


# Leafworms are Threatening the **Cotton Crop**

NUMBER 33.

The first leafworms of the season are now appearing in cotton fields of this area. Late rains have given sotton a new growth of tender foliage which is very inducive to leafworm attacks. The infestation is, at present, very light but it is well to keep in mind the fact that leafworms can, and usually do, increase very rapidly as the eggs hatch in only three days at this time of the season.

Early poisoning of the worms will prevent them from webbing up and changing to moths. This keeps successive infestations of the insects down to a minimum and thereby reduces future damage to a great extent.

# "Hold Cotton for Parity," Advises Senator Bankhead

"The recent prospects for an early peace with Germany, together with an inability of the OPA and the cotton mills to agree upon the cost of landing

"The Bankhead-Brown Amendparity to cotton producers.

"The President is directed by Congress to take all lawful action, acting through any agency of the government, to assure that the farm producers of cotton receive not less than parity for their cotton..
