Beautiful Letters Concerning Death of Chester Kiker

Mr. and Mrs. Chester Kiker of Roswell, New Mexico, parents of F-O Chester Kiker, who was killed in action in the Southwest Pacific, March 29, have received two beautiful and comforting letters relative to their son and his heroic death. Mr. and Mrs. Kiker sent the letters to Mr. Kiker's parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. A. Kiker, here at Bronte. One letter is from the War Department, the other is from Chester's chaplain. The letters follow:

Dear Mr. and Mrs. Kiker:

It is with regret that I am writing to confirm the recent telegram informing you of the death of your son, Flight Officer Chester R. Kiker, T-122,246, Air Corps, who was killed in action on 29 March, 1944, over Green Island, Solomon Islands.

I fully understand your desire to learn as much as possible regarding the circumstances leading to his death and I wish there were more information available to give you. Unfortunately, reports of this nature contain only the briefest details as they are prepared under battle conditions and the means of transmission are limited.

I know the sorrow this message has brought you and it is my hope that in time the knowledge of his heroic service in defense of his country, even unto death, may be sustaining comfort to you.

I extend to you my deepest sympathy.

You have already been notified, no doubt, by the War Department that your son F-O Chester R. Kiker of the 370th Bombardment Squadron (H) was killed in action on March 29, 1944.

As chaplain of this organization I desire to extend to you my sincere Christian sympathy in this hour of sorrow, and in this message of condolence I am joined by all the officers and men of this group.

Abundant Rains Break Long Drouth In Bronteland

Following a few showers that had fallen, the heavens opened over Bronteland Monday morning and the rains came down.

The rains, though heavy enough to flush the streams and put out stock water, were not torrential, nor was there any hail or wind. For some four hours in a steady downfall, the rain fell, amounting to one and seven-eighths of an inch, and gave moisture to the parched earth. It had been feared by some that when the drouth should be broken, the fall would be so heavy, it would wash away the soil. But, the farmers of Coke are now terracing their land on such a scale that even should an unusually heavy rain fall, it would not wash the soil away as in former years.

The rain was too late, many think, to save the small grain. There may be a few exceptions, where small grain will now mature and make sufficient yield to justify harvesting. But most of the small grain fields had already been converted into pastures. Yet the rains will send the row crops away on, towards a good yield, and just a little rain at the right time will make an abundant row crop of feed-stuffs.

I trust you will be comforted somewhat by the realization that your son gave his life for his country and in the cause of freedom, which we love. I hope you will turn to the Lord in these days of trial and sorrow, for He alone is our help in time of trouble. I write these words at Easter time and so I remind you of the great Christian hope that we shall see our loved ones again, made possible because our Lord rose from the dead. May this hope soften your grief and bring you closer to the Lord day by day.

Any further word concerning your son or details of the action will have to come from the War Department.

Wooden grain bins built by the Commodity Credit Corporation for storage purposes when warehouses were filled to capacity in 1940 and 1941 are now for sale on a "first come, first served" basis, Mrs. Christine G. Roach, AAA Administrative Officer said.

Size of the bins is 14x16x10 feet, with a capacity of 1,843 bushels. They are being sold in sections at \$150. each, FOB Austin.

Orders should be placed immediately through the local AAA office. The bins are shipped five to a carload.

PEAS AND PEANUTS
