to Pea Nut Man

J. W. Gotcher of Brownwood has leased the small grain thresher from Kiker & Modgling and will begin at once the work of converting the machine into a pea nut thresher.

Mr. Gotcher is a thoroughly experienced pea nut thresher man. He has been operating pea nut threshers for thirty-five years and therefore knows not only the machinery and how to operate it to the best advantage but he also knows pea nut culture and the harvesting of pea nuts to the best advantage.

Mr. Gotcher has associated with him his son-in-law, Jim Savage of Maverick. Mr. Savage was born near Maverick and has lived there all his life.

This same crew threshed pea nuts in the Bronte country last season and gave most satisfactory service. Mr. Gotcher requests that any pea nut grower who has peanuts this year who did not have Mr. Gotcher thresh for him last season, to see anyone who had Mr. Gotcher thresh for him last year.

"We would be pleased for the pea nut growers to get together and mark out their thresher routes for us so that we will not have to go back over the same territory we have once been over," said Mr. Gotcher. "This will be for the good of all, both the growers and ourselves."

Mr. Savage stated that the threshing season will extend from about September 1 to October 15. "But at any time, a farmer gets his pea nuts pulled and raked, we can go after about five days for them to dry and thresh them. We will also have a hay baler right with our thresher and bale the hay for the farmer. Service is our first word and we will always do our best for every grower."

Both Mr. Gotcher and Mr. Savage will be at S. A. Kiker's place in Bronte within a few days, with a crew of mechanics to convert the small grain thresher into a pea nut machine. Those who are interested can see them there.

Read Mr. Gotcher's announcement in this issue of The Enterprise relative to his pea nut threshing in the Bronte sector the coming season.

DIPHTHERIA PREVENTIVE SCIENTIFIC FACT, SAYS STATE HEALTH OFFICER

Austin, Texas, August 5.—“Few conquests of science have been as spectacular and complete as those relating to diphtheria,” Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, said today. “Science has firmly established the value of serum treatment in both its preventive and curative phases. However, toxin-antitoxin, or its successor toxoid for immunization and anti-toxin for cure, are serums of which the general public is even yet not fully aware.”

As indicated, toxoid is the immunizing or preventive agent now usually employed. However, three or four months are required for the body to develop immunity. At that time the Schick test can be applied to determine the results of the preventive treatment.

Dr. Cox urged that children receive diphtheria immunization as early as possible, preferably as soon as they are six months old. The necessity for this immunization is recognized when it is known that two-thirds of all deaths from diphtheria occur in the age group under six years. It cannot be too strongly em-

phasized that to deprive children of this protection which science has made possible is to subject them to unwarranted and unnecessary hazards that an easily turn into a tragedy,” Dr. Cox said. “Parental interest in immunization must be more widespread if the Texas death rate from this disease is to be eliminated as a cause of death.

“When a child has been stricken with diphtheria, antitoxin is the only treatment that will save his life. Also, to be effective, it must be given early in the illness and in large doses. Delay is usually caused by parents’ failing to realize that any sore throat may actually be diphtheria.”

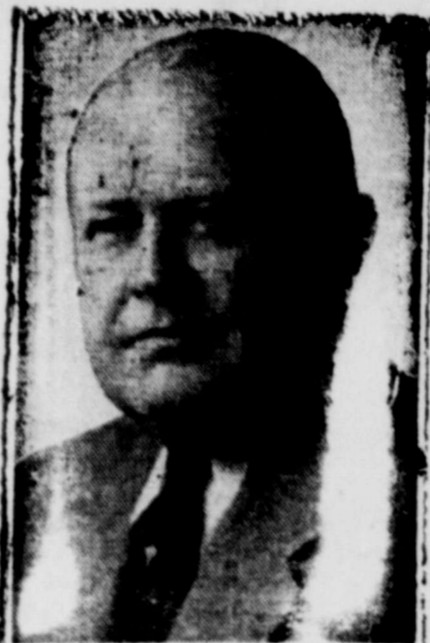
