Soldier Boy Writes Beautiful Letter To His Home Church

Some months ago, the Kickapoo Baptist church, located three miles north of Bronte, on highway 70, wrote a letter to one of their soldier boy members, who at that time, was

fighting in New Guinea. The young man was Noah Pruitt, son of Mr. and Mrs. Noah Pruitt. In the course of time the church received a letter from Junior, acknowledging receipt of the letter. The letter truly is a masterpiece of beautiful sentiment couched in fine phraseology and shows that the young writer was thinking several years in advance of his age and the situation as to war. Since the letter was written the writer was wounded in battle and is now in General Hospital in Australia where he is recovering. The church has requested the publication of the letter which we are glad to do. The letter follows:

New Guinea,
November 25, 1943.

To the Kickapoo Baptist Church,
Dear friends and loved ones:

I received your most appreciated letter several days ago. You will never know just how much I really did appreciate it and the blessings I got from it. I am sorry I haven't written sooner.

There are two fellows in this Company who care and really appreciate the teachings of the Lord. We get together quite often and discuss the Bible. Oh, if everyone knew of that power as we do, this world would have no conflicts today. If the leaders of the world would only turn to the Bible and do as God has said do, there would be no more war. In the midst of this welter of lying and deception, of woe and misery, of death and destruction, of violent disorder and threatening, the only saving forces on earth are the eternal principles of the everlasting Gospel of Christ and the rights and powers of the Almighty God.

Every man, woman and child, who is a true Christian should be working double hand every day, every night, to save this old world from everlasting fire. The people have turned from God to worldly things, and brought on this mighty conflict. We must re-inforce our determination to serve God and to keep His commandments. In the end the Lord will cast out those who "transgress His laws, change His ordinances, and break His everlasting covenant."

There is one good thing we Christians at war can look forward to. We know at heart we are not separated from our loved ones for long. We may not have the opportunity of seeing them again in flesh and blood—but, there is that blessed assurance of meeting them in the Holy City. God pity the unsaved! If they only knew how much

J. A. Jordan of Blackwell Dies at Ripe Age of 80

J. A. Jordan, one of the old-time citizens of the Blackwell section of country, died February 12, 1944. A native of Mississippi, he was born at Decatur, in Newton county.

When only two years old he came with his parents to Texas and settled in Leon county. Later the family moved to Navarro county, and on September 1, 1914, he arrived with his family in Nolan county.

December 1890 Mr. Jordan and Miss Eula Farmer were united in marriage. To them seven children were born, all of whom survive. The children are Elmer, Austin, Robert and Joe, Blackwell; Mrs. Miller Harris, and Roe Jordan, Portland, Oregon, and Mrs. Anna Bell Branham, Fort Worth. There are 18 grandchildren and 3 great grandchildren. Surviving besides the wife and children are two sisters and a brother. They are Mrs. Lou Haskins, Wortham; Mrs. Mary Hilliard, Emhouse, and J. A. Oden, Blackwell.

Interment was in the Blackwell cemetery Tuesday afternoon, February 15, following religious services at the Blackwell Methodist church, of which deceased had been a member for many years, conducted by the pastor, Rev. Wilbur F. Gaede, assisted by Rev. Ray Lee, at one time pastor of the church, and kinsman of the family.

Thus, another of the hardy old time citizens passes, but like others of his generation, "his work lives after him."

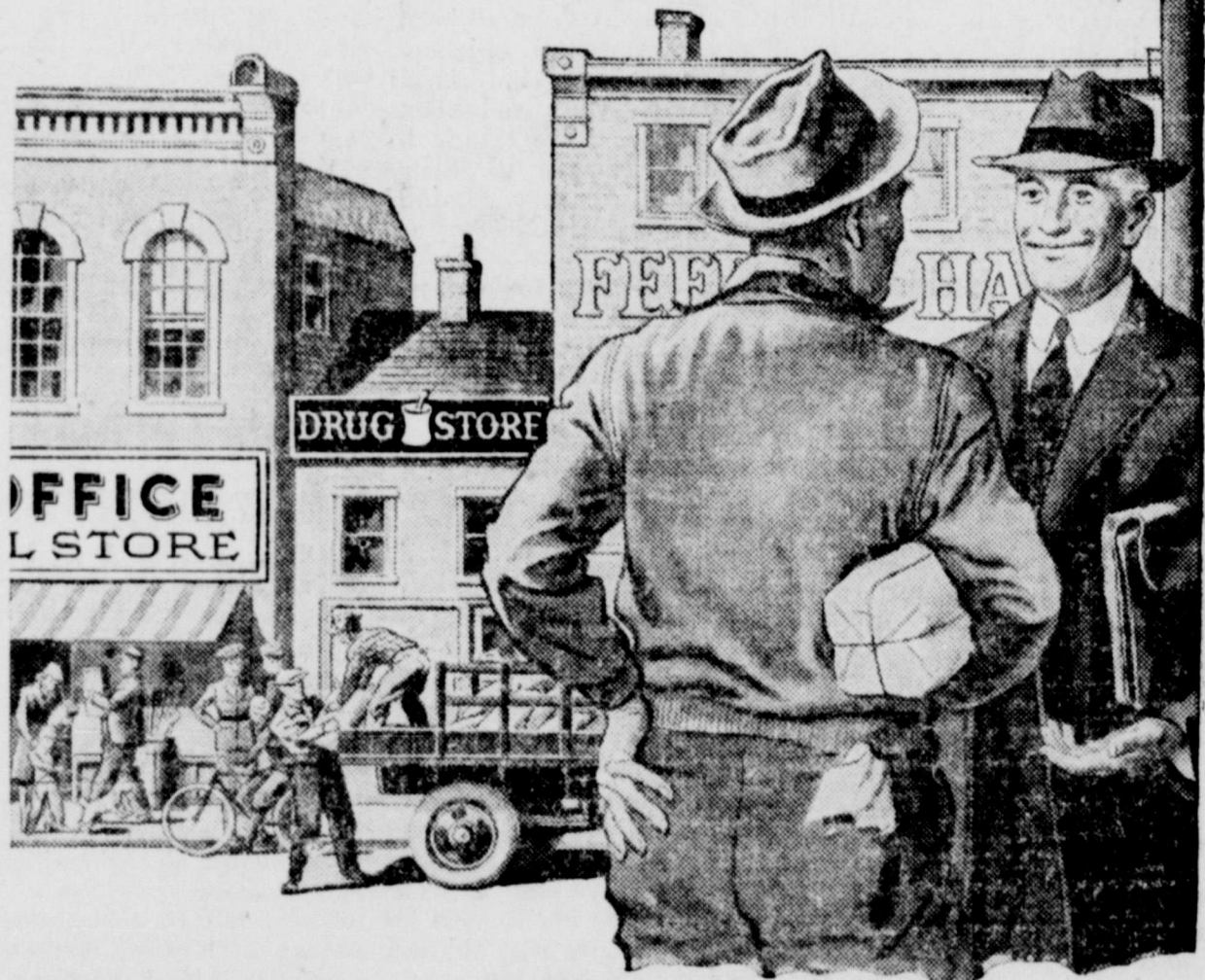

PRISONER OF WAR COMMITTEE SET UP HERE BY RED CROSS

Relatives and friends of American prisoners of war and civilian internees in enemy lands can now receive latest information on prison camp conditions and privileges through the newly organized prisoner of war sub-committee of the Coke County Red Cross chapter, Jeff Dean, chairman of the local Red Cross chapter announced today.

Under the chairmanship of Jeff Dean, this sub-committee will supply current information on relief measures taken by the Red Cross in behalf of American nationals held by the enemy, and advise of postal and other regulations governing communication with prisoners, Dean said.

Stating that about 40,000 Americans are held by Germany and Japan, the Red Cross spokesman said the prisoners of war sub-committee will be provided with lists of prisoners from Coke county and will advise their next-of-kin how they may send mail and gifts to them.

The new sub-committee will function as a part of the Coke County Red Cross chapter's home service program for servicemen and their families.

In reviewing the function of his sub-committee, Dean said: "We shall do our best to provide relatives and friends of prisoners of war with the most recent and accurate developments concerning prison camp conditions, relief measures, and communication regulations. As new information is received, it will be supplied to local newspapers for publication. We shall also be pleased to consult with any next-of kin and others concerned with prisoners of war and to advise them in any way possible."
