"Grandmother" Rawlings Dies at Unusual Age of 98

The writer has been chronicling the deaths of people, as an editor for more than forty years -the dead have been persons, of course, of every age, and almost every station in life. But, in this, the account of the passing of Mrs. Mattie Jane Rawlings, who died at her home in San Angelo, early Wednesday morning, March 15, 1944, we chronicle the death of the most aged person whose passing we have given in the columns of our pa-



per. Mrs. Rawlings had attained the unusual age of 98, when the clock of time struck for her its last stroke.

Mrs. Rawlings' maiden name was Miss Mattie Jane Haynie, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Haynie. She was a native of Arkansas, and was born in Sevier county, November 30, 1845. Shortly after her birth her parents came to Texas, settling first in Travis county, moving later to Burnet county. In 1860 the family moved to Llano county, where her father entered business in the town of Llano.

Funeral services were held at the Vautrain Funeral Home in San Angelo, Thursday afternoon, following which the body was brought to Bronte and entombment was in the family lot in Fairview cemetery, with Vautrain in charge, assisted by Frank Keeney, Bronte funeral director. Religious services were conducted by Dr. K. P. Barton, retired pastor of the First Methodist church of San Angelo, and an old time friend of deceased. The religious services were concluded at the grave side, in which Dr. Barton paid beautiful tribute to the memory of Mrs. Rawlings, tenderly, as the "unusually aged person, whose length of years is never reached, except by the very ex ceptional few-she was loved by the First Methodist church of which she was a member and in which she served until failing health a few years ago precluded further activities. She has many friends in San Angelo," the minister said, "and I want you here at Bronte to know how she is loved in that city because of her faithfulness to life's responsibilities and her loyalty to her friends-she will be missed."

RABIES PREVALENT IN DOGS MORE IN THE WINTER THAN SUMMER

Austin, Texas, March 17, 1944 -. Contrary to popular belief rabies is more prevalent in winter than in the so-called days of

In a statement released this week by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, it was disclosed that in February the State Laboratory examined 316 animal brains for the presence of rabies, over thirty seven per cent

"If all stray dogs were defor rabies, it would go far toward stamping out this justly feared fatal disease," Dr. Cox

The doctor stressed that all dogs susperted of rabies be confined ten days for observation to see if the disease develops. If a dog sickens and dies during the observation period, the head should be packed in ice and sent to the State Health Department for examination. Freezing the brain, or killing the dog prematurely, or in such manner as to injure the brain may make correct laboratory findings uncertain, if not impossible.

Dr. Cox declared that after a dog is confined ten days and then killed, there is still ample time for a victim of his bite to be treated to prevent rabies, but he cautioned that if the disease is found to be present in the dog, the vi tim should begin treatment without further de-


