An informal opinion poll showsoverwhelming support for country's decision to get involved and support of our service personnel is even stronger. Dimmitt Mayor Wayne Collins said, "Well, I believe we're doing

dam Hussein has to be stopped. The US is pursuing the righ course. There should be a better way of resolving these conflicts, but in view of the situation, I fee we are doing the right thing." "I don't like any war. All wars and irrational-the result of a complete failure of people to solve their

That's just the start. They also must hammer out a budget of almost $\$ 7$ million every year and see that our children get the while complying with a myriad of state and federal mandates. Having done that, the school trustees must then concern themselves with the day-to-day operation of the schools-dress code, policy, personnel, health, discipline, parents' complaints, trips, meals-because the voters and parents demand it.

## County irrigators' center pivot use is on the rise

The use of center pivot sprinkler systems continues to increase within Castro County, according to a ry update conducted by the High ry update conducted by the High
Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in Lubbock. In the portion of Castro County within the Water District service area, approximately 230 additional
center pivot systems have been center pivot systems have been
installed between 1986 and 1990, according to the Water District's inventory. This brings the total number of center pivot systems in use within Castro County to 566 . The previous 1986 center pivot vots in operation within the county.
The 230 additional center pivot systems represent a $\$ 6,900,000$ investment in water conservation by Castro County irrigators during the past four years, at an average cost
of $\$ 30,000$ per system. f $\$ 30,00$ per system.
Approximately 1,383 center pi-
vot systems were installed between 1986 and 1990 within the Water District, according to the recent inventory totals. This brings the total number of cener pivot systems in operation within the district to
"Center pivots, and especially (LEPA) systems are the wave of
the future," said Ken Carver, assis-
tant manager of the High Plains Water District "Center pivot systems continue to be installed be-
cause increased crop production cause increased crop production,
significant water savings and resignificant water savings and re-
duced fuels and labor costs makes investment in these irrigation systems cost-effective. Most center pivot systems currently in use within the Water District are partial dropline systems
which operate at about $80 \%$ water use efficiency. However, the number of LEPA systems in use increases each year as a result of the improved irrigation application ef-
