If he is in need of vocational rehabilitation or if he must have outright disability compensation, such would be ready or quickly available. Although vocational training for disabled veterans of this war already is available, the Veterans Administration informs that only 278 men actually have entered the VA job training. Most of them thus far discharged have quickly obtained civilian jobs, and generally at good pay-for the moment. This happy condition will not prevail indefinitely. 

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SEEK DOCTOR'S ADVICE **ON "LIVING HABITS."** SAYS HEALTH OFFICER

Austin, Texas, December 16-With the tremendous drain on the medical profession in response to the needs of the armed forces, there is greater neces sity now than ever before for maintaining good health and a voiding any risks which might result in needless calls on the services of doctors.

The shortage in medical attention which is now available to the public will be even greater before the end of the coming year, since more and more doet rs are being taken into the service and many of those remaining are not in active practice due to advanced age, teaching, or public health activities. or full-time employment in industry. This situation develops a problem for the practicing physicians who will remain at home, the solution of which to some extent will be in the hands of the general public, according to Dr. Geo' W. Cox, Stata Health Officer.

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Food Wasted in Coke Homes Would Feed Many Soldiers

Coke County's 1,207 housewives could feed 316 soldiers for a year with the food wasted an nually in homes of the county, an officcial of the country's leading food distributor estimated today.

This amazing figure is based on accurate government statistics which indicate that at least 604.7737 pounds of food are wasted annually in Coke County homes. according to Harvey A. Baum, head of A & P Tea Company's produce-buying o perations.

"Food is a munition of war and everyone must fight waste of it now." Baum pointed out. "Efficient food producers, processors and distributors have worked for years to reduce waste. Our company, for example, has cut waste and spoilage on perishable fruits and vegetables by 50 per cent during the past 20 years," he added. "Now the government is urging a similar war on food waste in the home."

Kitchen efficiency, Baum sug gested, should include three points: (1) Buy as nearly as nossible just the required amount; (2) serve moderate helpings, (3) use all left-overs. Baum said that although housewives have eliminated much food waste since Pearl Harbor, over eight percent of all food hought for home consumption is still wasted. While it is obvious that waste cannot be prevented entirely, he added, carefully planned conservation

fivilians eat about 1,514 pounds of food each year, he concluded, while the average soldier "puts away" 1,916 pounds annually.




