

DIPTHERIA PREVENTIVE SCIENTIFIC FACT, SAYS STATE HEALTH OFFICER

Austin, Texas, August 5. "Few conquests of s ience have been as spectacular and complete as those relating to diptheria," Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, said today. "Science has firmly established the value of serum treatment in both its preventive and curative phases. However, toxin-antitoxin, or its su cessor toxoid for immunization and anti-toxin for cure, are serums of which the general public is even yet not fully aware."

As indicated, toxoid is the immunizing or preventive agent the two cities involved and the now usually employed. However, three or four months are required for the body to develop immunity. At that time the Schick test can be applied to determine the results of the preventive treatment.

Dr. Cox urged that children receive diptheria immunization as early as possible, preferably as soon as they are six months old. The necessity for this immunizaion is re ognized when it is mown that two-thirds of all aths from diptheria occur in age group under six years.






